Born on a farm near Bells, Tenn., Clark, Cross Plains; Pierce Shackel- he received only a common school education. He began work in a printing office at 16 and spent the remaining years of his life in the newspaper business.

Moving to Honey Grove in 1886, Mr. Lowry began editing the Honey Grove Signal in 1893. When the county voted dry thirty-five years ago, Mr. Lowry wrote an editorial in which he extrolled the virtures of buttermilk and urged all people to drink it. This editorial was reprinted by a large number of leading papers in the North and East and by nearly every paper in Texas. From that time on Mr. Lowry was affectionately known by his friends as Buttermilk Jim.

The Signal was consolidated in 1929 with the Honey Grove Citizen and, with Hugh Moyer Jr., Lowry since has been editor-half owner.
