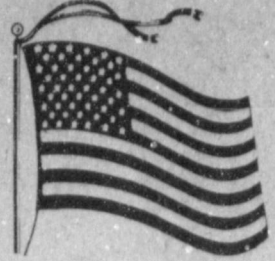

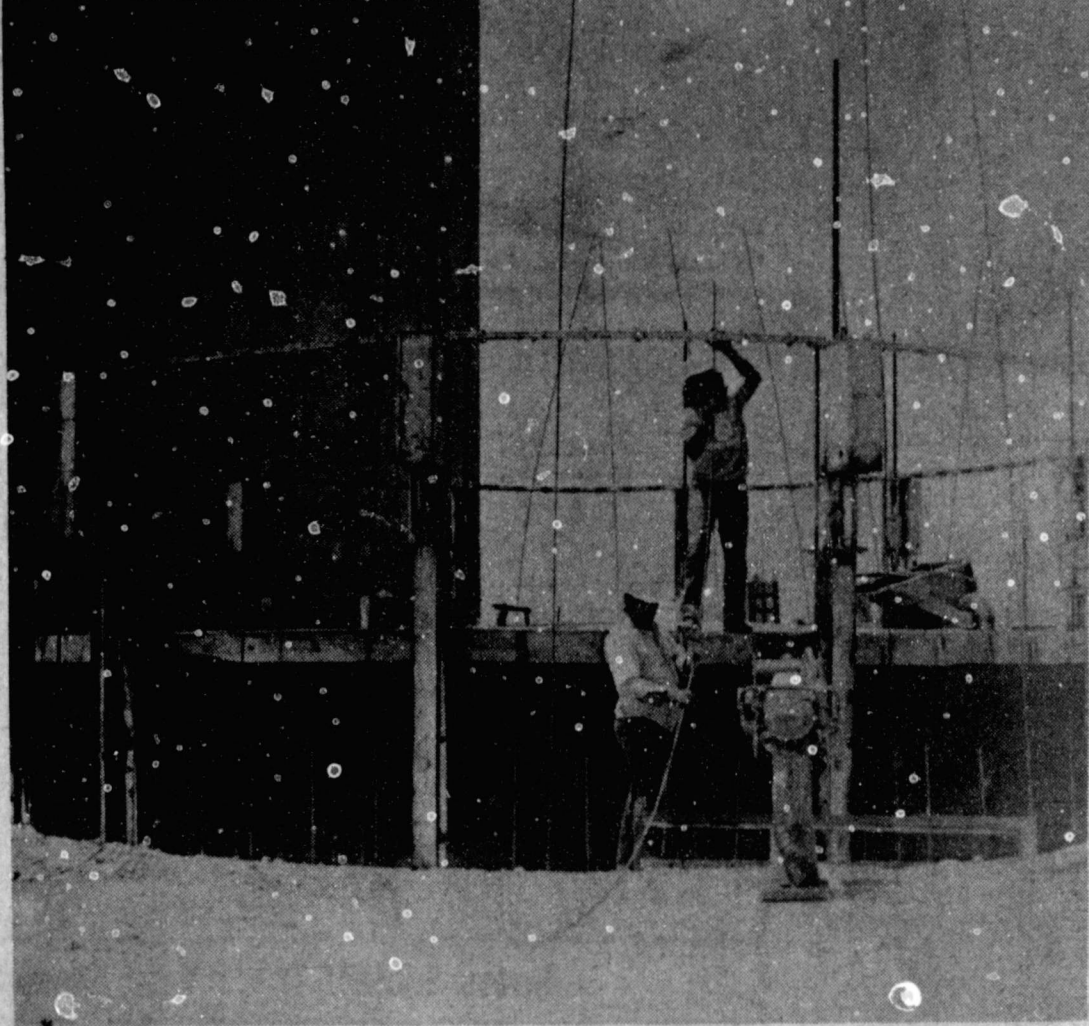

Showers Slight In Muleshoe Area

Although heavy dark clouds on Tuesday evening looked as if they would spill moisture over the dry Muleshoe and Bailey County area, it was apparent that the winds accompanying them blew the rain on past here.

