Two Sterling County 4-H Club members will be exhibiting in the West Texas Fair which opens in Abilene next Monday, September 14. The West Texas Fair is the first of the larger fairs on the fall show circuit and follows a number of county fairs. Other fairs will follow soon at Lubbock and Amarillo and then the State Fair at Dallas serves as a climax to the fall fair circuit.

Local club members who are competing in the fair at Abilene are Amy and Becky Hodges. Each have six registered Rambouillet ewes and five rams entered in competition at Abilene. Abilene rules allow the club members to show in both the open show which is open to anyone regardless of age, as well as the Junior Show which is limited to entries from 4-H club or FFA members from Texas.

Amy and Becky's sheep will show Tuesday morning with judging scheduled to begin at 8:00 a.m. with the ram lambs. Judge for the Abilene show's finewool sheep is David White, vocational agriculture instructor at Fort Stockton.

A sample of worms sent in by William and J. Q. Foster was identified as non-screw-worm last week. The sample was taken from a sheep by the owners on their place five miles east of Sterling City. This is the seventh sample that has been submitted to the laboratory at Mission for identification by Sterling County livestock producers this year. It is also the seventh sample identified as non-screw worm.

Thus far this year, there have been few cases identified as screwworms in Central West Texas. The majority of the cases have been in far West Texas in the Big Bend area. Most of the activity has been in the area of Brewster, Jeff Davis, Pecos and Terrell Counties.

Eradication program officials feared there would be an outbreak following Hurricane Celia in South Texas in August but thus far it has not occurred. Conditions of high humidity and more than normal moisture are usually considered conducive to the growth of screwworm flies.

The scattered showers in this area in recent weeks have greened up the roadside ditches and deer are moving into the ditches at night for something green. While it has not rained much in most areas, water did run off the pavement and give the grass a spurt of growth.

A number of deer have been hit at night so all drivers who are on the road after dark are cautioned to watch for them. Experiences of those who have hit deer, particularly with cars, are that nothing good comes out of it. Trucks and pickups possibly may fare a little better but nothing is to be gained regardless of the vehicle. Watch for those shiny eyes at night, particularly in areas known to have a heavy population of deer!

Lions Hear of Salt Water Pollution

Some of the Sterling citizens have been worrying about the increasing salt water pollution of the underground water supply here. They know of some instances of salt pollution now ruining underground water—and Lions have been talking about it. Clinton Hodges the chairman of the North Concho River Soil and Water Conservation District, spoke to the Lions Club members on Wednesday about the problem. He said that the district had a testing machine to test the salt content of water and they had bought it several years ago for that purpose. He said it would be taken to the local high school and all water samples would be tested there—for a small fee, say about 50c. If wells are being contaminated by salt from old unplugged oil wells, or slush pits, then if enough evidence was presented to the Railroad Commission they could do something to stop it. But evidence is needed. Many wells to the west are being ruined by salt invading the underground water beds. The salt is slowly moving to the east and closer to Sterling City, it is said.

Soon, it will be announced just where to take your water samples, etc.

Jim Davis, chairman of the Community Betterment Committee, said he was calling a meeting of his committee and all interested citizens for next Tuesday night in the district courtroom—at 8 p.m. He said many ideas of bettering the town and county should be discussed by interested citizens and a program instituted for helping the community. He wants the sincerely interested persons to meet with him at that time. (Not just Lions Club members.)

President Dan Glass appointed a club committee on sight conservation. He named James Thompson, Dr. Wm. J. Swann and Albert McGinness.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Some people in responsible position continue to issue predictions that campus unrest, violence will increase during the 1970-71 school year. Such statements tend to encourage the very thing they seemed concerned about. If expected, the radicals will not want to disappoint the expectation.

Predictions are risky but there are some indications that violence connected with protest may have passed its peak and is being checked. For one thing, the force of public opinion, slow to rise but finally irresistible, is being heard. Another sign, which offers hope, is what appears to be a stiffening effort on the part of school administrators and faculties towards preventing unlawful disruption of their institutions. This may be one and the same thing but taken together it can restore order on campuses.

