How To Loaf With Mince Meat



Fill-'em-up fare from the Borden Kitchen: a meat loaf sparked with the pungent good taste of ready-to-use mince meat.

> Mince Meat Stuffed Meat Loaf (Makes 6 servings)

2 lbs. ground round 2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon (one-half of 1-1/4 oz. pkg.) onion soup mix

STUFFING: 2 tablespoons Danish Flavor Margarine OR butter

1/2 cup (4-oz. can) stems and pieces mushrooms, drained and chopped

2 tablespoons chopped red sweet pepper

2 eggs, beaten teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons dehydrated parsley flakes

2 tablespoons chopped green sweet pepper 1-1/3 cups (1/2 of 28-oz. jar) None Such ready-touse mince meat

1/2 teaspoon salt 2 cups dried bread cubes 2 tablespoons dehydrated celery flakes

In a large-size mixing bowl, combine ground round, soup mix, eggs, salt, and parsley flakes. Line the sides and bottom of a 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan carefully with approximately 3/4 of the meat mixture. In a large skillet, melt margarine or butter. Sauté chopped mushrooms and peppers until golden brown. Add remaining ingredients; mix lightly. Spoon stuffing into meat-lined loaf pan. Press firmly. Cover with remaining meat mixture. Bake in a moderate (350°F.) oven about 1-1/4 hours, or until top is dark golden brown. Pour off liquid from pan. Invert pan over serving platter; carefully remove pan. If desired, pipe onion whipped potatoes through a decorators' bag across top of meat loaf.

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,-800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term if the license ends in an off number, it will be renewed for two years the first time, then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per vear.

The new license will be approximately 21/8 inches wide by 3% inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before

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
