The first sample of worms from Sterling County was sent to the Mission laboratory by Clinton Hodges last week. Taken from a lamb, the sample was identified as not-screw-worm by the laboratory.

Laboratory officials report that samples submitted for identification thus far this year are running fifty per cent lower than last year at the same time. They are concerned that perhaps some samples are not being submitted because of labor problems but are hopeful that livestock producers will continue to be on the lookout for all possible cases of worms. Thus far, the confirmed cases of screw-worms have been confined to the South Texas area near the Rio Grande River; however, in recent days, some have been confirmed southwest of San Antonio area.

With shearing getting under way in this area, producers are urged to keep a close watch for possible cases. One case missed now could mean trouble later in the year. If you need vials or mailing tubes, they are available in the county agent's office. Keep a supply in the pickups used on the ranch.

Now that warm weather is about to make its appearance, at least it's nearer than it had been since the wily mosquitoes are beginning to put out leaves, it's time to fertilize the lawn grasses. A shot of fertilizer when the grass begins to green up will help keep the lawn beautiful. The fertilizer should be applied when the grass begins to green up so that it will have plant food to get it off to a good start.

Recommendations for this area are slightly different this year. In the past, we have recommended only nitrogen and phosphorous. There has been research to show that potash will show a response here though most soil tests show high levels of this element. The potash may not be available though because of the high calcium content of our soils. Also, a lawn requires high rates of all plant nutrients since the constant cutting of the grass removes high levels of all nutrients.

For the initial application this year, we are recommending a complete fertilizer such as 12-12-12. This should be applied now at the rate of at least ten pounds per thousand square feet of lawn; up to 20 pounds per thousand would not be excessive. Grass should have approximately 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per thousand square feet. Four to six weeks after the initial application, nitrogen alone should be supplied. This can be in the form of 3 to 5 pounds of ammonium nitrate or 5 to 7 pounds of ammonium sulfate per thousand square feet. This should be repeated every four to six weeks. The fertilizer would be watered in well unless applied just before a soaking rain.

Garlyn Hoffman, Extension range brush and weed control specialist, spent last Thursday in Sterling County. Garlyn was checking on the progress of brush control demonstrations in this area of the state.

Information regarding the supply of 2,4, 5-T for brush control during 1968 makes the situation a little more favorable at the present time. The military is not to take any

2, 4, 5-T during April and May. The entire supply manufactured during these two months is to be available for domestic use. Previous to this time, the entire supply had been taken by the military for use in Viet Nam. If you have not made arrangements for your spraying program already, it would be wise to do so during this period. If you prefer to supply your own herbicide, you should make arrangements for its purchase now; if you prefer to let the applicator supply the herbicide as is the usual case, contact him now so that he can make arrangements for an ample supply for his jobs.

It is felt that enough can be manufactured during the two months for brush control purposes this year. No provisions have been made at this time for 1969; the Viet Nam situation where much herbicide is being used to defoliate the jungles will determine the future policy.

New Residents May Vote Early This Year

Voters in the May primary who moved into the county on or after November 4, 1967, must vote between April 15 and April 30 in the office of the county clerk in the county of their present residence, according to information supplied by W. W. Durham, the County Clerk of Sterling County.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved unless one or more of the various types of districts (congressional, legislative, judicial, etc.) included both the county of his former residence and the county of his new residence. If he had lived in a district for six months before the election he could vote on statewide offices and issues and on the offices for districts in which he had six months' residence, but he could not vote on local offices and issues within the county.

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has been changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the twentieth day of the fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

**Higher Earnings Possible
Without Benefit Deductions**

For older people and other beneficiaries who continue to work the recent changes in social security will enable them to make more money and still draw some or all of their social security benefits.

The amount of money a person can earn in a year and still draw all his social security benefits has been raised. Beginning with 1968, a person who makes as much as \$1,680 can still collect all of his social security benefits. Even if he earns considerably more than that, he may still draw some benefits. The old law had set that limit at \$1,500, through 1967.

Here's how it now works. If you are working regularly and do not earn more than \$1,680 a year in wages, you will receive all of your social security benefits each month. If you are working regularly and make more than \$1,680 a year, \$1 will be withheld from your benefits for each \$2 you make over \$1,680 and up to 2,880. If you make more than 2,880, \$1 will be deducted from your benefits for each \$1 you make above that amount.