Measurements of two or three tenths of an inch of rain were recorded in Muleshoe proper and between Muleshoe and Sudan; however, areas in other directions from town reported only slight traces of moisture. West of town,

VALLEY GRAIN GETS MORE TANKS--Construction began last week on an additional fifteen storage tanks for Valley Grain giving them a total of 37 of these 80 foot facilities. According to officials, one of these tanks can be built in about six days, which will give Valley an August 1 target date for completion. The new additions will help to hold the corn needed to operate the newly opened Masa Plant adjacent to Valley Grain.

Local GTE Service, Repair Rates Take Another Hike

New telephone rates which became effective on May 19 for General Telephone customers includes a new charge which levies a fee when a customer with a company-owned, single-line telephone requests that the company send an employee to repair his phone.

The new charge which is an off-spring of deregulation of telephone instruments and systems earlier in the year changed the rates for most types of service under an order issued by the Public Utility Commission of Texas on May 19, according to E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of GTE.

In Muleshoe, business rates for one party lines have changed from \$19.75 to \$21.80; a \$2.05 increase. The EAS rate band for this type of line has increased by 30 cents, going from \$3.25 to \$3.55. Residential rates for Muleshoe for one party lines have been changed from the amount of \$7.45 to the new rate of \$8.35 - an additional 90 cents, with EAS rates changed from \$1.20 to \$1.35 - a 15 cent increase.

Youth Employment Response Favorable

Since the doors opened on April 18, the Youth Employment Services of Muleshoe (YES) has made the attempt to provide both adults and youth of Muleshoe a service of youth job placement. According to YES officials, much favorable response has been forthcoming from each employer who has hired a YES worker. However, YES representatives say that many local citizens are still unaware of the program and of its purpose.

The concept of YES began with the dreams of some concerned individuals who wished to provide a means for the youth of Muleshoe to gain part-time and temporary employment within the community. Judy Bruns, President of the YES Board of Directors gave some background on YES, stating that "these individuals felt that the youth could gain self respect while performing a worthy service to the community." YES job workers are checked upon completion of a job to make sure that the work is satisfactorily done, she stated. The ultimate goal of YES is to teach youth job and social skills such as punctuality, politeness, communication and responsibility.

As of this date, there are about 100 youth between

the ages of 13 and 17 who are enrolled in the YES program. YES is not affiliated with any other existing jobs program, and it is staffed as well as funded entirely through community efforts. As one YES worker explained, "Kids in this community are everyone's responsibility. Whatever laws, institutions or programs we establish as adults are dependent upon our teaching our youth the importance of work ethic. If we do not, then we can expect to support large numbers of them on welfare and unemployment."

Bingo Tax Returns Over Million Dollars

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$474,652 to 49 Texas counties and 35 cities who have legalized charity bingo and levied the optional 2-percent local tax.

"This allocation puts the total we have sent local governments from this tax over the million dollar mark," Bullock said. "The 1,034 licensed non-profit organizations operating bingo games in areas where the game has been legalized and the tax imposed have paid \$1,152,163 in local taxes and have grossed at least 50 times this amount. Net proceeds from these games are dedicated by the Bingo Enabling Act exclusively to the charitable and civic work these groups support."

Friday's biggest check

went to Harris County, which received \$80,852. Dallas County got \$70,905; Bexar, \$48,366; Tarrant, \$45,410; El Paso, \$23,142; McLennan, \$21,128; Lubbock, \$20,343; Nueces, \$19,054; Hidalgo, \$18,480 and Travis \$12,878.

Biggest check to a city went to Arlington, which got \$8,624. The City of Orange received \$4,672; Everman, \$3,366; Brownsville, \$3,069; Wichita Falls, \$2,981 and Bryan, \$2,772. As of this week, a total of 104 counties, 134 cities and 112 justice precincts had legalized charity bingo, according to Bingo Regulation Director George Garland.

Charitable organizations in areas where bingo has been legalized are licensed by the Comptroller, who

Nuclear Waste Repository Not Welcome In West Texas

West Texans will not welcome a nuclear waste repository, said U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, D-Texas, in spirited testimony last week

before a Department of Energy (DOE) Environmental Assessment hearing in Hereford.

