Sterling County 4-H Club exhibitors did very well in the competition during the opening weekend of the State Fair of Texas at Dallas. As a result of the judging over the weekend, they brought home one champion banner and two reserve champion rosettes. Judging in this division was held Saturday afternoon with J.E. (Spud) Tatum of Rock-springs as judge.

In the Junior Rambouillet judging, Becky Hodges had the champion ram with her ram lamb. Another ram lamb placed third in the same class. Becky also had the first place pen of three ram lambs. In the ewe division, Becky had the reserve champion ewe of the junior show with her second place ewe lamb; she also had the seventh place ewe lamb. Her pen of three ewe lambs placed second and her lamb flock of three ewes and one ram placed second.

Amy Hodge showed in the open Rambouillet show held on Sunday morning. The 1969 Open Rambouillet show at Dallas was the largest held there in a number of years with five breeders in competition.

Amy had the first and fifth place ram lambs and the first place pen of three ram lambs. Her yearling ram placed third.

In the ewe classes, Amy had the third and fourth place ewe lambs and the second place pen of three ewe lambs. She had the second and third place yearling ewes and the first place pen of three yearling ewes. Her yearling ewe was selected as reserve champion ewe of the show.

Five Sterling County 4-H Club members will be taking part in the Junior Livestock Show held during the State Fair next week. All will have entries in the market lamb division of the show. Judging in the lamb show will be held on Wednesday, October 15 with Myron Hillman as judge.

Club members with entries in the lamb show are: Dwayne Davis, two lambs; Russell Davis, two lambs; Scott Davis, one lamb; Charlotte Foster, two lambs; and Janis Igo, two lambs. The lambs will leave for Dallas Monday morning. Sale of the prize winning lambs will be held Saturday morning.

## Brush Control Range Tour Here October 14

Sterling County ranchers and businessmen are invited to participate in the West Texas Brush Control Research Tour which will spend Thursday morning, October 14 in Sterling County, according to Arthur Barlemann, Jr., county agent. The group of researchers on the tour will represent chemical companies, machinery companies, research people and ranchers interested in brush control practices being evaluated in the state.

Local participants invited to join the group which should arrive in Sterling City about 8:30 a.m. Tuesday morning at the west side of the courthouse. They are invited to join the tour for a look at some chemical research plots on the Reynolds Foster ranch and to see some of the results of mechanical control methods on the Santa Fe ranch which S. K. Horwood owns. The group will depart Sterling City around 11:00 a.m. for the Spade Ranch where they will be served a chuck wagon lunch by the ranch and then to see the results of control methods using fire to control mesquite. Area ranchers and others are invited to make this portion of the tour as well as the tour in Sterling County. Charles Allen, district conservationist with the SCS, will conduct the tour in the absence of the county agent who will be at the state fair with junior livestock show entrants.

The group is spending the week in a number of West Texas counties evaluating the different methods of brush control. Primary interest is on mesquite but other species are being studied also. In addition to chemical, fire, and mechanical control methods, biological methods are being investigated. Sponsor of the recent research plots is the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association while others have been in under study for several years and are the result of the cooperation of chemical companies, machinery companies, Experiment stations, Extension Service, and rancher's efforts to find means of controlling brush. C. E. Fisher, professor in charge of brush control research with the Texas A&M University Experiment Station at Lubbock, is tour leader.

Mrs. Orr spent three years as an educational missionary in Angola, Portuguese, West Africa, after studying language in Lisbon, Portugal for six months.

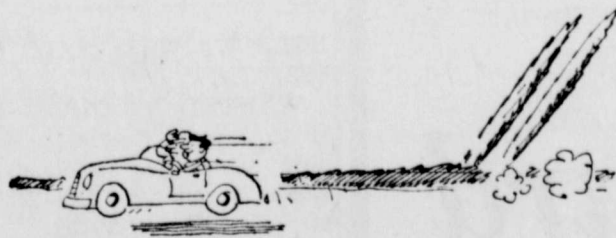

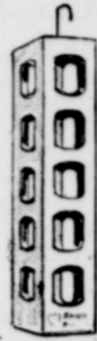

The Texas Highway Department is planning the improvement of U.S. 87 from 3.6 miles northwest of the Coke County line, southeast a distance of approximately 8.2 miles to the Tom Green County line.

Improvements will consist of construction of a four lane divided highway along the location of the existing highway and the utilization of the old railroad right-of-way for the north bound traffic lanes. No additional right-of-way will be required.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office at Sterling City, Texas. Also, the drawings show the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with counties of Coke and Sterling located at Robert Lee and Sterling City.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic, and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office on or before October 24, 1969.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be published about the date and location of the hearing.