In Wisconsin, where a bombing recently occurred at the University, the Green Bay paper wrote "We have had it, right up to here." Reaction of this nature is in evidence in California and Kansas.

Many faculty members and school administrators are hearing the voices of public opinion and know that unless there is restraint a wave of repression, which is opposite the permissiveness and so-called academic freedom, which some have been on the front line defending, will no doubt assert itself.

Support of this view was recently expressed by Dr. Sidney Hook, Professor of Philosophy at New York University and a member of the University Centers for Rational Alternatives, who is identified as a liberal, when he testified before the Scranton Commission on Campus Unrest.

Dr. Hook says that it is shameful that the militant radicals have had faculties who encourage attacks on the academic freedom of their colleagues. He further said that "opportunistic administrators with flexible backbones have been chiefly responsible for the decline in moral freedom. They have lacked the moral courage to uphold their professional standing as teachers and seekers of the truth."

This "failure of nerves and intelligence", in Dr. Hook's view, has provided American colleges and universities with the "greatest crisis in their history."

Dr. Hook described his efforts and that of associated scholars, as proposing to restore true academic freedom and have presented an orderly plan for that purpose.

He calls for immediate action at the beginning of this school year, for a clear statement of principles and rules governing the expression of dissent. Under his plan, faculty, students and administrators acting together would define the kinds of impermissible

conduct and behavior. Punishment would be spelled out with clarity.

Violations would be dealt with first by student-faculty groups properly selected and finally by court injunctions, if the first efforts failed. If disorder results in arson, assault, vandalism or the prevention of other students from pursuing their studies then an committee of students and teachers should accompany police to restore order. The plan provides for actions against guilty teachers and students with no amnesty and no appeasement in areas of violence.

This appears to be the way campus order can best be restored. Again public opinion is asserting itself more strongly with each outburst of disgusting violence. Officials at these institutions where these unlawful acts are occurring are beginning to realize that unless responsible students, teachers and administrators face up to their responsibility that outraged parents, alumni and legislators will impose a harsher plan of their own.







U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Applications are now being accepted for the civil service examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector which will be held on Saturday, January 24, 1970. An additional examination is scheduled for April, 1970. However, those wishing to be tested in January must submit their applications before December 19, 1969. Full information is given in Announcement No. WAM-911 which may be secured from Interagency Boards of Examiners and from many post offices as well as any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Applications should be submitted on the tearout application form on the announcement or CSC Form 50000AB and forwarded to the Interagency Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners for Washington, D.C. 1900 E St., N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

For Social Security

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

LOST MEDICARE CARD

Have you lost your Medicare card?

Your Medicare card should be in your possession at all times, J.M. Talbot, social security manager, said today. It is your proof to your doctor and to the hospital that Medicare will help pay your medical bills. The doctor or hospital can tell at what point you became entitled to Medicare benefits, and whether you are entitled to payment for both your hospital and your doctor

bills—if you show him the Medicare card.

Perhaps the most important function of your Medicare card is that it furnishes your own claim number to the doctor and to the hospital. Any claims for payment on your behalf must contain this complete number in order for Medicare to assist with the payment of the bills.

If you do lose your card, call or visit your nearest social security office, and a free duplicate card will be obtained for you. However, it will take about three weeks to get this duplicate, so make your request as soon as you realize that you have lost your original. The hospital can, if necessary, admit you without your Medicare card; but, you can avoid considerable difficulty if you secure a new card before you become ill and need it.

Civil Service FEDERAL CAREER OPPORTUNITIES



ABOUT YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your

attending doctor or hospital. Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

If such a special examination is required, Mr. Talbot added, the Social Security Administration will pay for it. He stressed, however, that this is done only to supplement or clarify the initial information you have already provided.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition. 