The Texas Democrat opened three days of hearings scheduled for the Lone Star State concerning DOE's search for a nuclear waste site. Texas is one of six states under consideration as a possible permanent home for commercial nuclear waste. The DOE is studying possible sites near the Panhandle towns of Hereford and Tulia.

Hance began his testimony by scolding the Department of Energy for its "lack of courtesy and cooperation. I have repeatedly asked DOE to keep us informed of your meetings, intentions, and actions regarding this site selection process in West Texas. Yet, we have had to rely on the media and the people of this area to keep us informed on some of your department's actions."

Additional Tanks Under Construction

Just east of Muleshoe City limits on the north side of U.S. Hwy 84 is the sprawling complex of Valley Grain Company, which now includes a newly constructed Masa Plant.

Valley Grain Products, with Jeff Smith as manager began to expand early in 1977 with plans to construct a food corn facility in Muleshoe. At this same time, Valley officials announced future plans to construct a Masa Plant adjacent to the corn facility.

Today, both these goals have been realized. Aside from that, Valley Grain is currently in the process of expanding their corn storage facilities with the addition of 15 more concrete storage tanks to the 34 tanks now standing south-

east of the plant itself. This latest expansion will cost in the neighborhood of \$800,000 and will give Valley Grain storage capacity to bring their total storage to about 117 million pounds of corn in 49 storage tanks.

Smith told the Journal that the need for this additional storage came from needing a place to store corn for the Masa facility and to the increased sales that the Company is enjoying.

Construction of the tanks are steel framed concrete, with the walls being eight inches thick. Hector Gonzalez, a worker with Gruber's Concrete Silo Builders of Visalia, California told the Journal that the tanks are "free flow" designed structures which take about 180 yards of concrete to build. The tanks are 80 feet tall and range from 24 to 30 feet in diameter and each one takes about 6 days to complete.

According to Smith, more local corn is being contracted due to the reduction in corn acreages because of the PIK or lay-out program. Smith says that this has not been a problem. "We've just dealt with more producers."

Smith added "With the building of the Masa plant, we've been given a chance to stabilize the market situation here, lacking in local customers."

Both Smith and Jeff Gruber, foreman of the construction crew, expect completion of the new tanks by August 1. The tanks are built two at a time.

County Attorney Takes Leave Of Absence

In a meeting of the Bailey County Commissioner's Court on Monday, May 23, a request by County Attorney Linda Guelker for a leave of absence from her duties until August 21, 1983 was granted by the Court. Michael R. Caldwell, a resident of Muleshoe for the past year or so met with the court stating that he was available to serve as County Attorney Pro Tem for the period of Ms. Guelker's absence. Commissioners passed a motion effective immediately and until August 21, that Caldwell be hired at the regular compensation for County Attorney. The compensation is to be paid to Caldwell instead of Guelker for the period of time involved.

