Two Sterling County livestock producers were among the ribbon winners in Monday's Stocker-Feeder Calf Sale in San Angelo. Virgil Brownfield had the first place pen-of-twenty heifers in the Hereford division of the show. The J.T. Davis Ranch showed the third place pen-of-ten Hereford steers, the third place pen-of-ten Hereford heifers, and the fifth place pen-of-ten Hereford heifers in the show.

A number of Sterling County producers have won ribbons and trophies in past shows and sales. They include R.T. Foster Jr., Tom and Bill Humble, F. S. Price, Copeland Brothers, Clinton Hodges and others who may have escaped notice in past shows with Herefords while the V.T. Ferguson and Sons Ranch has done well in the Angus division. All these and others too, are to be commended for the high quality cattle they produce.

Thirty-one cases of screw-worms were confirmed in the southwestern United States during September. This brought the total for the year to 141 for the year in the U.S. compared to 214 at the same time last year.

Texas had five confirmed cases in September. Two were in Terrell County, and one each in Hudspeth, Menard and Val Verde Counties.

Program officials warn there is still time for fall screw-worm cases to occur and spread into the warmer "overwintering areas" of the southwest. Cases missed now could result in an outbreak early next year as fertile flies could possibly overwinter in protected places.

Beef cattle need help in getting required minerals when grazing conditions are well below normal. In some areas, ranges have greened up as a result of the scattered rains but the long hot, dry summer has taken its toll.

The major mineral problem is the lack of phosphorus while vitamin A is the main one in the vitamin field. Both of these are readily available in green forage but decline rapidly when the forage turns brown.

The cattlemen cannot solve all of his nutrition problems by buying and feeding all of the vitamins and minerals which are available. He must decide which are needed and then make these available. The two named above are major ones should be considered when ordering feed for the coming winter. Phosphorus can be supplied in bonemeal and the most practical way of supplying it is to keep a supply of bonemeal available year-round; if this is done, it is not necessary to add bonemeal to the winter feed. Vitamin A is available in several forms now, both in the natural state and in a synthesized form. Feed dealers can help in deciding on how it is to be supplied.

Trace minerals usually are not a problem. Small amounts of sulfur, copper, and cobalt are recognized as essential and these are available in the feeds which cattle consume.

casebearers; (2) Shuck worms; (3) Pecan weevil damage; (4) Inadequate soil moisture; (5) Lack of available plant food; and, (6) Insect and disease damage to the leaves. Any condition that reduces the normal activity of the pecan or the shuck itself can cause shedding. Possibly the main cause here is the lack of available moisture following the dry summer we have experienced.

Another possible cause here might be the leaf spot which is affecting some trees. Leaf spot can be identified by the large reddish-brown spots on the older leaves. This disease can be controlled by spraying with a fungicide such as zineb or maneb. Use according to directions on the product.

FEDERAL CAREER OPPORTUNITIES

The U.S. Civil Service Commission has issued three new nationwide announcements of mid-level Federal career opportunities in professional fields, and a fourth outlining opportunities for Stenographers and Typists in Washington, D. C. and vicinity.

Interested applicants can get the announcements from Federal Job Information Centers in many large cities, from many post offices, except in cities where Federal Job Information Centers are located or from the Interagency Board of U.S. Civil Service Examiners, 1900 E St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20415.

The announcements are:

1. Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists. GS grades 9 through 12. Covered are such positions as Economist, Social Science Analyst, Social Science Program Specialist, Sociologist, Historian, Anthropologist, Manpower Analyst, Social Work Program Specialist, and additional closely related positions in other social science fields. Many of the opportunities are in various Federal agencies in Washington, D. C. and vicinity and in foreign countries. Some are in other parts of the United States. Annual starting salaries currently range from \$8,462 to \$12,174. They are expected to increase by about 9 percent in the middle of this year. There are no written test requirements. Applicants will be rated on the basis of professional experience, education, and training. Work descriptions and the necessary qualifications, along with special credit provisions for graduate study, superior undergraduate academic achievement, subsequent work experience including part-time or unpaid experience, and certain teaching experience, are detailed in Announcement No. WAS-827, Professional Opportunities for Social Scientists.

