AROUND THE COUNTY



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

Thirteen Sterling County 4-H Club members will be competing in the Extension Service Seven 4-H club elimination contests to be held at San Angelo Saturday. They will be entered in three different contests. Eight of those entering are juniors while five are seniors. The seniors will be striving to win the right to represent the district at the state contests to be held at 4H Round-up in June at Texas A&M. Juniors will be competing for individual ribbons and team banners but are not eligible to go to the state contests. The training they receive as juniors prepares them for the time when they become seniors, fourteen years of age, and can enter the state contests.

The senior range grass and plant identification team members are Bobby Bynum, Charlotte Foster and Debbie Reed. Junior team members have not been chosen for this contest at this time; they are still working out and four of the six will be chosen on Friday. They will be selected from Kenny Blaneck, Marilyn Foster, Skeete Foster, Steven Foster, Allen Price and De-Neal Reed.

The senior Natural Resources Conservation Demonstration team members are Janis Igo and Pam McEntire. Their demonstration is based on range conservation practices that will improve the grass production of the range; it is based on studies in Sterling County and several West Texas Experiment Stations.

For the first time in a number of years, a junior livestock judging team is being entered in the contests. Team members are Tommy Bynum, Lee Wayne Igo, Jim Terry and Payton Wilson. They are being trained by Fred Igo, vocation agriculture teacher who is working them along with his FFA boys.

The contests will be held at various places at the college and in San Angelo. Awards will be presented starting at 1:30 in the College Auditorium. All who are interested are invited to attend.

An antivenom against the North American Eastern Coral snake is now available from the State Department of Health in Austin or the City Health Departments in Houston, San Antonio, and Corpus Christi, according to Jennie Kitching, Extension family life education specialist. Coral snakes are usually inoffensive but will bite if disturbed or handled roughly. Most bites occur on the fingers.

The antivenom is effective if administered within two hours of the bite. It can be secured by a physician or a hospital.

Pasteboard bands were placed on a number of pecan trees in John Brock's orchard this week to help determine the best time to spray for the annual invasion of the pecan casebearer. The bands are of lightweight corrugated pasteboard; one which does a good job is the old brooder guard used to confine small chicks to an area near a brooder.

The bands are applied near a point where the smooth bark joins the rough bark on branches. Larva of the casebearer spend the winter in a cocoon at the base of buds on the shoot. As new leaves and terminals appear, the larva move to these to feed. When it reach-

This meeting will be one of 820 that will be in progress in Baptist Churches all over the state of California.

Art Hopkins of San Angelo will be preaching here in the Baptist Church both services on April 28 and the morning service on May 5.

The Youth Choir of the Emmanuel Baptist Church of San Angelo, under the direction of Wayne Plunkett, will be in charge of the evening service May 5. A fellowship service will follow the evening service. The youth of the town are especially invited to attend this service, said Bro. Andy Daniels.

As maturity, it moves back down the branch to the rough bark where it completes the cycle and emerges as a moth which lays the eggs on the tip end of the small pecans. Instead of moving to the rough bark, the larva moves into the corrugations of the pasteboard. The bands, which are taped around the limb, are removed at different times and the larva placed in containers for observation. When they reach the moth stage, it is impossible to determine the best time to spray for control.

This method has been used for several years in the major pecan growing areas of the state but it is the first time we have used it here. Where used, it has been much more effective than looking for the tiny eggs on the tip ends of the small pecans.

The banquet, sponsored by the nine rural electric cooperatives in the district, will honor leaders from the twenty-two counties in Extension Service District 7. It will be held in the Brady High School cafeteria.

The Sterling County honorees are Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds Foster. They were selected by the executive committee of the 4-H club. Committee members are the officers of the club; president is Debbie Reed, vice-president is Allen Price, secretary is Charlotte Foster and Pam McEntire is reporter.

Mr. and Mrs. Foster have been instrumental in carrying out the 4-H club program in Sterling County for a number of years. They, as well as all the other parents of club members, have given of their time and energy in many ways.

They have furnished material and areas for working with the various 4-H club teams, aided in transporting the team members to contests at various places, acted as chairmen of the concession stand committee and the awards program committee, helped a number of club members at livestock shows in the area, furnished trucking facilities for getting animals to the shows, and are members of the District Adult Leaders Council. It is not possible to list all the assistance of the honorees but these are the major ones rendered.

The banquet is being planned by the Adult Leaders Council who secured the help of the sponsors. For a number of years, outstanding club members have been honored but the adult leaders who are so instrumental in the success of the club program have not had this recognition; in time, many more leaders who contribute their help can and will be honored. In Sterling County, 4-H club work is a family affair and it is appropriate that the executive committee saw fit to select a family team to receive the honor. Many more family teams are at work in the county but it was necessary to select only one team at a time.

The honorees will each receive a gold filled leaders pin and a certificate at the banquet. Other than the honorees, representatives of the sponsoring electric cooperatives, legislators, home demonstration agents and their husbands, county agricultural agents and their wives, and officers of the district council will attend.