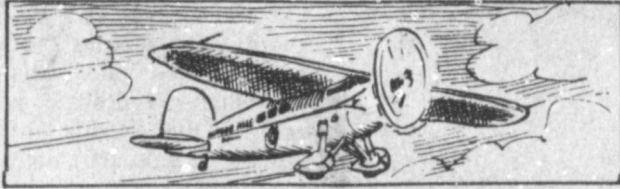

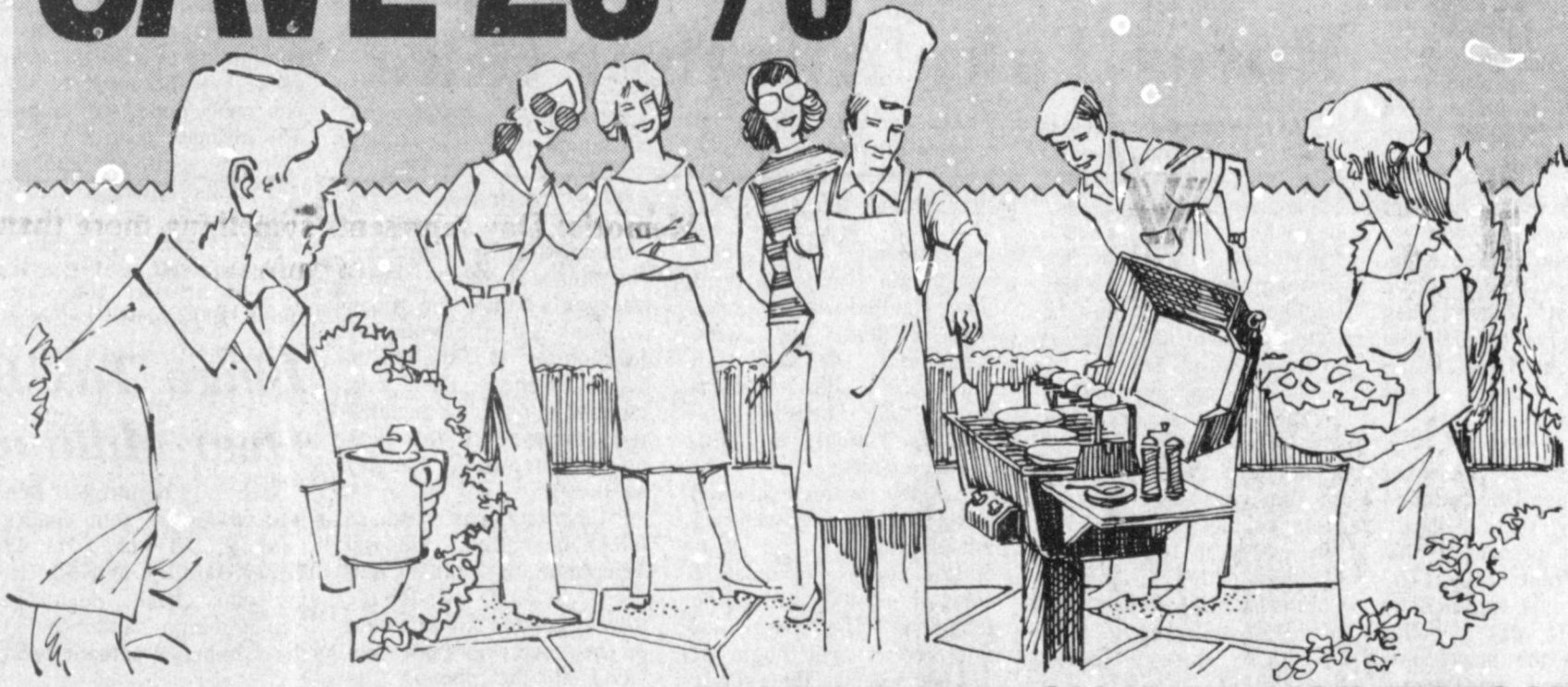

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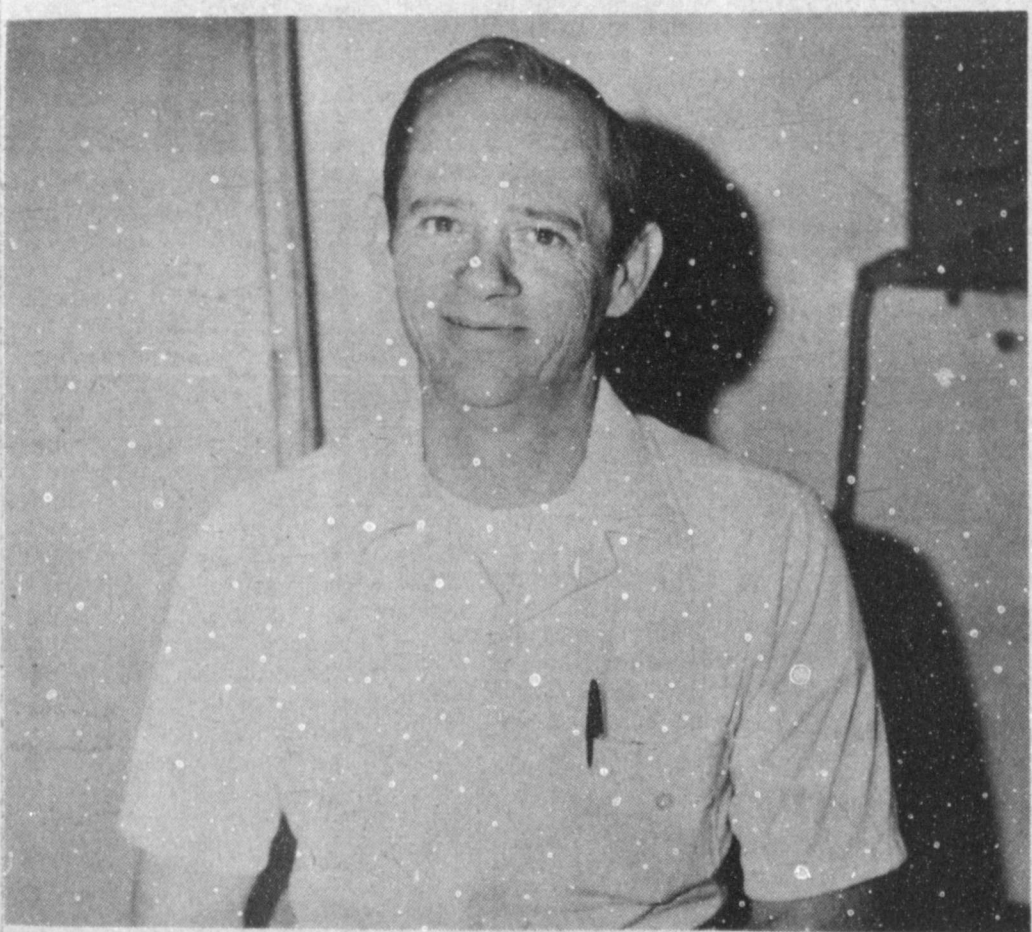
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Welcome To Muleshoe