2. Professional Opportunities for Social Worker and Social Service Representative. Social Worker positions, GS grades 9 through 12, are in the Bureau of Indian Affairs, the U. S. Public Health Service, and the Veterans Administration, throughout the United States and Puerto Rico; and in agencies of the District of Columbia Government and other Federal agencies located in Washington, D. C. and vicinity. Social Service Representative positions, GS grades 8 through 12 are primarily in the D.C. Government and other agencies in the Washington metropolitan area. When asking for announcements and application forms, applicants are advised to ask at the same time for Civil Service Commission Pamphlet No. 4, "Working for the U.S.A." which provides important general information about the kinds of appointments, the physical abilities required, veteran preference, and other conditions of Federal employment.

Federal agencies, principally in the metropolitan area of Washington, D. C., need Electronics Technicians. The work involves maintenance, testing, and development of various electronic equipment, ranging from radio, radar, and sonar devices to computer systems.

Both general and specialized experience are basic requirements for Electronics Technician positions, except where education may be substituted for such experience. Entry level for eligibles depends on quality and quantity of both. No written test is required.

Social Security

DISABLED WIDOWS BENEFITS

"Two years have passed and many persons are still not aware of the change in the social security law which provides monthly benefits for disabled widows at age 50," said J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Since the law became effective in February, 1968, more than 32,000 disabled widows have qualified for monthly payments, Mr. Talbot estimated however that another 30,000 widows who might qualify for these benefits have never applied.

"The requirements for disabled widows' benefits are apparently not as well known as those for the more familiar widows' benefits at age 62, or reduced widows' benefits at age 60," Mr. Talbot continued.

To qualify for benefits a widow, age 50 to 60, must have an impairment so severe that it keeps her from engaging in any work. The condition must also be expected to last for at least twelve months.

The widow's disability must have begun before her husband's death or not later than seven years after his death. A widow who has previously been entitled to benefits if she becomes disabled before payments to the children end or within seven years after they end.

Mr. Talbot encourages those who may qualify to call the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas or see the representative when he is in your area.

Are you a social security beneficiary receiving his monthly check a few days late? According to J.M. Talbot, social security manager, it may be because you did not report a change of address.

When a beneficiary changes his address, he should notify the social security office in writing or in person. Reports should include the name of the person or persons moving, the social security claim number, and the old and new address.

Mr. Talbot said that notifying the Post Office alone is not sufficient. Even if the Post Office has a current address a delay still occurs because the check must be forwarded from one address to another.

Temporary financial hardship often results when checks are a few days late, particularly when social security benefits are the only source of income for a worker or his family. Beneficiaries can insure timely benefit payments only by keeping their address current.

Changes of address which have not already been reported to the Social Security Administration should be reported without further delay. Beneficiaries may report changes of address to the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Ave. (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

