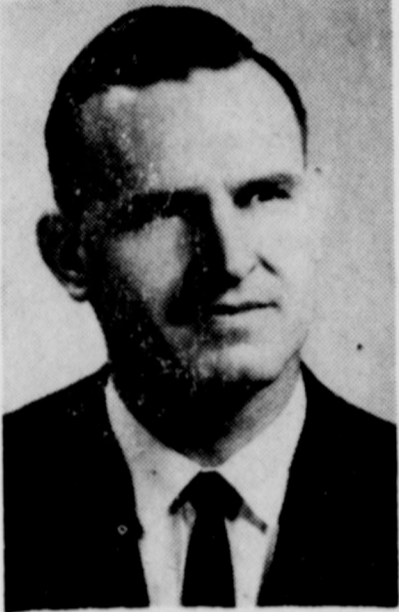

Helping in the Baptist meeting or revival here October 26-November 2, will be Bruce Hudspeth, song leader. Bruce graduated from the University of Missouri in 1959 and also received a M.R.E. from the Southwestern Seminary in May, 1959.

The nine lambs exhibited by the Sterling County 4-H Club members sold in the auction sale at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas brought thirty-eight cents per pound. Total weight of the lambs sold was 843 pounds after the show deducted a three percent shrink. Value of the lambs sold through the auction was \$368.34.

Janis Igo's second place Columbia lamb and Charlotte Foster's fourth place cross-bred lamb were sold individually through the sale while the remainder were sold in lots or groups. The Fair sale committee guaranteed thirty-eight cents on all lambs that placed in the show. Resale on the lambs was twenty-nine cents; the buyer was Armour and Company.

There is an invasion of fall army worms in Sterling County but they have not reached the destructive stage here as they have in some areas. In a large part of the small grain producing area south of us, they have caused extensive damage and the same is true of the wheat belt north of us.

The full grown armyworm varies in color from tan or green to nearly black. The most prominent identifying character is the inverted Y on the front of the head. Some are nearly slick while others will have a great number of bristles or hairs but the inverted Y is always present. The color changes as the worm matures and the black usually is the fully mature worm. Normally, the worm feeds for about twenty days during which time it reaches a length of 1½ inches. The life cycle from egg to the adult, or candlemoth stage, requires from 28 to 52 days, depending on the weather.

If the worms are damaging grass or small grain, Sevin can be used as a spray on small grain or grass or lawns around the home. In many of the areas where the infestation is large, the worms have caused extensive damage to pastures as well as the grain fields. Spraying has been done in many of these areas but reports say that the number is so large that they have not been able to control the invasion.

In the last half Jesse Lujan scored on runs of 25 yards, 10 yards, and 10 yards to complete his total of 5 TD's for the evening. Albert Estrada and Dwayne Davis each made an extra point attempt good for the remainder of the Eagle scoring.

## Estate Planning Meet Set for Next Week

A meeting on estate planning and inheritance taxes will be held in the community center next Tuesday, October 28, at 7:30 p.m., according to Arthur Barlemann Jr., county agent. The public is invited to attend.

Estate planning can save for you and your heirs. Yet all too often, this planning is neglected in the rush of everyday living and the need is apparent too late in many instances. There are a number of steps that can be taken to insure that your estate will be more beneficial to your heirs. Some of the steps that can be taken will be discussed by Robert Kensing, area management specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service. Kensing is headquartered in San Angelo. He has conducted a number of meetings on estate planning, income tax, and other subjects dealing with management and economics in this section of the state.

Kensing will discuss estate and inheritance tax reduction, allowable deductions that may be used, gifts, and the value of wills. In addition, he will present information on the handling of land, livestock, cash, stocks and bonds, and other possessions of an estate. One of the topics will deal with the value of land and some of the other possessions of an estate and how they influence the estate; there are some misconceptions about some of these and Kensing will explain some of the provisions of the laws regarding these.

Material and forms that might be useful in estate planning will be available at the meeting. In addition, Kensing will also work through examples of planning using local situations and information. There will also be time for questions on the subject from the audience.