Friends living in the Roswell vicinity also visited with them. The class is planning another reunion in two years, for their 50th.

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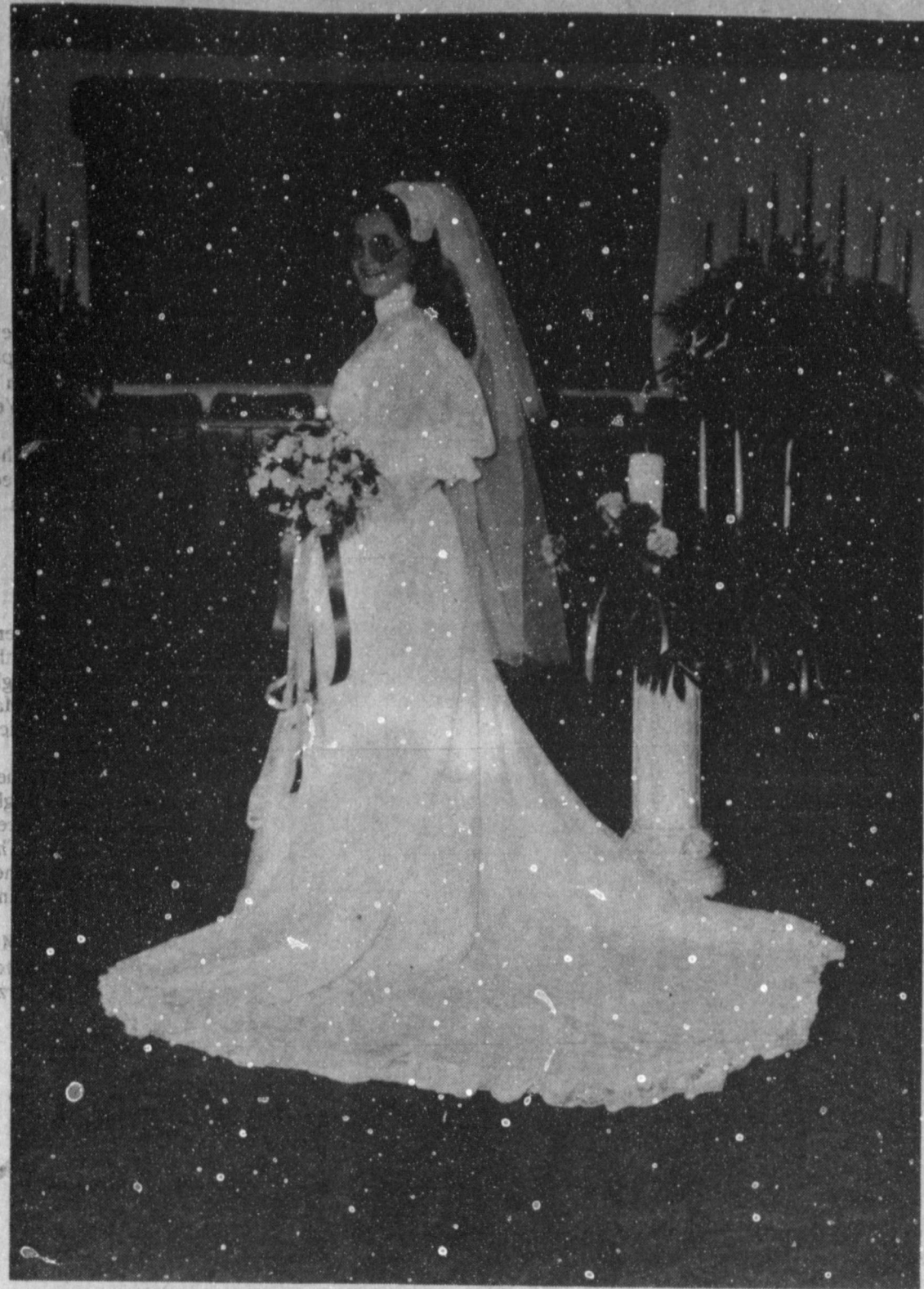