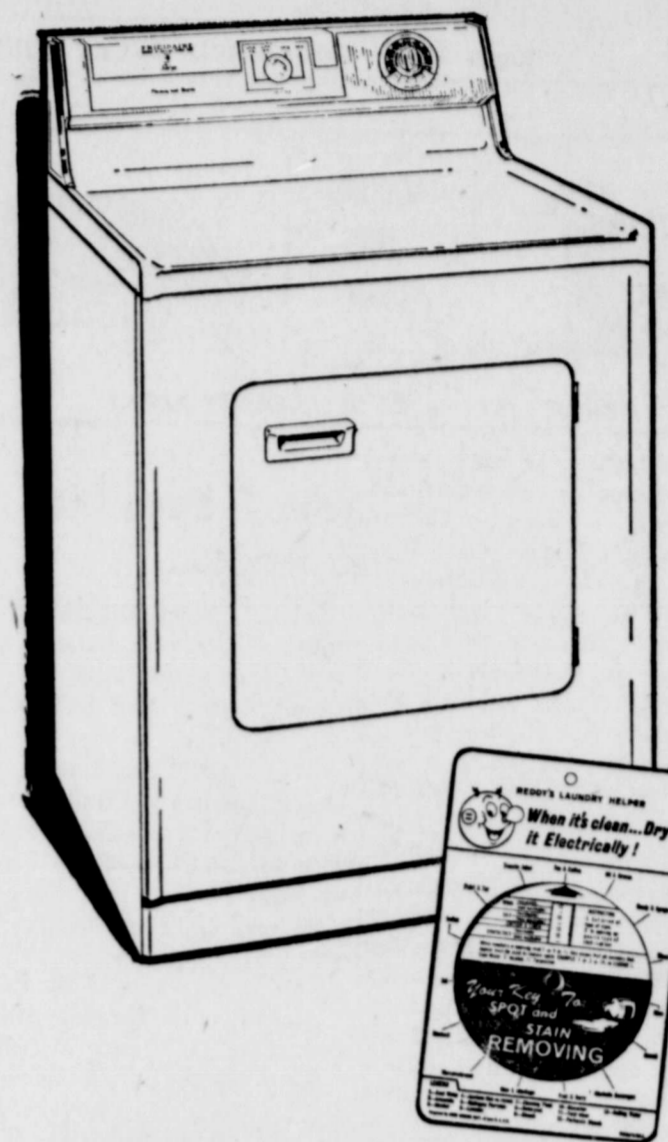

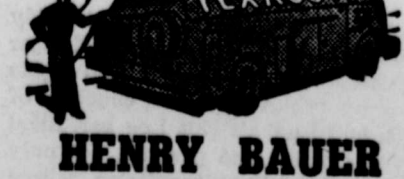

Social Security News

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

If such a special examination is required, Mr. Talbot added, the Social Security Administration will pay for it. He stressed, however, that this is done only to supplement or clarify the initial information you have already provided.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

LOST MEDICARE CARD

Have you lost your Medicare card?

Your Medicare card should be in your possession at all times. J.M. Talbot, social security manager, said today. It is your proof to your doctor and to the hospital that Medicare will help pay your medical bills. The doctor or hospital can tell at what point you became entitled to Medicare benefits, and whether you are entitled to payment for both your hospital and your doctor bills—if you show him the Medicare card.

Perhaps the most important function of your Medicare card is that it furnishes your own claim number to the doctor and to the hospital. Any claims for payment on your behalf must contain this complete number in order for Medicare to assist with the payment of the bills

If you do lose your card, call or visit your nearest social security office, and a free duplicate card will be obtained for you. However, it will take about three weeks to get this duplicate, so make your request as soon as you realize that you have lost your original. The hospital can, if necessary, admit you without your Medicare card; but, you can avoid considerable difficulty if you secure a new card before you become ill and need it.

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AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—Almost four months ago, on June 11 to be exact, we called attention to the Soviet Union's apparent build-up of military potential around Cuba.

The administration has now officially revealed the information referred to at that time. On Friday, September 25, both the White House and the Defense Department responded to news inquiry about what appears to be a Russian intent to build a submarine base at Cienfuegos on Cuba's south shore. The Pentagon confirmed to news sources that three Soviet ships had moved heavy barges and other equipment into Cienfuegos harbor in the past few weeks. Actually, the last few weeks go back to early June.

Questioned at the White House, a spokesman was quoted as saying, "the Soviet Union can be under no doubt that we would view the establishment of a strategic base in the Caribbean with the utmost seriousness." At that time the White House spokesman quoted President Kennedy's statement that there would be peace in the Caribbean "if all offensive weapons are removed from Cuba and kept out of the Hemisphere in the future."

Almost lost in the Middle East crisis was the warning to the Russians about the possible construction of their strategic base.

For a century and a half the United States has held fast to the doctrine that no European nation should be allowed to establish a military foothold anywhere in the Western Hemisphere. The Monroe Doctrine has been a living declaration for all this time.

Today, as nuclear-packed submarines are able to cruise underwater and sneak up to the coast lines of any country, reconnaissance planes constantly survey the sea approaches. A Soviet submarine base in Cuba, capable of firing missiles into the populous areas of the United States would constitute a grave threat.

As was mentioned in this column of June 11, those who are willing to trust the Russian leaders will doubtless say that if they have the capability of launching missiles from Russian soil, why would they seek bases within 90 miles of our shore. The answer is simple enough; there remains some doubt as to the accuracy of missiles fired from 6,000 to 8,000 miles away, but little doubt of pinpoint certainty fired from a distance no farther away than the Caribbean.

