





Eighty dogs and cats were immunized for rabies in June. This is an annual program held in cooperation with a nearby veterinarian. Interest in this program was high because of the fact that at least eight persons took the series of shots here as a result of exposure to known rabid animals.

Considerable time was devoted to the screwworm eradication program during the year. One case of screwworms was confirmed in the county early in June. One newsletter on the program was sent to all producers and fourteen news articles written on the program.

The Extension program in the county was made possible through the cooperation of many individuals, both men and women. Without their cooperation and help, the program would not have been possible. They are responsible for the success of the program which has been briefly summarized here.

The traditional retirement age in private industry is 65. The gold watch is presented at farewell ceremonies, the company pension begins, and social security and Medicare become a part of the person's life.

But what is a person wants or needs to retire earlier? Recognizing that for various reasons employment cannot always continue until age 65, social security provides for early retirement at age 62. Benefits which begin before age 65 are reduced proportionately month by month for each month before age 65. The full reduction at age 62 is 20 percent.

However, a person who begins receiving checks at age 62 would be about age 77 before he begins losing money by having taken the smaller amount at age 62 rather than waiting until age 65.

Any person approaching age 62 who is contemplating early retirement or partial retirement, or whose earnings have been rather low in recent years, should get in touch with social security to explore the possibility of getting early retirement insurance payments.