However regardless of your total earnings for the year you will receive your social security check for any month in which you do not earn more than \$140 in wages and are not active in self-employment. This means that you could make any amount over \$1,680 a year, and still receive your checks for any month that you do not work, but with deductions against the months you do work. Remember, these new provisions apply to earnings in 1968. The old law applies to earnings and benefits in 1967.

As in the old law, there are no deductions taken from your social security benefits for any month after you reach 72, regardless of how much you earn in the year.

The provisions of the retirement test apply also to dependents of people who are receiving disability benefits, but not to the disabled worker himself. Special rules, including medical considerations, apply to people who are receiving benefits because of disability. About 760,000 people across the country are expected to receive some \$175 million in additional benefits during 1968, as a result of this change.

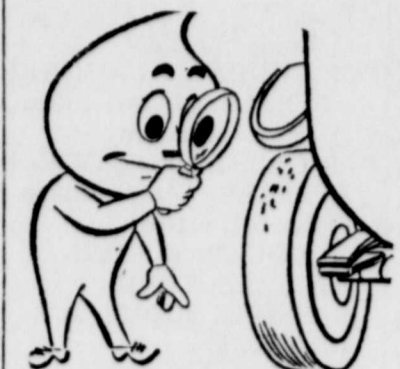
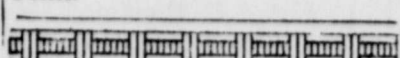

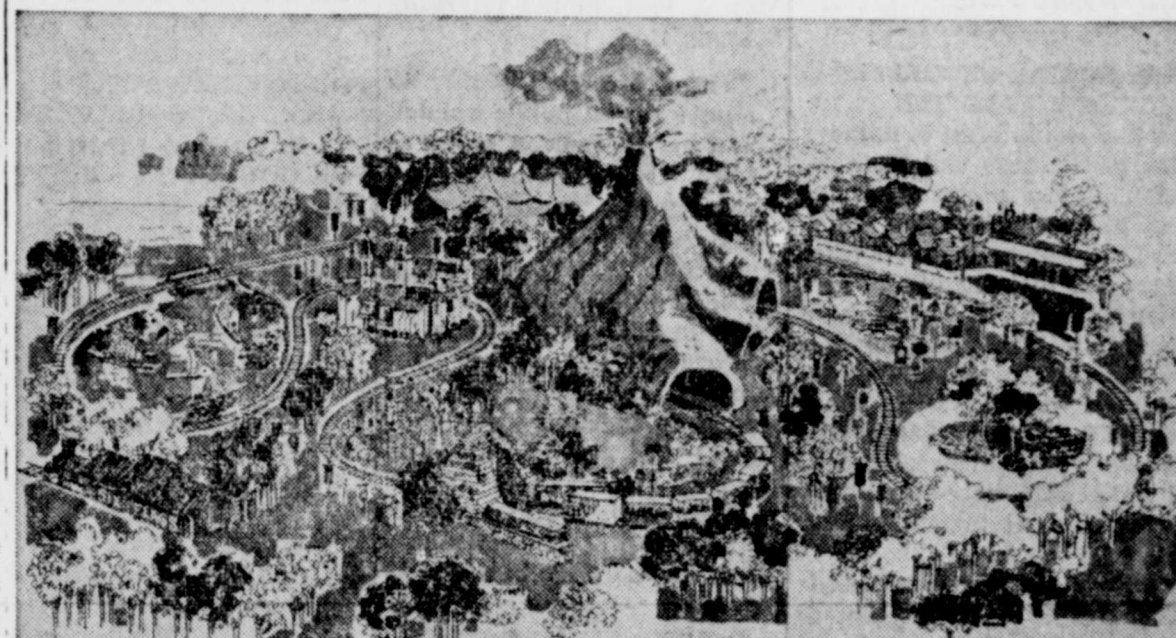

NEW SOCIAL SECURITY MILITARY FAMILIES

Of special interest to military men and women and their dependents is a provision in the new social security law which promises greater protection for them and their families.

Under the old law only a person's military base pay was counted toward social security benefits. Starting with January 1968, an additional \$100 will be counted for each month in which the person in military service is receiving active duty pay.

Since social security benefits are based on average earnings over a working career, you and your family may be able to receive higher benefits later because of the additional credits.