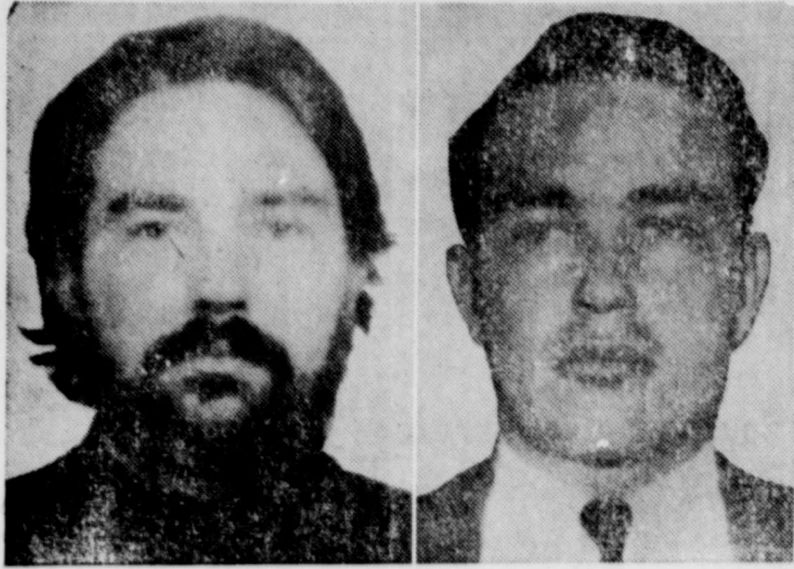
Pat Foster had the 9th place purebred Suffolk lamb and Tommy Bynum had the 23rd

**WANTED BY THE FBI**



**CAMERON DAVID BISHOP**

Cameron David Bishop, a violence-minded college revolutionary who is charged with the sabotage of war utilities in the dynamiting of Colorado power transmission towers, is on the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

Between January 20 and 28, 1969, he allegedly was responsible for dynamiting four transmission line towers in Colorado supplying power to defense plants. Wreckage from one blast damaged property nearly a mile away and dozens of square miles near Golden, Colorado, were partially blacked out. A Federal warrant issued at Denver, Colorado, on February 14, 1969, charges Bishop with the destruction of war utilities.

Bishop, who is reputedly an active member of the Students for a Democratic Society, a loudly militant "New Left" group opposed to U.S. involvement in Vietnam and existing government policies, has reportedly voiced a desire to live in Cuba.

He is known to associates as a revolutionist or anarchist who believes in violence to secure social reforms and was given a discharge from the Army for unsuitability after being located, while a deserter, as a mental patient in a hospital. He reportedly has a violent temper, has reportedly bragged of using drugs, including LSD, and was convicted of assault and battery in Colorado in 1965. He has allegedly stated his willingness to kill a police officer and has reportedly possessed hand guns, including a .357 magnum, in addition to rifles and dynamite.

A white American, born at Pueblo, Colorado, on November 7, 1942, he is 5'8" to 5'9" tall, weighs 155 to 165 pounds, has brown eyes, dark brown hair, a stocky build and a medium complexion. He has worn a beard, long hair and long sideburns in the past. A tattoo of a skunk holding a mirror appears on his right forearm. He has worked as an assistant credit manager, auto parts manager, coffee house operator, laborer, mine worker and truck driver. Consider Bishop armed and extremely dangerous.

Covered are such positions as Economist, Social Science Analyst, Social Science Program Specialist, Sociologist, Historian, Anthropologist, Manpower Analyst, Social Work Program Specialist, and additional closely related positions in other social science fields. Many of the opportunities are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and in foreign countries. Some are in other parts of the United States. Annual starting salaries currently range from \$8,462 to \$12,174. They are expected to increase by about 9 percent in the middle of this year. There are no written test requirements. Applicants will be rated on the basis of professional experience, education, and training. 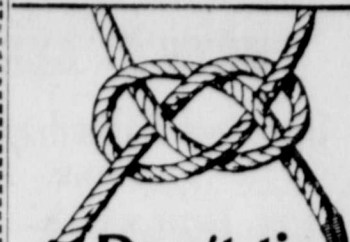

The Hill Country Angus Association Bull Sale will be held on Saturday, November 1, 1969 at the Gillespie Livestock Auction Co. (off the San Antonio Highway) Fredericksburg, Texas.

Judging of sale animals will begin promptly at 9:00 a. m. Sale time is set for 1:00 p.m. 94 bulls, including 42 bulls that were selected from an offering of 500 bulls for the production gain program. These bulls were weighed and fed together in a large pen on a high roughage ration formulated by Texas A&M University for 140 days. Hence each bull was on his own merits from the start.

One fourth brothers to the State Fair 1968 Reserve Champion Steer, and half brothers to the 1969 West Texas Fair Grand Champion bull. There are half brothers to the bull which has been producing many champions in Missouri and some top blood lines

in the state. There will be 19 sons of one of the first certified meat sires in the state. Over 80 percent of the bulls have certified performance records on a 40 day gain test.
