County PIK Participation Near 75 Percent

County Cotton Bids Not Acceptable

Bailey County's new Payment-In-Kind (PIK) crop reduction will draw 91.3 percent for the overall county participation in the 1983 farm programs in some form or fashion. According to Bailey County ASCS Executive Director Rusty Williamson, the PIK program averaged about 81 percent participation county-wide, with 74 percent for corn and feed grain, 62 percent for wheat and a whopping 93 percent for cotton. Williamson stated that the County ASCS office had expected a large turnout on the cotton sign-up from the very beginning.

At a public meeting held at the Muleshoe State Bank meeting room last Friday, March 11, whole base bids were opened by the Bailey County Committee, boosting the total number of acres accepted under whole base bids to 19,881 acres - an amount of 10,984 acres on feed grain and 8,897 on

wheat. Williamson told the Journal that no cotton bids were accepted due to the 98.8785 percent participation.

Corn and feed grain participation on whole base bids was 74 percent, while wheat was 62 percent with cotton set at 93 percent. As a county-wide program - 75 percent participation was the overall PIK figure.

A total of 81 whole base bids were approved for Bailey County producers on feed grain and corn, with bids ranging from 4.8 percent to 79 percent. Wheat bids numbered 67 and varied from 49.9 percent to 95 percent.

Williamson told the Journal that a total of ten bids were not acceptable due to figuring on acreage and another six were not accepted because of lack of proper signatures.

The County Director also told the Journal that the entire list of accepted whole base bidders was now posted in the hallway of the ASCS office building and that producers were encouraged to come in and review the list.

Williamson estimated that the 91.3 percent participation in the farm program would result in approximately 110,000 acres of

City, State Tax Rebates Down This Quarter

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday returned \$34.9 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities who levy the one-percent city sales tax.

Local sales tax payments for the city of Muleshoe for the period which ended on March 4, 1983 netted \$12,175.31 for this period, down by some \$3 thousand

from the \$15,207.07 of this same time last year. The 1983 payments for Muleshoe to date have reached \$54,742.49, up just slightly from the \$54,402.40 of 1982. This reflects a .63 percent change.

Morton, a city in Cochran County received a net payment this past period in the amount of \$1,712.96, down by almost half of the 1982 payment of \$3,213.44. Total 1983 payments for Morton have reached \$10,967.04, down from the 1982 payments to date of \$13,660.45 - a minus 19.72 percent.

In Hockley County, the City of Levelland was the recipient of \$31,545.73 in sales tax payments for the just past period. This figure shows to be down, somewhat, from the \$49,694.34 of the same time last year. Total 1983 payments to date for Levelland have reached \$175,453.00, down a bit from the \$200,281.42 of 1982 payments - a change of minus 12.40 percent.

The City of Littlefield received a check for \$10,670.61 as their net payment for the period ending 3/4/83. This is

down by some \$6 thousand dollars from the \$16,906.26 of 1982 at this same time. Total 1983 payments to

New Plat Okayed By City Council Members

In a regular City Council meeting Tuesday, March 22, Council members were presented with the plans for a new plat to be added to the City of Muleshoe, to be known as the Dee Clements Subdivision. The new building site is located adjacent to a paved street on Avenue K and is directly across the street from some houses which were financed with FHA and are similar in quality. It will contain ten lots. The plan presented to the Council will hinge on the fact that no building permits would be issued until sewer and water lines have been properly tied into the property.

Council made and passed a motion to accept the Clements plat with the stipulation on the water and sewer completion.

In addition to the regular agenda, a number of representatives from the Muleshoe Ministerial Alliance requested an audience with the Council regarding the "open container - open drinking" which was discussed at a regular council meeting several months ago. A spokesman for the group of ministers, Rev. Jimmy Low of the New Covenant Church inquired as to the status of the previous request that the Council do something to alleviate the problem. The minister was told by Dave

Marr, City Manager that a request had been sent to the Attorney General's office for a ruling on the matter, but that an answer had not yet been received. The members of the Alliance then requested that the Council take action of some type to stop drinking in and on public property. The Council voted to authorize City Manager Marr to draw up a draft for an ordinance in an effort to correct the problem. A meeting was suggested to go over the ordinance with both Council and the Ministerial Alliance as well, as soon as the drafting is done.