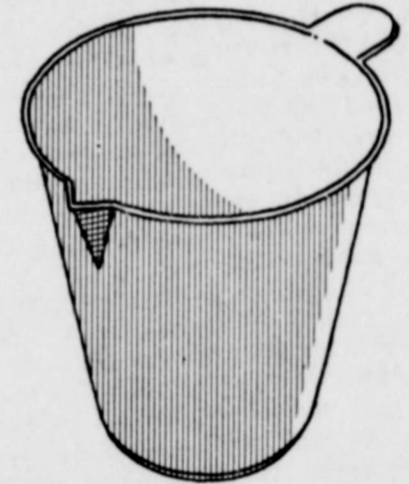

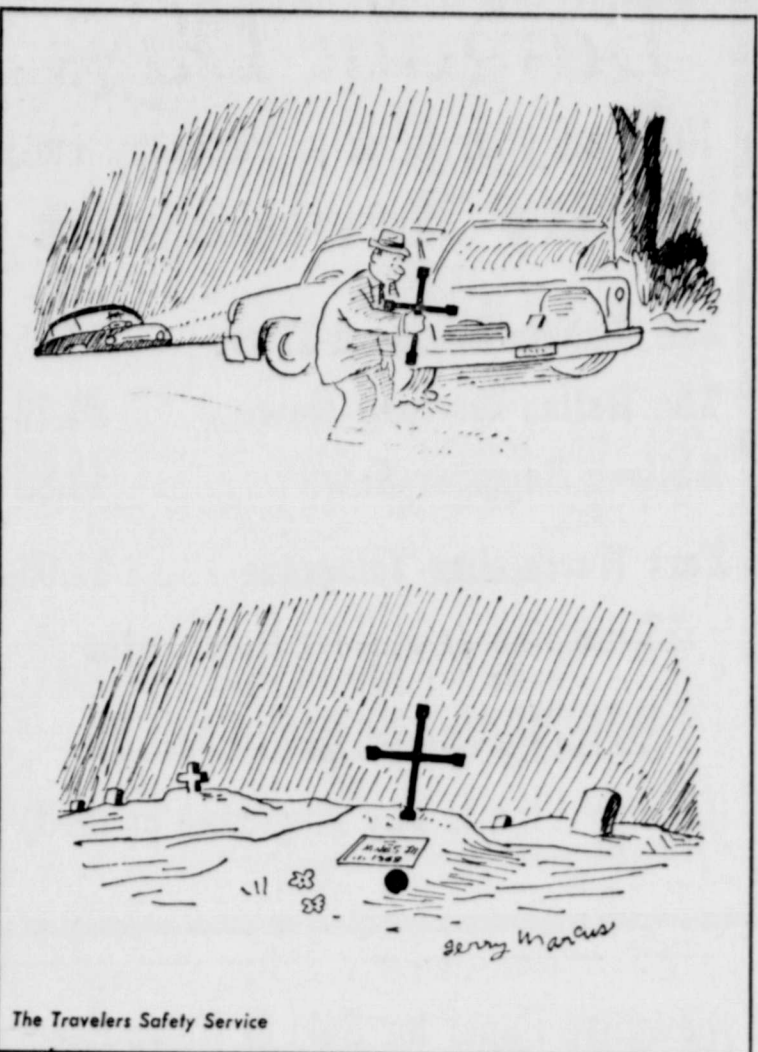

### Civil Service FEDERAL CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The announcements are:

1. Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists. GS grades 9 through 12. Covered are such positions as Economist, Social Science Analyst, Social Science Program Specialist, Sociologist, Historian, Anthropologist, Manpower Analyst, Social Work Program Specialist, and additional closely related positions in other social science fields. Many of the opportunities are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and in foreign countries. Some are expected to increase by about 8 or 9 percent the middle of this year. There are no written test requirements. Applicants will be rated on the basis of professional experience, education, and training. 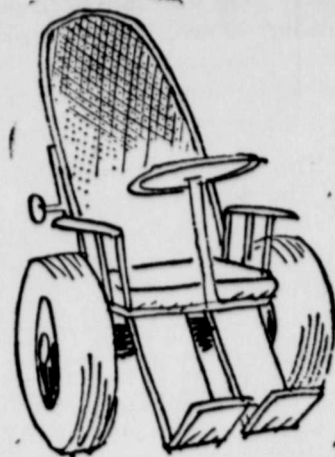