Hance told the DOE that a nuclear waste repository would not be welcomed because of "two areas vital to the economy and the future of West Texas: water and agriculture."

Placing nuclear waste in salt dome formations underneath Deaf Smith County poses a needless threat to the Ogalalla Aquifer, the area's primary source of water, said Hance.

"Without the Ogalalla Aquifer, this land would not have become one of the greatest producers of food and fiber in the world," said Hance. "Yet, the Department of Energy is considering placing a nuclear waste repository beneath one of the world's most productive farm areas. We in West Texas realize the importance of maintaining our economic base and safeguarding the water supply that allows us to grow and prosper."

An accident involving nuclear waste could contaminate the Ogalalla underneath a 35-county area below the Canadian River. "Should nuclear contamination occur, either real or perceived, the effects will be felt immediately over an area of 34,023 square miles

with a population larger than that of our nation's capital, Washington, D.C."

The area, added Hance, produces \$2.29 billion each year in agriculture commodities.

"We grew enough corn in West Texas last year to fulfill the normal consumption needs of the entire state of Massachusetts," said Hance. "We grew enough wheat to feed the people in about 25 Congressional districts, roughly 12.2 million persons."

"We raised more than 2.8 billion pounds of sorghum, enough to satisfy the needs of every person in New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania combined. We produced more than 2.4 million pounds of cotton and enough cattle to feed over 16 million persons, or the combined populations of Oklahoma and Texas."

"If nuclear waste is stored beneath West Texas, will people still buy our wheat or our sorghum or our beef?" asked Hance. "Locating the repository here could seriously damage the desirability of commodities produced in West Texas and consequently ruin our economy."

was paid by all customers through higher local basic service rates.

"Now that more customers are providing their own phones and are responsible for the maintenance and repair of those phones, the cost of sending employees to premises must become cost-based and be applied only to the customers using the service."

He pointed out the company has expanded its GTE Phone Marts, Local Service Offices and Local Service Agency network to provide convenient locations for all customers to take care of their phone business, including repair service.

"By bringing their company-owned single-line telephones to our service locations, the customers can avoid the charge and have the repair made at their convenience rather than requesting we send an employee and pay the charge, in addition to waiting at the premise for service personnel to arrive," he said.

He pointed out that similar premise visit charges were initiated last year when the Federal Communications Commission changed the accounting procedure for station connections, which includes new installations, moves and changes of service, and the installation and repair of house wiring. House wiring is the wire that connects the customer's telephone to the local and long-distance network.

