Eleven Sterling County 4-H Club members have nineteen lambs, four pigs, six registered Rambouillets, and one group of range ewe lambs entered in the Junior Division of the San Angelo Fat Stock Show. Two also have registered breeding sheep entered in the open show.

Participants in the San Angelo Show and their entries are: Charles Blank, one finewool lamb; Patti Bynum, two finewool lambs and two crossbred lambs; Dwayne Davis, two finewool lambs; Russell Davis, two Hampshire pigs; Scott Davis, two Hampshire pigs; Charlotte Foster, two crossbred lambs; Amy Hodges, two crossbred lambs, six Rambouillets, and a partner in a group of range ewe lambs in the Junior Show, and four Hampshire breeding sheep and four Rambouillets in the open show; Becky Hodges, two crossbred lambs and a partner in a group of range ewe lambs in the Junior Show as well as ten Rambouillets in the open show; Larry Horwood, two finewool lambs; Ray Sparks, two finewool lambs; and Melinda Terry, two crossbred lambs.

The San Angelo show opens for its thirty-seventh annual run on Wednesday, March 11. The lambs will be sifted and weighed on that date. The pigs will also be weighed and sifted on the opening day. In addition, the Open Rambouillet show and the Hampshire sheep will be judged.

The fat lamb show will begin at 8:30 on Thursday morning. This will be the day that the majority of the local exhibitors will be involved in during the show.

On Friday, the pig show will start at 8:00 a.m. as will the Junior Rambouillet Breeding Sheep Show. The range ewe lamb show will start at 8:30.

The livestock judging contest and the plant judging contest will be held Saturday. Sale of all the market animals in the show will also be held Saturday beginning at 8:00 a.m.

Two Sterling County 4-H Club members will be taking part in the calf scramble at Sunday afternoon's performance of the rodeo. Dwayne and Russell Davis have been approved and will take part in the scramble. This event, twenty boys with rope halters will be trying to catch ten calves, is always enjoyed by the audience and the participants.

The officials of the screw-worm eradication program report that 1970 thus far has found the United States with no confirmed cases of worms. In Mexico however, many cases are being found. The state of Sonora had a total of twenty-four cases during the week ending February 25. Sterile fly treatment is underway in many states in Mexico and South Texas as well.

Last week, officials report they had a new type sample when one taken from a buffalo was sent to the laboratory. It was taken from one of the buffalo in the San Antonio zoo and was negative.

## WORTH B. DURHAM Worth Durham Man of Many Missions

(From American Sheep Producers Council) Worth Durham, Sterling City, Texas, is a man with many missions. He is a rancher, lawyer and banker.

On his ranch near Sterling City, he raises about 1,000 head of Rambouillets plus about 100 head of commercial Herefords.

In his legal practice, he specializes in land and mineral law. He also holds the position of Sterling County Attorney.

Durham is a past president of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association and is a vice president of the First National Bank of Sterling City.

The affable man of many talents also finds time to serve as vice chairman of the Lamb Advisory Committee of the American Sheep Producers Council headquartered at Denver, Colorado.

Recently, he accompanied members of the committee on an educational tour to southern California. The group met with lamb feeders in the Imperial Valley; visited with the U. S. Navy Commissary School in San Diego; toured the meat market headquarters of three Los Angeles retail chains; discussed meat packing operations with officials of the American Sheep Co. and Swift and Co. in Los Angeles; and inspected the dining facilities at the University of California at Los Angeles.

The American Sheep Producers Council is the national promotion and advertising organization for lamb and wool. Its purpose is to promote the two major products of the sheep industry, wool and lamb. This is done under the names of the American Wool Council and the American Lamb Council. The ASPC is supported by almost every sheepman in the U.S. It is governed by a board of directors and a delegate body of sheepmen representing the 20 state and area sheep producing sections in the country and by every sheep and wool organization.

