The Sterling County 4-H Club will be represented by twenty-two members in the District Contests to be held Saturday, May 1. Site of the contests is the campus of Angelo State University. Twenty-eight different contests will be held Saturday; several others have already been held. Sterling County has entries in five of the contests.

In the Beef Cattle Business Junior Symposium, Lisa Horwood and Russell Davis will be competing in the Junior Division of the contest. Their demonstration is based on performance-testing of beef cattle as it is being done on the Horwood ranch. Their coach is Mrs. S.K. Horwood.

A Civil Defense Demonstration will be given by Theresa Blum and Becky Hodges. Their demonstration is based on the range fire plan developed and used successfully here two years ago. Coach of this team is Mrs. Clinton Hodges.

The Junior Range Grass Identification team is composed of John Lackey, Michael Lackey, Eddie Probandt, and Victor Probandt. Senior grass identification team members are Diane Gaston, DeNeal Reed, Skeete Foster and Steven Foster. They are studying the seventy range grasses on the list under the direction of the county agent.

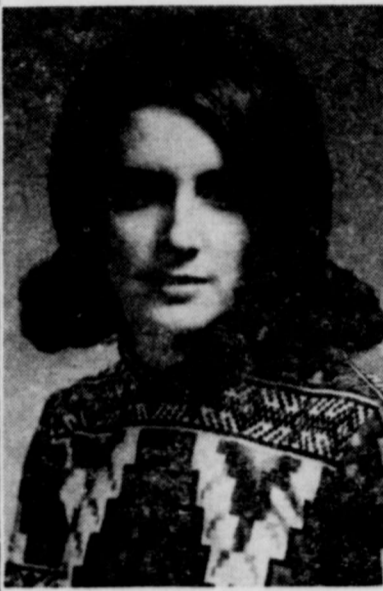

A worm sample taken from heep on the Claude Collins Estate Ranch by Cowin Collins was identified as non-screwworm by the laboratory at Mission. The sample was taken from a ewe's eye according to Corwin. This is the second non-screwworm sample in Sterling County this year.

Texas sheep producers produced more spring lambs early and sold more of them as feeders this year according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. About 39,000 Texas early lambs were marketed prior to March 1 this year. This is nearly 50 per cent more than last year. A much larger proportion of these lambs sold as feeders this year. Marketing intentions during March-May are expected to be over 70 per cent above last year with a larger percentage of them going as feeders.

The number of early lambs in Texas is 1.4 million, 14 per cent more than in 1970. Weather conditions were good for early lambing in the state but spring grazing conditions are poor. Two-thirds of the Texas sheep and lambs on feed were in the feedlots with the rest on pasture programs. The number on feed, March 1, was nine percent below last year, but placements during January-February showed a gain of 29 percent.

NOTICE OF HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT OR CONSTRUCTION

The Texas Highway Department is planning to proceed with the development of the proposed highway improvements on State 158, from U.S. Highway 87 at Sterling City, Northeast 6.4 miles. Since the Administration of the Highway Department has approved the route and design proposed for development of this project, work will begin on the next phase of engineering necessary for the development of this project.

Improvements will consist of complete reconstruction of the existing highway. The existing alignment will be relocated where considered necessary and the new right-of-way will vary in width from 100 feet to approximately 200 feet as needed.

Maps, drawings showing geometric design and all other available data concerning the development of this project may be inspected at the Resident Engineer's Office at Sterling City Texas.

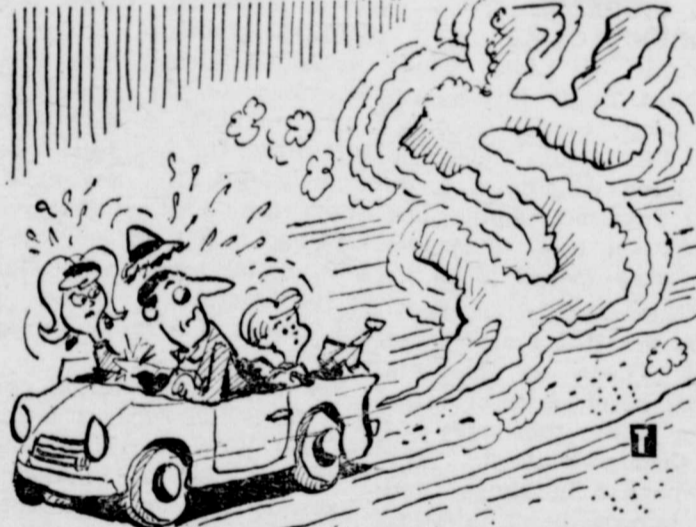
REGIONAL RESULTS

LIONS CRIPPLED CHILDRENS' CAMP

Members of Lions Clubs throughout Texas this month are pausing to pay recognition to their camp for crippled children which has given over 12 thousand handicapped youngsters a new dimension since it was opened in 1953.

The camp, located at Kerrville in the Hill Country of Central Texas, is free to crippled, blind, deaf or mute children from the ages of seven through sixteen. The 17 permanent buildings and other improvements dotting the 504-hill-side acres represent an investment of more than \$700,000.

At the camp, these youngsters who have been denied a normal childhood through no fault of their own learn to shed their shyness imposed by their handicaps. By mutual association with other handicapped children and by skillful and gentle counseling, these youngsters have found the freedom to grow, mentally and spiritually, into useful citizens of tomorrow.

While the Lions are paying tribute to their camp, we would like to pay tribute to the Lions and their friends who have supported this great venture of the heart. We know a man never stands so straight as when he stoops to help a crippled child.

Social Security Tips

INCREASED SOCIAL SECURITY CHECKS DUE

First checks to include the new 10 percent monthly benefit increase authorized in legislation acted upon this week by Congress will reach 26 million social security beneficiaries on June 3. Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, said today that the regular June 3 checks covering benefits for the month of May will reflect the new higher amount. Separate checks, scheduled to reach beneficiaries later in June, will cover the amount of the increase for the months of January through April. Ball emphasized that social security beneficiaries do not need to get in touch with a social security office to get the checks. The payments will be mailed to beneficiaries automatically.

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.