"Under the changes last year, customers were given the options of doing some of the work themselves, such as wiring, jacking and picking up telephones, thus saving the costs if we do

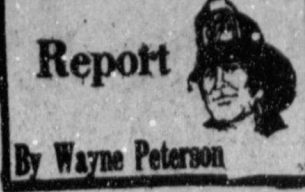

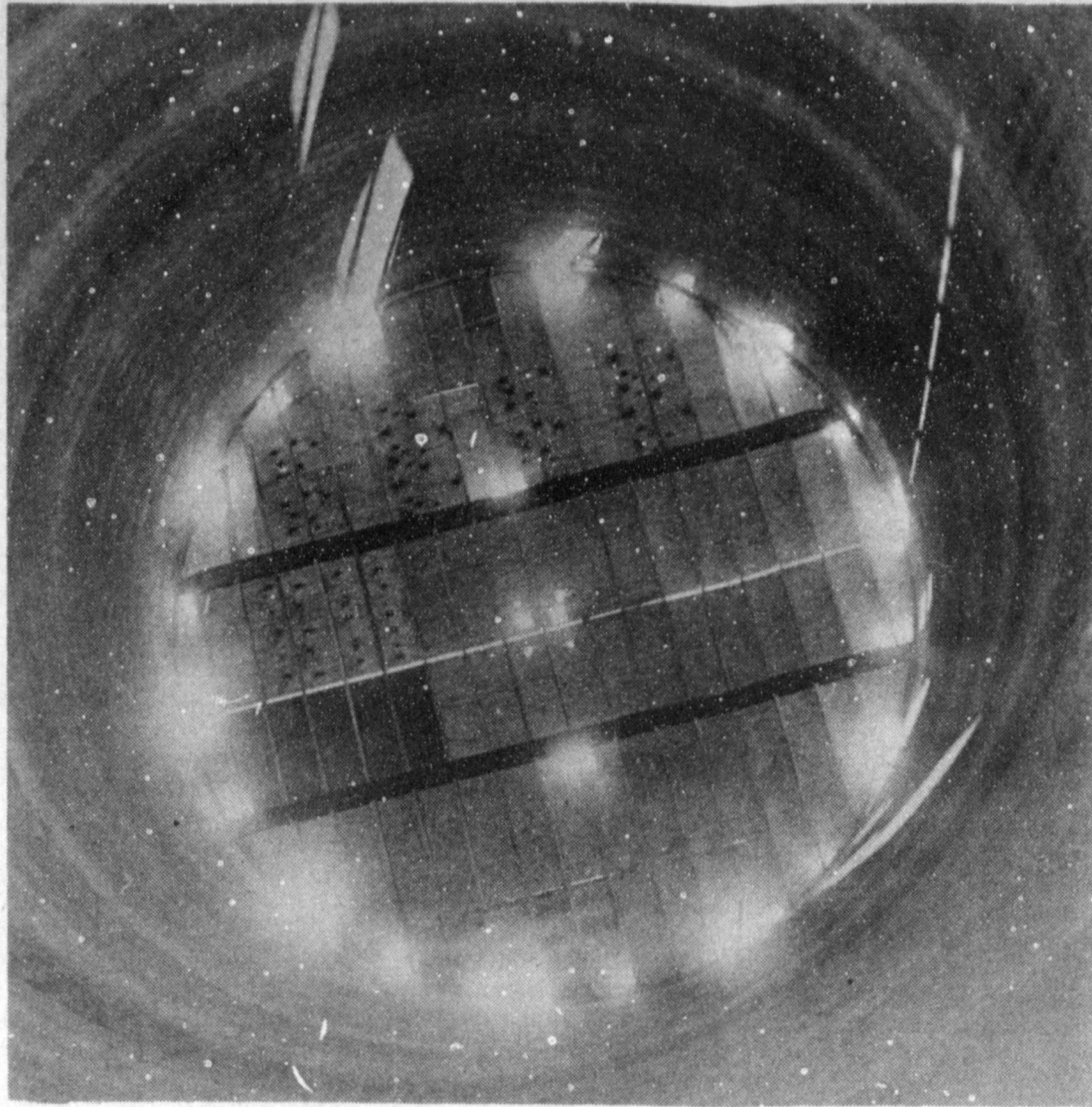