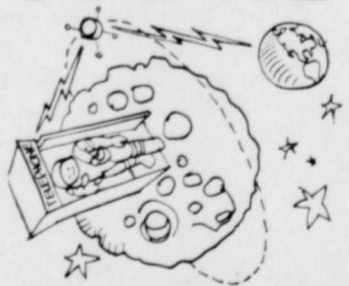

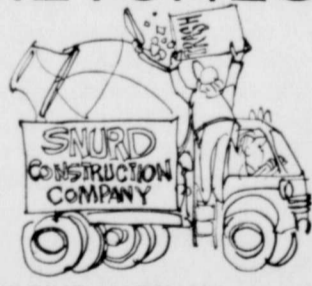

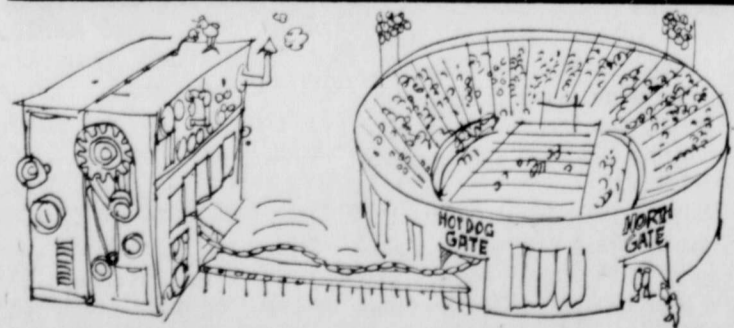

**Social Security News**

Want to get that first social security on time? "Everyone does, but not enough people do anything about it," says Ted F. Moellering, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office.

According to Mr. Moellering, every person who files an application for social security benefits will be asked to present certain proofs. Most applicants will also be asked to give the exact amount of earnings for the past year and for the current year.

Most persons do not bother to find out ahead of time exactly what they will need. "George waits until the day he files an application," said Mr. Moellering. "Then he has to go back home and dig around for records, or write letters requesting the necessary documents, causing a delay in the processing of his claim.

A claim for social security benefits may be filed as early as three months before entitlement to benefits.

Mr. Moellering suggests that claimants get in touch with the social security office several months before this three month period to find out ahead of time what proofs and information will be needed.

"The satisfied applicant," continued Mr. Moellering, "is the one who does this, and consequently has all necessary proofs and information with him. The result—everything is completely taken care of during this one visit at the social security office, and he gets that first check right on time."

"Social security relies to a great extent on each beneficiary's ability to report events which will affect his monthly payments," said Ted F. Moellering, Social Security District Manager. Among those events that the beneficiary should report are changes of address, stopping or starting work, changes in estimated earnings during the year, and a beneficiary's death, marriage, divorce, or annulment.

Each beneficiary receives a special card to fill out and

send to his local social security office when a report must be made. Reports are relayed to the paying office by electronic means to avoid delays in updating records.

Those needing to report a change should request form SSA-1425 from the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Any of our representatives will be glad to give you the necessary forms.

Questions that pop up frequently at the San Angelo Social Security Office are: "Do social security benefits for children stop at age 18?" "Do student benefits continue during the summer vacation?"

Ted F. Moellering, District Manager said until 1965 a child's benefits were stopped at 18 unless the child was severely disabled.

Since 1965 benefits have been available to a child of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker who is a full-time, unmarried student between the ages of 18 and 22. Mr. Moellering added that this not only applies to high school and college students, but also to those attending approved vocational or trade schools. Examples are barber schools and schools of nursing.

Student benefits continue during the summer vacation if the student meets two additional requirements. The period of non-attendance must not be more than four calendar months, and the student must intend to be a full-time student immediately following this period.

When a child who is receiving benefits reaches age 17½ a notice is sent to the adult who receives the benefits for the child. The notice tells the adult to contact the social security office immediately if the child will be a full-time student at age 18.

Failure to contact the office will cause his checks to stop the month before the child is 18.

Student benefits are terminated when a student marries, dies, is no longer a full-time student or becomes 22

### New Texas Almanacs Now Out

Many new features have been combined with traditional information in the 1970-'71 edition of the Texas Almanac, published by The Dallas Morning News.

The 704-page publication includes, among other material, the following information not found in previous editions, Walter B. Moore, editor, said: Texas athletic records since World War II.

A new map for use in calculating sunrise and sunset times in Texas.

A summary of major nonpetroleum minerals in Texas.

A history of the sheep and goat industry in Texas.

Number of deer killed in each Texas county.

The original account of Col. Wm. B. Travis drawing a line with his sword in the Alamo, as first published in the 1873 Texas Almanac.

New listings of courts, Congressional, Texas Senate and House districts by counties.

