## Nixon Leads by 19 Votes in Sterling

**Nixon 170; Humphrey 151; Wallace 54**

Split-ticket voters gave Republican Richard Nixon 170 votes here in Tuesday's general election, Humphrey 151 and Wallace 54. But Democrat Preston Smith got 260 votes to 104 for Republican Paul Eggers for governor.

All other state races gave the Demos large majorities. In the legislative race Democrat George Baker, newspaperman of Fort Stockton got 256 votes and Jim Kent, young Republican of Wickett, received 89 votes.

Sterling went as did the state and nation. Nixon won the presidency. Smith the governorship, and so on.

In the amendments, Sterling voters approved four and rejected ten.

Locally there was no opposition to the Democrats in district and county races. Therefore, winning handily were congressman Omar Burleson, district judge Joe Mays, district attorney Frank Dick-ey, Jr., county judge Jake K. Martin, sheriff, tax assessor-collector Jim Cantrell, county attorney Worth Durham, county commissioners Cledis Smith and Billy Ralph Bynum, justice of the peace E. R. Edwards and, of course, state school board member Frank Pool.

Sterling County has had no new screwworm cases reported at the Mission laboratory during the last nine days. No reports on nonscrewworm samples have been received during that time. This is the first time in recent weeks that the county has not had cases identified at the laboratory. The count this year remains at 29 positive cases of screwworms and nineteen non screwworm.

Even though there have been no new cases, livestockmen are urged to maintain their vigilance until cold weather removes the possibility of screwworms. One new worm missed now could mean an early outbreak next year. It is conceivable that the flies could overwinter in pumphouses, straw stacks, or in barns and cause an outbreak next spring. Thus, we join the eradication program officials in urging that producers keep up their fight against this expensive pest.

Sterling County livestock producers, along with about 40,000 others in Texas, will be receiving an important questionnaire during the last half of November. The questionnaire will come from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin and should be returned as soon as possible.

The information gained from the questionnaire will be the basis for the official estimates of livestock numbers—cattle, hogs, and poultry—for the state and each county. A survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December. These estimates are important in providing an unbiased picture of Texas' agriculture.

Much of the vegetation on the ranges in Sterling County ceased to grow sometime ago because of the shortage of moisture. The coming of cold weather and killing frosts will put a stop to all the remaining growth. The dry vegetation could pose a fire problem on the county's ranges.

Everyone—rancher and others alike—is urged to be particularly careful with fire during the next few weeks. Hunting season opens this weekend which adds to the problem.

Just two weeks ago, four fires occurred in the south portion of the county. Fortunately, these fires were all extinguished before much damage was done. The fire in San Angelo on Tuesday of this week when a man was burning weeds under the supervision of the fire department illustrates what can happen. Even an observed fire can get out of control quickly with disastrous results at times.

Everyone is urged to be careful with their matches and cigarettes. Caution your hunters about this—many of them become so interested in their hunt for the "big one" that they may forget about their smoking materials. It would not be a bad idea to keep a livestock sprayer equipped for a fire. Many times, just a little water at the right time can be valuable in fighting a fire. The volunteer fire department is ready but it takes them time to get from town to the fire—time that might well be very valuable in fighting a fire.

The tank full of water at the ranch might well stop the fire before it gets out of control.

## County Gets Hill-Burton Grant

**\$186,000 for Nursing Home and Hospital**

Sterling County was granted \$186,100 in Hill-Burton money Monday for nursing home and improvements to the Sterling County Hospital in action at Austin. The nursing home grant was for \$165,000 and the hospital improvements grant was for \$21,100, according to County Judge J. K. Martin. John Allen, architect, of Austin is expected to proceed with the construction, etc.

Sterling County sold the local county issued bonds here recently. They sold \$185,000 of the bonds to a bonding company and the county itself bought \$15,000 of the issue. All this makes a total of \$386,100 available for the project if needed.

In February of this year, Sterling voters approved the \$200,000 bond issue by 226 to 10, an overwhelming vote. Due to technicalities, the election had to be reheld in May and passed 169 to 13.

The home or extended care facility will be built next to the present hospital and will share some of the facilities mutually. The county had been working on the home plans since the middle of 1967 and had put in an application for a Hill-Burton grant when the plans and specifications had been drawn up by architect John Allen. Mr. and Mrs. Wm. M. Collier of Austin, (he now heads the Hill-Burton granting group) were here last winter and he explained how the grants were made and passed by the committee. The Colliers were guests at the Lions Club and he talked on the program.

