Coaches of this group were Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum, Mrs. Charlie Davis and Mrs. I.W. Terry.

The senior range grass identification team placed second in that contest and will compete in the State 4-H Contests at College Station June 2-4. Team members were DeNeal Reed who was fourth high individual in the contest, Steven Foster who was fifth high individual, Skeete Foster, and Diane Gaston.

A Junior Safety Demonstration team with Amy Hodges and Jennifer Lackey as members placed second in their contest. Mrs. Barlemann trained this group. The junior range grass identification team placed third with John Lackey, Michael Lackey, Eddie Probandt and Victor Probandt as members.

The twenty-two girls and boys who took part in the contests, and did so well, are to be congratulated as are the coaches who worked with them. Much hard work was done by all but the results were good, and as someone said, it was a pretty good day Saturday for the club. The cooperation of all the parents in getting these club members to San Angelo and their time is greatly appreciated.

According to Mrs. ROXY Brock, clerk in the local ASCS office, Sterling County has been approved on the state level for inclusion in the emergency livestock feed program but as of Wednesday of this week, approval from Washington had not been received. The feed program and its regulations has been set up by Congress in Washington to be administered by local and state ASCS offices. On last Saturday, news reports stated that 235 of the 254 counties in Texas had been approved at the state level for assistance in the program. Federal approval from Washington is expected in a matter of days.

As soon as the county is approved, local livestockmen will be informed of details of the program. Forms and applications will be furnished at that time.

The county has been approved to graze dry land CAP fields and set-aside acres thru June 30 with no charge. This approval was made official last week and does apply here.

The students will wash the cars at the Stockman's Supply building from 7:30 till, it was said.

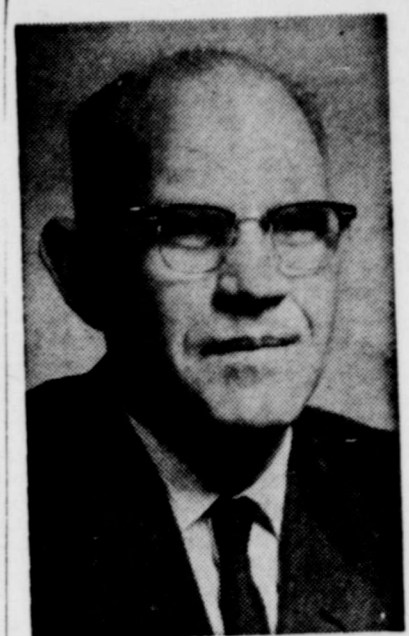

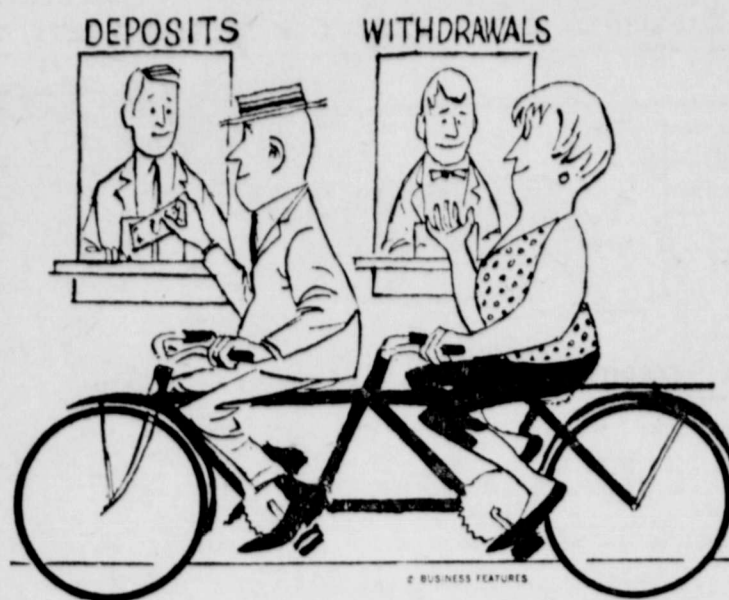

Social Security Tips

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition.

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between

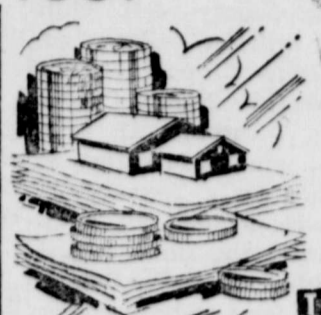

4-H CLUB MEMBERS RAISING MONEY BY SELLING CHOCOLATE

Sterling County 4-H club members will be calling on local citizens to purchase a bar of World's Finest Chocolate, May 7 through 21, as a part of a statewide effort to raise funds for a Texas 4-H educational center. In addition, part of the funds raised locally will remain in the local county fund to be used for various purposes.

Mrs. Clinton Hodges, local 4-H leader, who is heading the county's sale campaign, says the county sales goal is 13 bars per 4-H member. The bars will sell for a dollar each.

A State 4-H Center is badly needed says Mrs. Hodges, since the 4-H program does not own any type of training or camping facility. The proposed center is being developed by the Texas 4-H Foundation and will cost approximately 1 million dollars. It will accommodate about 175 people. The center will be the focal point for camping-type programs, 4-H leader training, inter-national 4-H activities, and other club activities. When not in use by 4-H, the center will be available to other groups with educational programs.

While the 4-H'ers themselves make their contribution, a statewide development council composed of business leaders will help raise the balance of the funds.

The Texas 4-H Foundation is made of businessmen from all areas of the state with each Extension Service district having two representatives. District Seven representatives on the Foundation are Nathan Donsky of San Angelo and Curly Hays of Abilene.

Local 4-H club members will be taking advance orders for the chocolate with the first deliveries to be made next week. In addition, they are planning a house-to-house campaign to help raise the funds. Other leaders working on the program besides Mrs. Hodges are Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum and Mrs. Charlie Davis.

The local 4-H club will receive ten percent of the funds raised through the chocolate sales; forty percent will go to the state center fund, and the remainder will pay for the chocolate. Each county in Texas is carrying on the same program but at different times. Two weeks will be devoted to the campaign in each county with the state being divided into four areas. District Seven will be working during the period May 7 through 21 in the twenty-two counties that make up the district.

Funds raised in this manner will be used to construct a particular section of the center. This section will be designated by an appropriate marker.