In other City business, bids were opened for a pick up truck to be purchased by the City, with two bids being submitted. The bid from Robert D. Green was accepted at a cost of \$7,089.00. Bids were also

Aldo Almanza and Martin Mendoza ran man for man in the 3200 meter run

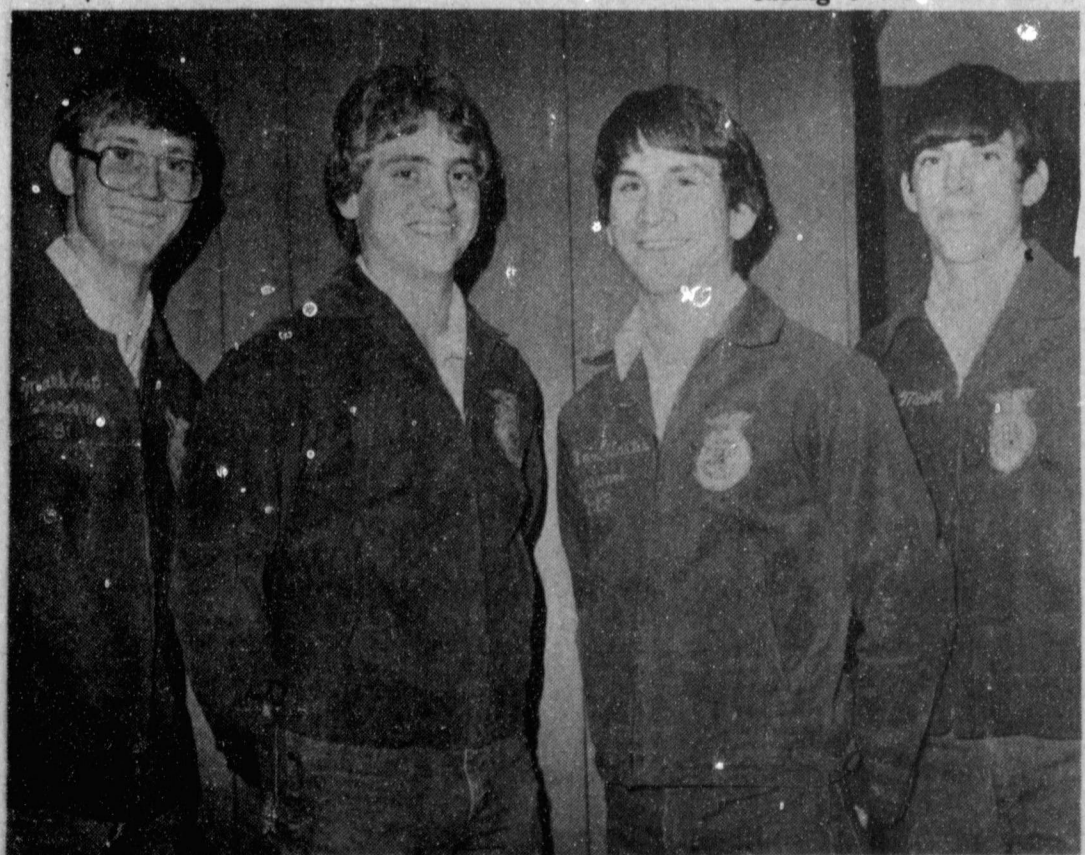
with Almanza placing first with 10:33.41 and Mendoza second with 10:40.39. Tony Rojas also placed in this event with a fifth place 10:55 run.

