





EARLY DETECTION HELPS CURE CANCER

Breast cancer is so common -over 60,000 American women contract it every year -that physicians agree every woman should examine her breasts every month for signs of it. At least 85% of all breast cancers are curable if caught early enough, but over half are now fatal because of needless delay.


