Have you ever wondered just how we select the different color combinations for the new construction at each campus?

Here is an example of how the process works for selecting the exterior materials and colors.

First, our architect suggests a range of colors and materials for the project.

The contractor collects samples of the materials in been involved in all of principal at each campus. the colors recommended by the architect.

Then, we have a Color Committee that looks through the suggestions and selects several possible colors that may work on the particular project.

The contractor then builds several "mockups" of the area with some of the samples.

The Color Committee addition. then selects the best combination of colors for the project.

The contractor will then build a "mock-up" of the selection by the Color Committee for their final approval.

If it meets their approval, the materials are ordered and installed.

> FSA makes payments on up to the maximum eligible pounds of milk produced and marketed by each operation per fiscal year. The annual maximum eligible pound limit per dairy operation drops to 2.4 million pounds per fiscal year on Sept., 1, 2012.

MILC participants must select a month for which FSA will begin issuing payments for each fiscal year. Starting with the dairy operation's selected month, FSA will issue MILC payments based on that month's milk production and the milk production for each consecutive month thereafter with an effective payment rate until the operation reaches the production cap or the fiscal year ends.

Dairy producers must select a start month on, or before, the 14th of the month before the month which they want to receive payments and before the selected month's Boston Class I fluid price is announced to the public. Or the dairy producer has the option to select the month in which the contract application is submitted as their start month.

For subsequent years or if they wish to change a previously selected start month the producer must select a start month prior to the 14th of the month before the month which they want to receive payments and before the selected month's Boston Class I milk price is announced to the public.

In addition, if changing a start month selection, the change has to be made by the 14th of the month before the month originally selected. Producers may contact their local FSA office to sign up for the MILC program.



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
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Muleshoe coach concludes comments at presentation

Marshal Head was always the smallest player on the field since he started playing football. He never backed away from a challenge and in fact always wanted to go against the best player for the opposition and he seldom lost a battle.

Danny Montejano is one of my heroes said Coach Wood. No one worked harder in the off season. He took full advantage of his time during the summer and earned a starting position.

Sergio Montejano is Danny's younger but not his little brother. Little did we know what impact he would have when he started this season?