In the 400 meter relay, Muleshoe's team topped out at second place with

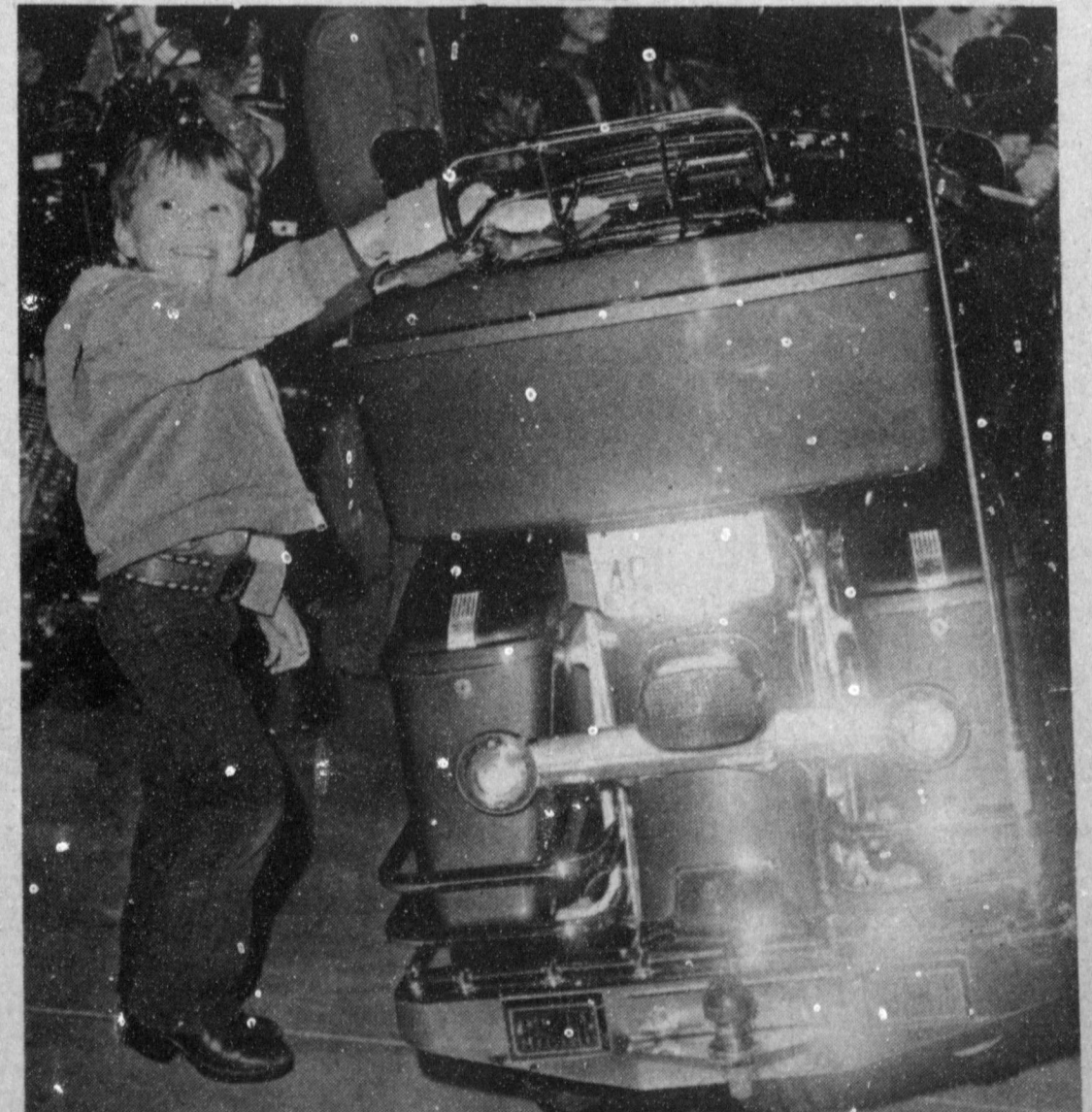

Raleigh St. Augustine Grass Good Choice

Homeowners putting in new lawns this spring may want to consider a fairly new variety of St. Augustine grass, "Raleigh," says Dr. Richard Doble, turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Raleigh St. Augustine grass is a vigorous, St. Augustine Decline (S.A.D.) resistant variety released by North Carolina State University. It is more cold tolerant and more shade tolerant than "Floratum" St. Augustine.

However, Doble emphasizes that Raleigh, unlike Floratum, is not resistant to chinch bugs.

As for appearance, an established lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine looks similar to a lawn of common St. Augustine grass. But Raleigh is slightly coarser and faster growing than the common type.

Doble recommends planting Raleigh wherever common St. Augustine grass can be grown. The exception might be along the Gulf Coast, and in

South Texas where low temperatures are not a problem, but chinch bugs are. In those areas, Floratum might still be the better grass for lawns.