Latitude and longitude of 254 county seat towns.

Updated information will include the vote in elections, names of state, county and municipal officials, members of appointive boards, officials of state and regional civic organizations, enrollment in colleges and universities, estimated populations of cities and counties, statistics on employment, payrolls, banking, insurance, public welfare and much other material.

Other features include the complete text of the Texas Constitution, up-to-date maps and historical, agricultural and economic information for 254 counties, and chapters on minerals, agriculture, business, transportation, and other phases of Texas today.

Tourism and recreation are emphasized in the 1970-'71 edition, with a description of recreational attractions written especially for the Texas Almanac by Texas Tourist Development Agency.

Elisabet Ney's famous statue of Sam Houston, which stands in the Texas Capitol, is shown on the cover. The new edition contains more color photographs than any previous Texas Almanac, which has been published since 1857.

Texas newspaper editors, county agricultural agents, chambers of commerce, trade association and civic organization executives, authorities of the University of Texas Bureau of Economic Geology, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Texas A&M University and many others have contributed information for the new edition.

### For Social Security

A number of widows and surviving children of deceased workers in this area could be missing out on social security money due them, according to Ted F. Moellering, district manager of the Social Security Office. Many changes have been made in recent years concerning benefits for widows and children. Some who would be eligible do not know about the new rules, Mr. Moellering said. Mr. Moellering further noted that at present there are over three million young widows and children receiving a monthly social security check.

A widow who is completely disabled and over age 50 can receive reduced widow's benefit if she becomes disabled within seven years of her husband's death or the time she last had a child entitled to benefits in her care. Also, widows who remarry after age 60 may retain a part of the widow's benefit.

Children who would be otherwise entitled because of the death, disability, or retirement of a parent except for being over age 18, can now receive student benefits if they are in full-time school attendance, unmarried, and under age 22.

Children also have full protection now on their mother's account under the same rules that apply to a father's account. This present law will result in a number of children being able to receive social security benefits when their mother dies or becomes disabled, including some who were previously turned down under the old law, Mr. Moellering said.

Anyone knowing someone who might qualify for benefits under these provisions is urged to have them get in touch with their Social Security Office at 300 West Harris Avenue in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

### HOSPITAL INSURANCE BENEFITS

The hospital insurance benefits of Medicare provide for services of three types, according to Ted F. Moellering, manager of the San Angelo social security district office. Benefits are possible when you are (1) a bed patient in a hospital, (2) a bed patient in an extended care facility (skilled nursing home) assigned there by your physician as a follow-up to hospital care, and (3) a patient at home receiving home health services, Mr. Moellering continued. There has been some thought that because you are covered under Medicare up to a certain maximum number of days, you can automatically count on that number of days regardless of your condition. Mr. Moellering went on to say that this is a misunderstanding and that when your condition improves to the extent you no longer require the level of care provided, then your eligibility ceases.

An example of this misunderstanding is the 100 day eligibility in an Extended Care Facility. We are sometimes asked why a certain person was told Medicare would no longer pay for his stay in an Extended Care Facility when he had only been there 50 days and still had 50 days coming. The condition of the patient rather than the number of days is the controlling factor up to the point that the maximum number of days is reached. Coverage ends when his condition is such that he no longer needs the level of care provided by the Extended Care Facility.

Sam Ashburn and I walked through the Streets of Paris together one night, and he decided to go into some of the girlie shows inside. I didn't have that kind of nerve, after all I wasn't very old. But the Texas Centennial Year of 1936 was one that was outstanding and made you glad you were a Texan.

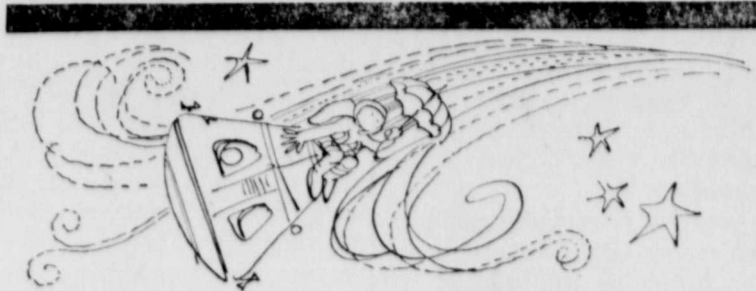