NEW RESIDENTS OF COUNTY MUST VOTE IN COUNTY CLERKS OFFICE

County Clerk W. W. Durham has reminded new residents of Sterling County that they must vote in the county clerk's office by Tuesday, April 30, if they wish to participate in either the Democratic primary or the Republican primary to be held on May 4.

Any person who has lived in the county less than six months (who became a resident after November 3, 1967) must vote in the clerk's office during the period of April 15-30. He must be a registered voter either in this county or in the county of his former residence and must have lived in the state for a year. He will be required to present his registration certificate or to make an affidavit of its loss when he applies for a ballot.

A voter with less than six months' residence in the county will be able to vote on all statewide offices and on the referendum propositions on the ballot and will also be able to vote on district offices for districts in which he has six months' residence preceding the election, but he will not be permitted to vote in local races.

Democratic Primary Election Here Saturday, May 4

The Sterling County Democratic Primary Election will be held in Sterling on Saturday, May 4. The voting will be held in all boxes as usual except on the divide — where it will be held at D.D. Garrett's house. The County Commissioners named Garrett to handle the election as judge this year — due to the regular election judge, Mrs. Bill R. Bynum, being ineligible to help. Her husband is on the ballot as a candidate.

In addition to the voting on candidates names from governor on down to the precinct level, there are three referendum proposals listed. Voters may express their opinions on sale of liquor by the drink, pari-mutuel horse race betting and for or against a State Dairy Commission with powers to regulate price of milk.

Voters should vote by marking an X or some mark in the little square by the candidates names he favors. Do not mark out all others — just use the X. The ballot will have the following races and referendums on it for the primary:

The following propositions must be placed on the ballot for the Primary Election on May 4, 1968, in the following language:

1. "This proposition is only an expression of public opinion and has no force or effect as law."

FOR AGAINST —enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting the legal sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas only after approval by local option elections, and which sale would be subject to strict regulation, effective controls and taxation thereof."

2. "This proposition is only an expression of public opinion and has no force or effect as law."

FOR AGAINST —enactment by the Texas Legislature of a law permitting horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering on a local option basis; creating a Texas Horse Racing Board with the power to regulate pari-mutuel wagering on horse races; granting two percent of the total pari-mutuel pool each day to each county where there is a licensed race track; and apportioning among all other counties one-half of the total state net revenue from that source."

3. "This proposition is only an expression of public opinion and has no force or effect as law."



NEW SOCIAL SECURITY MILITARY FAMILIES

Of special interest to military men and women and their dependents is a provision in the new social security law which promises greater protection for them and their families.

Under the old law only a person's military base pay was counted toward social security benefits. Starting with January 1968, an additional \$100 will be counted for each month in which the person in military service is receiving active duty pay.

Since social security benefits are based on average earnings over a working career, you and your family may be able to receive higher benefits later because of the additional credits.

The Congress recognized that under the old law, the social security protection of a worker might be impaired during a period when he is in military service, because of the relatively low earnings covered under social security. This new provision seeks to take into account the value of payment in kind — such fringe benefits as food, housing, and clothing, medical services, which are in effect part of the serviceman's earnings.

These earnings credits will automatically be credited to your social security account, and you don't have to make any kind of application to receive them. They will not mean additional social security contributions from your paycheck, but will be attributed to the general funds of the Treasury.

That an election be held on the 11th day of May, 1968, in Sterling County, Texas, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Of Whatever political persuasion be the candidate or whatever party he represents, a man offering himself as President of the United States should start with some simple yet fundamental qualifications. People have the right to expect no less.

In these times of crises, of violence, of hatred and of horror, one thing is at least clear amidst the vast and menacing uncertainties of our day. This is that the political future belongs to the man who most truly embodies a sense of dignity, of judgment, of restraint, of action, of strength, of compassion, of calm resolve to restore to this nation the old and traditional values which seem largely to have been lost.

For some years, now, it seems that most everything fashionable has been sick—sick comedians, sick students, sick politicians, sick demonstrators and counter-demonstrators, sick books, periodicals and sick movies.

Old fashion qualities have not seemed fashionable at all in many quarters—patriotism, loyalty, love of family, responsibility in private and public conduct, consideration toward other men and other ideas—even in religion.

In this latter, it seems the "IN" pulpits have been ringing out, not so much with man's obligations to God as with the shrill, socio-political dogmas of political preachings. Many men in the "square" pulpits have called attention to the use of sanctuaries of noble cathedrals being used for bitter pseudo-dramas, for wild psychedelic so-called music and the gyrations of youth-nics, rather than for the somber measure and timeless liturgies of our ancient faiths.

Seemingly lost also is that sense of manners standing for mankind's true values next to morals themselves. Neither public nor private morality can long endure with that lesses but indispensable companion which used to be called "good taste."

"Student Activists" defy military draft, coaxed by professors publicly advising them on schemes to evade a common obligation of their generation while less privileged boys carry the guns and do the dying. While these intellectuals proclaim freedom for everything, they close their minds and ears to every opinion except their own. Many have encouraged university students to shout down and even physically menace men


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invited to their platforms for open discussions if views contrary to theirs are offered. Many such institutions owe their existence for no other reason than for the free and decent exchange of ideas.