In new lawns, Raleigh can be sodded to provide an "instant" lawn, or plugged on about 18-inch spacings to provide a cover in two or three months, says the specialist. To restore a St. Augustine lawn weakened with S.A.D., Doble suggests plugging 4-inch blocks of Raleigh directly into the lawn on about 1-foot spacings. Raleigh will cover the lawn after one complete growing season.

Raleigh has similar maintenance requirements to those of common St. Augustine grass, adds the specialist. Weekly mowing at a height of about 2 inches, spring and fall fertilization, and watering as needed to prevent severe wilting should produce an attractive lawn of Raleigh St. Augustine.

The master of ceremonies will be Dr. James H. Granberry. Granberry is the new President of the 20 county Scout Council.

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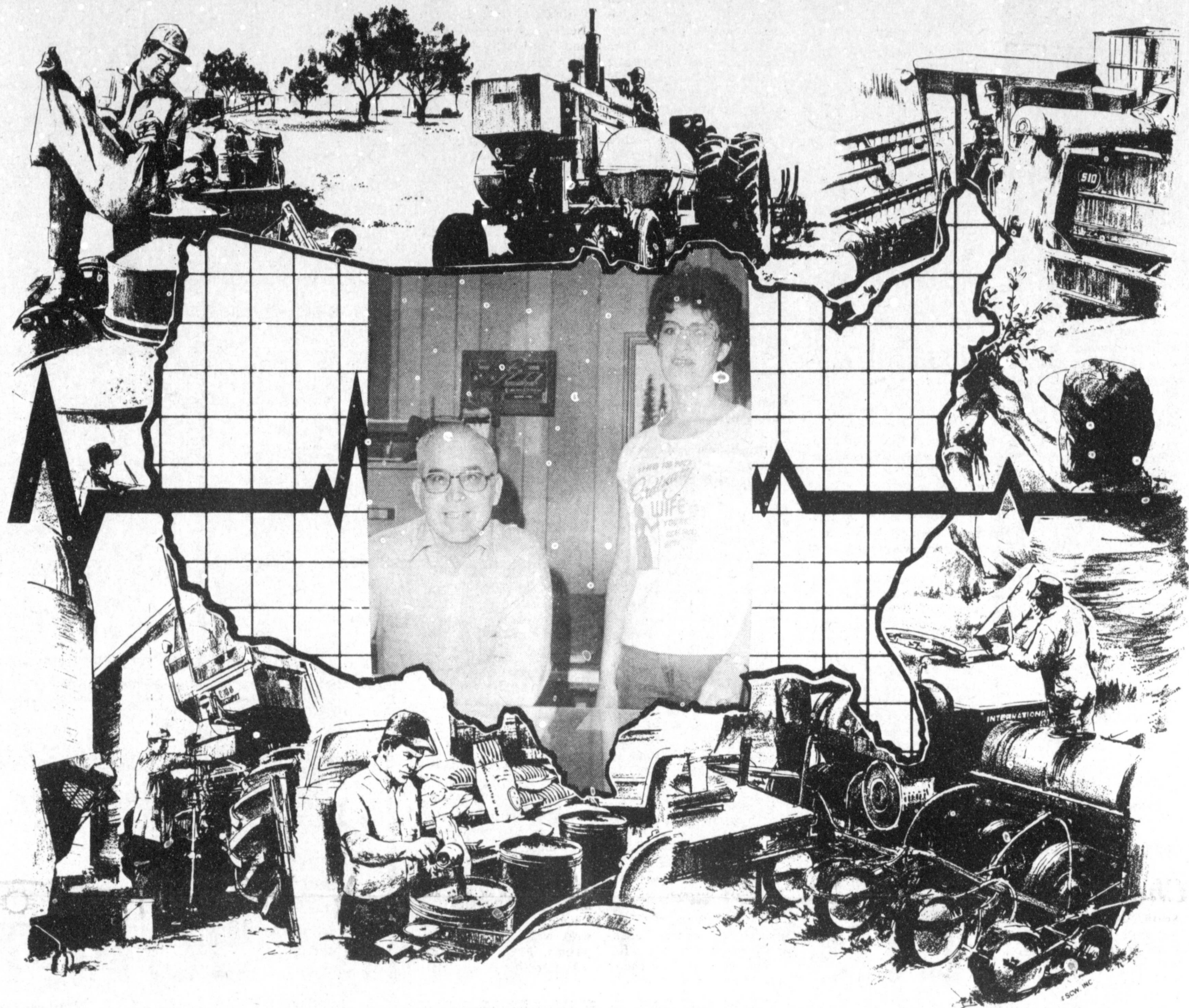

