Congratulations to Worth Durham on his appointment to the Lamb Committee of the National Live Stock and Meat Board last week in San Francisco. Three members of the six man committee are elected and three appointed; all six serve as directors of the National Livestock and Meat Board as members of the lamb committee. Worth is also serving as vice chairman of the Lamb Advisory Committee of the American Sheep Producers Council.

Organized in 1923, the National Live Stock and Meat Board is a non-profit organization which represents all branches of the livestock and meat industry—growers, feeders, marketing agencies, meat packers, and meat retailers. The function of the Board is to initiate and encourage research in regard to meat and its products and to disseminate correct information about meat in the diet. To do this, the Board publishes recipe booklets, educational material regarding the various cuts and types of meat, and much other material which is available to homemaker groups and individuals. They also sponsor advertising of many products.

The five ribbons John Brock won in the State Pecan Show held in Dallas the latter part of July made him the second place ribbon winner in the show. Mrs. C. E. Smith of Rising Star was the leading ribbon collector with six ribbons won in the show, thus beating John out by one ribbon.

As published in last week's edition, John won first place ribbons on his entries in the John Garner and Eastern Schley varieties, second place ribbons in the Desirable and San Saba Improved varieties as well as his collection of six varieties. The six were John Garner, Desirable, Eastern Schley, Wesetern Schley, San Saba Improved and Burkett.

The late-evening thunderstorms with accompanying lightning last week started a number of grass fires on Sterling County ranges. Any time grass is lost to a fire, it is a disaster but the amount of acreage lost has been held down in the local fires. Key to this is the excellent cooperation of the ranchers and the fire department. Whenever the fire siren sounds, there is always good response. Ranchers with sprayers are keeping their sprayers full of water and fuel and available at all times; others are carrying barrels of water and sacks in their pickups. None hesitate to go miles to a fire even though the country may be rough, rocky, brushy, or what have you, and ruined tires of equipment is likely. They are all to be commended for without their help, the fight would be much harder.

The opening of dove season next week increases the possibility of more fires. There may be out of county hunters who get careless with cigarettes and matches hunting on some places. It would be a good idea to caution these hunters (as we know landowners will) about the danger.

The Epsilon Zeta Club announced today that the women named above have been selected to appear in the 1970 edition of Outstanding Young Women of America. Nominated earlier this year, these women have been chosen for the awards publication on the basis of their achievements.

Now in its sixth year, the Outstanding Young Women of America program, designed to recognize the abilities of women between the ages of 21 and 35, was conceived by the leaders of the nation's major women's organizations. Coast Guard Academy

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Omar Burleson announced that applications for appointment as Cadet, United States Coast Guard, Class of 1975 are now being accepted.

Representative Burleson emphasized this opportunity offered qualified young men a four-year academic program which leads to a Bachelor of Science Degree and a commission as an officer in America's oldest continuing seagoing service.

"Appointments are made solely on a nationwide competitive basis, which is open to all young men who fulfill the basic eligibility requirements," he said. "I urge all young men who are interested in this worthwhile profession to write for details and application forms as soon as possible to Director of Admissions U. S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Connecticut 06320."

A candidate for the next competition for the Coast Guard Academy must be single, must have reached his seventeenth but not his twenty-second birthday by July 1, 1971, and must be in excellent physical condition.

A high school diploma is the minimum educational requirement, although high school seniors assured of being graduated by June 30, 1971, are eligible to compete if they will have at least fifteen credits by that time. All applicants must have completed three units of English, and three units of mathematics including algebra and plane or coordinate geometry.

The deadline for submitting applications for the next annual nationwide competition is December 15, 1970. Prospective applicants should arrange through their secondary school counselors to complete the prescribed College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB) tests prior to or including the Dec. 5, 1970 administration, since test results subsequent to that date cannot be accepted.

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U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415. Information concerning the patrol inspector position and this announcement may be obtained from the U. S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, P. O. Box 2539, San Antonio, Texas 78206, or by calling 512-225-5511, Extension 214.

LOST MEDICARE CARD

Have you lost your Medicare card?