All Sterling is elated over the grant and now everyone hopes the project will proceed with speed and become a reality.

**Dept. of Public Safety Needs Patrolmen**

Patrolmen Browne and Lange announced today that the Texas Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified young men for the position of Patrolman with the Department.  
Patrolman Browne said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 35 who are of sound physical condition, have at least a high school education or equivalent, have vision of not less than 20-40 and have high moral standards should contact him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately".

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited—Driver License, License and Weight and Highway Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited.

Upon graduation from the 18 week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the Academy, he will receive a salary of \$500.00 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other subjects.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern retirement privileges and travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performances of their duties.

Patrolman Lange urged interested young men to get their application today and take the examination before all vacancies are filled.

**REWARD NOTICE**

**Social Security News**

People who sign up for social security only to gain Medicare coverage are often amazed to learn that they will also be drawing some checks for the year, according to Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

For instance, a person entitled to a monthly benefit of \$122.90 who expects to earn \$3000 in 1968 would draw a check of \$17.40 for June, 1968, and full checks for the rest of the year.

"This is possible because of the liberalized retirement test under the present social security law," Mr. Moellering said.

"A social security beneficiary can earn \$1680 per year and draw his checks every month. If his earnings are \$2880 or less, an amount equal to one-half the earnings between \$1680 and \$2880 is subtracted from total benefits payable for the year. If earnings are over \$2880, an additional one dollar for every dollar over \$2880 is subtracted from benefits payable.

"There has been no change in the provision that a person can draw a check for each month that he is age 72, regardless of his total earnings for the year."

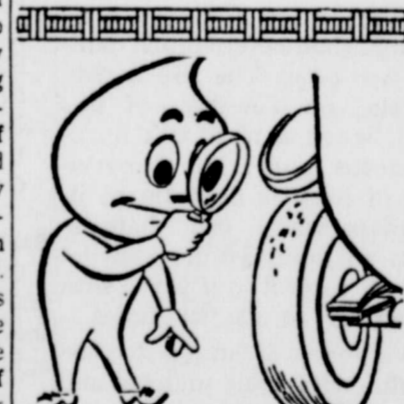

The "length of marriage" requirement in social security's definition of "widow", "widower", and stepchild of a deceased worker" has been changed, reports Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office. A widow, widower, or stepchild may now qualify for social security benefits based on a marriage that has been in existence for only 9 months just before the death of the worker.

Mr. Moellering added that in some cases a marriage that has lasted for as little as 3 months may qualify the survivor. These are cases involving accidental death or death in the line of duty in the uniformed services.

Benefits under this change in the law were first payable in February, 1968. Any person who has been previously disqualified because a marriage had not been in effect long enough should contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

 5. IF IT IS A HOUSE FIRE CLOSE ALL DOORS AND WINDOWS YOU CAN GET TO SAFELY, THEN GET IN THE CLEAR AND STAY AT THE SCENE. ONCE YOU ARE OUTSIDE THE HOUSE, DO NOT GO BACK IN THE BUILDING!  
 WHEN THE SIREN BLOWS  
 1. STAY OFF THE STREET OR ROAD BEING USED BY THE FIRE TRUCKS AND FIREMEN.

**Breakfast Browsing**

CEREAL packages have taken on a new look. The backs of many Post Cereal packages are a miniature recipe file containing wonderful new recipe ideas for ways to use and serve cereal.  
 Did you know that bran and prune flakes are delicious served with sour cream or yogurt? All you do is stir enough milk into sour cream or yogurt until it's the right consistency, pour the mixture over the cereal and sprinkle brown sugar on top.  
 Another flavorful way to use bran and prune flakes is with sweet potatoes. This casserole would be the perfect accompaniment to roast pork or ham.  
**Sweet Potato Casserole**  
 One 1-lb. 2-oz. can sweet potatoes; one 8½-oz. can crushed pineapple; 3 tablespoons butter, melted; 1 slightly beaten egg; 2 tablespoons brown sugar; ½ teaspoon salt; 1½ cups bran and prune flakes.  
 Drain and mash potatoes. Blend in pineapple, 2 tablespoons butter, egg, sugar, and salt. Gently stir in ½ cup cereal. Bake in a 1-quart casserole at 350° about 20 minutes. Mix remaining butter and cereal; sprinkle over top of casserole. Makes 4 servings.