land being laid out of production in Bailey County this year. By putting a pencil to some figures, Williamson estimates that 1,367,772 bushels of corn will be distributed to Bailey County farmers through the 1983 farm programs. At \$5.25 cwt. the dollar amount would run close to \$4 million. He also estimated that 341,869 cwt. of grain sorghums being distributed through the program at \$4 per cwt. would bring the total dollar amount to \$1.3 million for grain sorghums. Wheat to be distributed in Bailey County should be about 362,907 bushels, which would run close to \$1.2 million dollars and cotton with 12,520,792 pounds times 47 cents per pound would be close to \$6 million. The end result of these figures is the fact that over \$12.5 million dollars will be paid out to Bailey County farmers through the 1983 farm programs. According to Williamson, this figure will come close to or will equal the total disaster and deficiency payments paid out to Bailey County farmers for the 1982 crop year. All prices used in these figures are estimated prices only.

Total county acreages signed in under the Reduced Acreage Program (RAP or 20 percent program) totaled 35,523 for Bailey. The total acreage count for the PIK or Payment - In - Kind Program for Bailey County reflects 260,163 acres. In whole base bidding, 19,881 acres were allowed into the Bailey County program.

Insofar as the PIK program goes in Bailey County, the regular farm program has a total of 12,604 enrolled base acres, of which some part will be laid out in grain sorghum acres. In the PIK program, a total of 62,551 feed grain acres are enrolled and in the whole base bids, 10,984 acres will lay idle on Bailey County feed grain acres.

On wheat acreages, a total of 12,281 acres of Bailey County farm land was

date for Littlefield amount to \$66,523.59, down just slightly from the \$67,461.32 of 1982 payments, a minus 1.39 percent change.

In Parmer County, the City of Friona received a net payment this period of \$1,759.68, way down from the \$7,215.09 at the same time last year. Total 1983 payments to date for Friona are \$21,057.82, down from the \$28,659.76 of 1982, a minus 26.52 percent change.

"Statewide, these payments are running 4.5 percent behind last year," Bullock said. "This decline in both local and state receipts from the sales tax was part of the reason I have lowered my estimate of available state revenues."

Houston received the largest check--\$7 million, but receipts from the local sales tax were down 31.5 percent from the \$10.3 million check Houston received last March. Dallas got the next biggest check--\$4.2 million, down 19 percent from March 1982.

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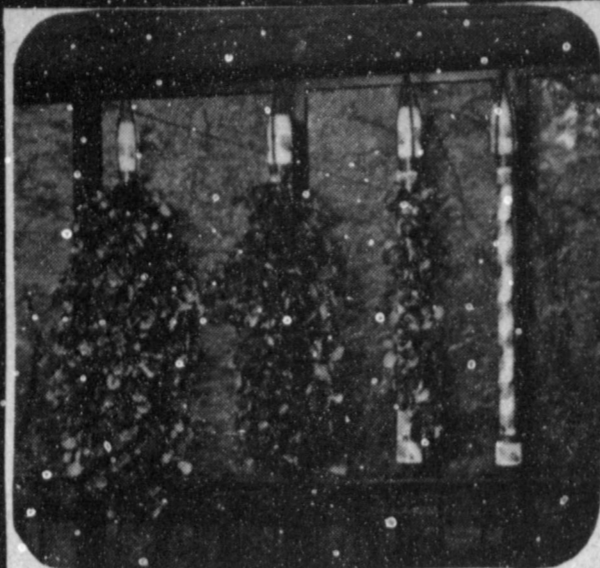
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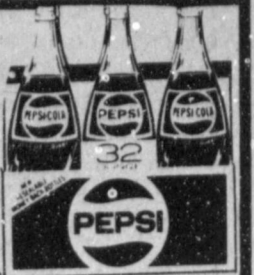
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Regina Finke At Damron Drug

Sam and his wife, Elaine, are both private pilots, and Sam enjoys hunting and photography.