The Congress recognized that under the old law, the social security protection of a worker might be impaired during a period when he is in military service, because of the relatively low earnings covered under social security. This new provision seeks to take into account the value of payment in kind — such fringe benefits as food, housing, and clothing, medical services, which are in effect part of the serviceman's earnings.

These earnings credits will automatically be credited to your social security account, and you don't have to make any kind of application to receive them. They will not mean additional social security contributions from your paycheck, but will be attributed to the general funds of the Treasury.

Primary Election Here May 4

The Sterling County Democratic Primary Election will be held in Sterling on Saturday, May 4. The voting will be held in all boxes as usual except on the divide — where it will be held at D.D. Garrett's house. The County Commissioners named Garrett to handle the election as judge this year — due to the regular election judge, Mrs. Bill R. Bynum, being ineligible to help. Her husband is on the ballot as a candidate.

In addition to the voting on candidates names from governor on down to the precinct level, there are three referendum proposals listed. Voters may express their opinions on sale of liquor by the drink, pari-mutuel horse race betting and for or against a State Dairy Commission with powers to regulate price of milk.

Voters should vote by marking an X or some mark in the little square by the candidates names he favors. Do not mark out all others — just use the X. The ballot will have the following races and referendums on it for the primary:

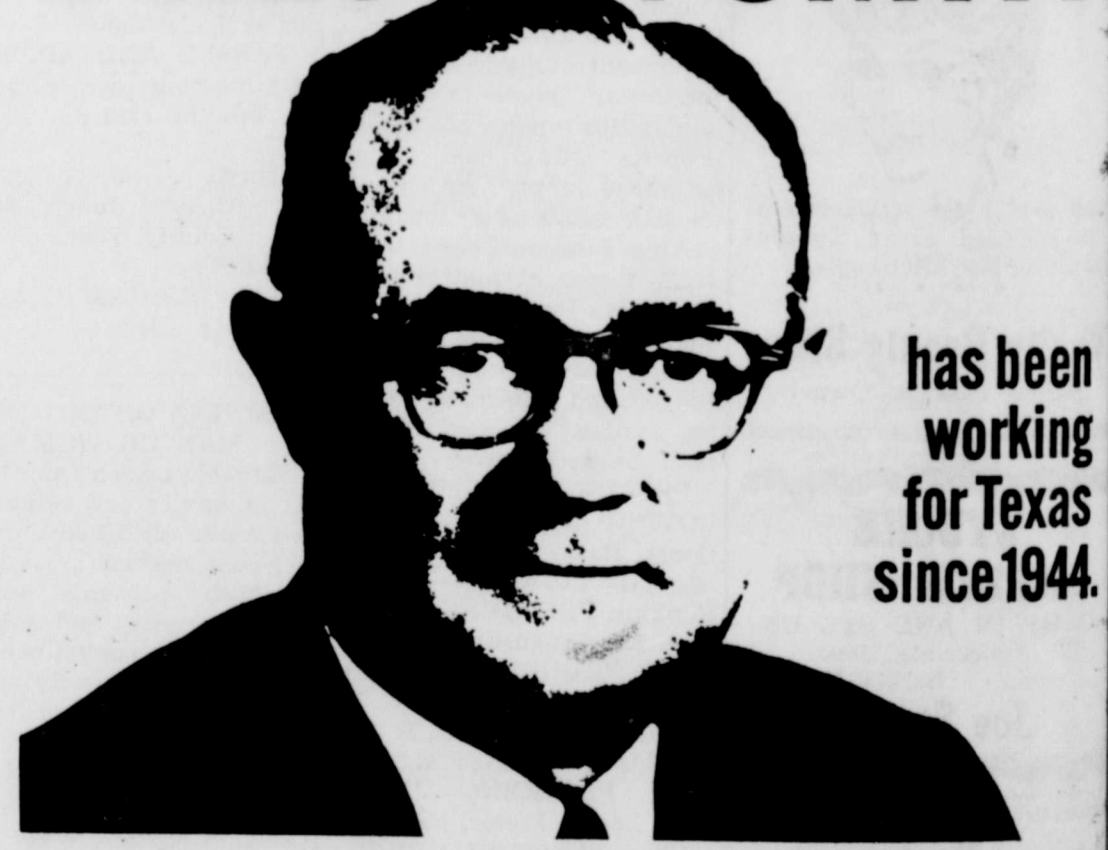