Your Medicare card should be in your possession at all times. J.M. Talbot, social security manager, said today. It is your proof to your doctor and to the hospital that Medicare will help pay your medical bills. The doctor or hospital can tell at what point you became entitled to Medicare benefits, and whether you are entitled to payment for both your hospital and your doctor bills—if you show him the Medicare card.

Perhaps the most important function of your Medicare card is that it furnishes your own claim number to the doctor and to the hospital. Any claims for payment on your behalf must contain this complete number in order for Medicare to assist with the payment of the bills.

If you do lose your card, call or visit your nearest social security office, and a free duplicate card will be obtained for you. However, it will take about three weeks to get this duplicate, so make your request as soon as you realize that you have lost your original. The hospital can, if necessary, admit you without your Medicare card; but, you can avoid considerable difficulty if you secure a new card before you become ill and need it.

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Social Security DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments. Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months.

The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

Mr. Talbot encourages those who may qualify to call the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas or see the representative when he is in your area.

Are you a social security beneficiary receiving his monthly check a few days late? According to J.M. Talbot, social security manager, it may be because you did not report a change of address.

When a beneficiary changes his address, he should notify the social security office in writing or in person. Reports should include the name of the person or persons moving, the social security claim number, and the old and new address.

Mr. Talbot said that notifying the Post Office alone is not sufficient. Even if the Post Office has a current address a delay still occurs because the check must be forwarded from one address to another.

Temporary financial hardship often results when checks are a few days late, particularly when social security benefits are the only source of income for a worker or his family. Beneficiaries can insure timely benefit payments only by keeping their address current.

Changes of address which have not already been reported

to the Social Security Administration should be reported without further delay. Beneficiaries may report changes of address to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Ave. (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

DISABLED WORKER NEWS

In most instances disability claims take a longer period to process than other social security claims. The extra processing time is due to additional documentation, such as medical reports and different procedures in the claims process.

By applying as early as possible, the complete processing of the claim can be finished before the six months waiting period has expired. If the claim for benefits is approved, you get a check at the earliest possible time.

File Early For Disability

What do you do if you get so sick or injured you can't work? One of the things you should do is see if you are eligible for disability payments under the social security law. Although there are no benefits payable during the first 6 months of a disability, J.M. Talbot, social security manager, urges everyone who believes he may be entitled to monthly benefits to apply for them as soon as possible after becoming disabled.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

The report of agricultural employees must be filed with the Internal Revenue Service by January 31 of the following year. Reports should be on Internal Revenue Service Form 943—showing each employee's name, social security number, and amount paid. The report should be accompanied by tax withheld from employee's pay and matched by employer.

To be sure which employees to report, Mr. Talbot recommends keeping records on anyone working for you in your agricultural business.

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Social Security Tips

ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examina-

tion to help provide the extra information.

If such a special examination is required, Mr. Talbot added, the Social Security Administration will pay for it. He stressed, however, that this is done only to supplement or clarify the initial information you have already provided.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

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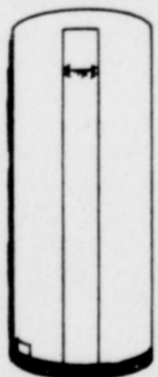
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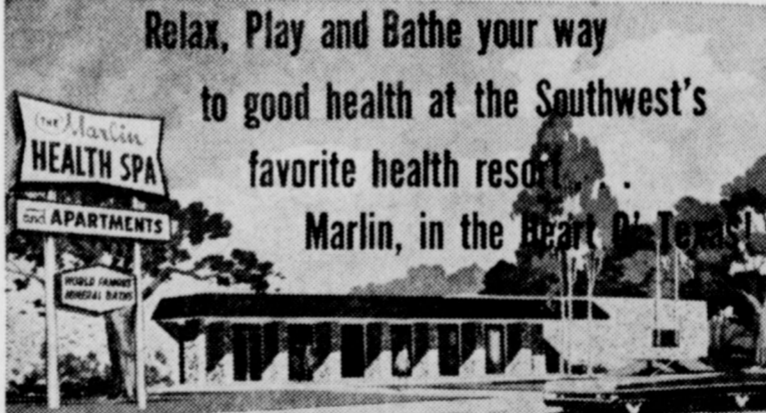
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