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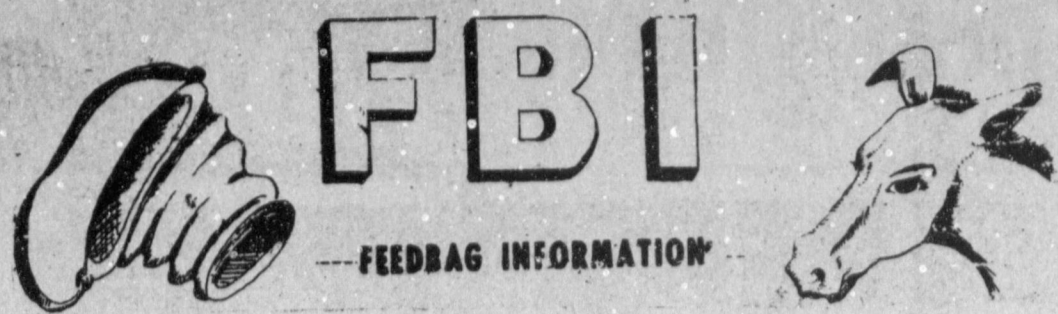

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Grape Growers To Gather In Lubbock Meet

Commercial and backyard grape growers will gather here March 24-26, for the annual Texas Grape Day conference. The three-day educational program will include a tour of South Plains vineyards and wineries, general sessions of interest to all grape growers, concurrent sessions on grape cultivation and wine making, and a taste of Texas wines.

The meeting at the Holiday Inn at the Civic Center, 801 Avenue Q, is being conducted by the Texas Grape Growers Assn., the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of the Texas A&M University System.

The program will open Thursday, March 24, with a tour of six area vineyards

and two wineries. The group will leave the headquarters motel at 8:30 a.m. Stops will include the research vineyard at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, the Cox family vineyard and winery, the vineyard of Paul and Shirley Crosnoe, lunch at the vineyard of Allen and Leta Hagen, the Llano Estacado Vineyard and Winery, and the Scott Slaughter vineyard.

Association president Dale Bettis, who owns a vineyard and winery at Cypress Mills and manages a vineyard at Van Horn, will open the general session at 8:30 a.m. Friday, March 25. It will feature discussions of vineyard winery management by Bill Ward, Napa, Calif.; small and medium vineyard design and cost by Dick Vine of Mississippi State University; a banker's perspective of the Texas wine industry, by Hershah (cq) Timmons of the Central Texas Pro-

duction Credit Assn., Georgetown; and tax and estate planning by Dr. Wayne Hayenga, Extension

Devil's Food Cake

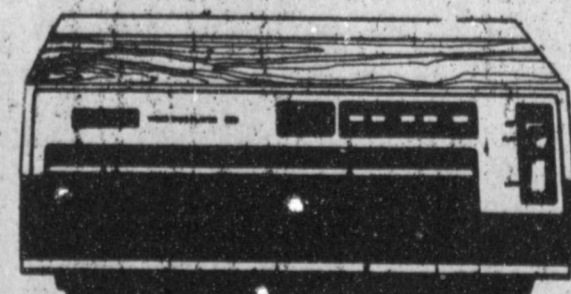
1/2 c butter

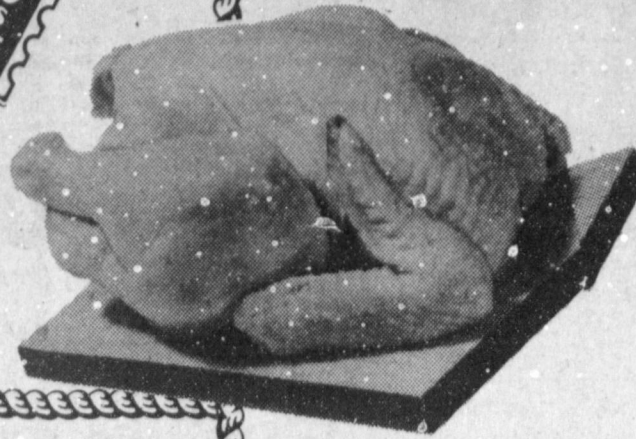