It is reasonable that the construction of a strategic submarine base in Cuba would be in keeping with the Soviet's intent of shifting the world balance of power away from the United States. This sort of action, coupled with Soviet military activity in the middle east and in Indochina, seems to support a conclusion that they are now engaged in a bold bid for superior military strength in the West, which essentially means the United States of America.

It is entirely possible that Castro has had little to do

Gilbert Gaitan Enrolled in TSTI at Waco

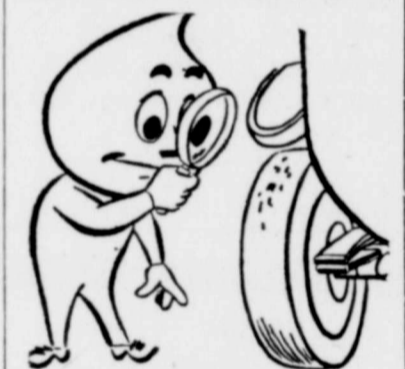
Waco, Texas — Gilbert P. Gaitan has enrolled at the James Connally Campus of the Texas State Technical Institute in Waco, Texas.

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do with the Russians' move to establish a nuclear weapons capability at Cienfuegos. He is so dependent on the Soviets for financial aid that he is likely no longer in authority insofar as these actions are concerned. This is of little consequence except that whatever action is taken to see that a formidable military base is not established in Cuba must be directed to the Soviets themselves. In the meantime, Central and South America could be imperiled but, of course, an advantage over North America would be the primary goal.

We should tell the Russians now that all bids are off in all other directions, including the strategic arms limitation talks now going on, unless they stop any plan they may have for building bases in Cuba or any place else near the Western Hemisphere. In the meantime, North, Central, and South America should make it clear that strict sanctions of all trade and commerce will be imposed against Cuba if plans believed to be in the making are not immediately abandoned.

Congressman Omar Burleson Honored

Washington, D.C. — Congressman Omar Burleson was presented today the "The Watchdog of the Treasury Award", of the National Associated Businessmen, Inc. The award was made in recognition of Burleson's voting for economy and against inflation. The presentation was made by H. Vernon Scott, Executive Vice President of the businessmen's organization.

The N.A.B. has been rating members of Congress on their votes for fiscal responsibility since 1964 and presents awards for each Congress to those members whose records are for economy and against excessive Government spending. Burleson has received the award on previous occasions.

In accepting the award Burleson said, "Government, like an individual, cannot forever spend money it doesn't have and maintain the confidence and credibility necessary to support it. The interest on the public debt is now approaching \$20 Billion. The prospects are for more deficits and more borrowing." "In addition the Federal Government is engaging in costly programs for which it was never designed, which ends in failure and in waste. There is enough expense of Government without doing so many things of doubtful value."

In accepting the recognition Burleson expressed his appreciation for the encouragement it gave him to continue efforts to keep the country's financial position strong and at the same time restrain the inflationary pressures eroding the value of the dollar.

"In the face of all demands for more Federal money, restraints have got to be imposed if inflation is to be curbed. I question no man's sincerity, but I do question judgments. The symbol of the bulldog as watching the Treasury is good but sometimes I feel he is surrounded and outnumbered by the pack," the Congressman commented on the occasion of receiving the award.

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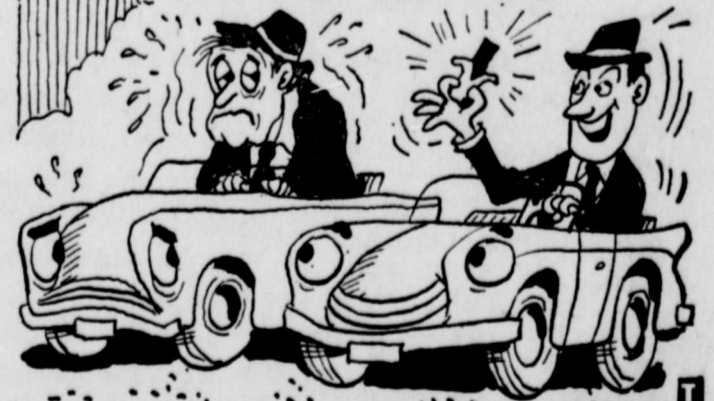
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ONE FOR THE ROAD
