The rains this week covered quite a bit of country. Although the amounts varied, all of it was appreciated.

During the process of a trip to Wichita Falls Sunday, it was necessary to use the windshield wipers from the time we left here to within about fifty miles of Wichita Falls. There the rain quit completely and never did move into the Wichita Falls area. Between here and there Sunday, the amount falling varied from just enough to make the wipers necessary to heavy showers.

On the return trip home on Wednesday, there was water standing in the fields in the area around Abilene. The area around Albany appeared to be in the best condition. Ranges there looked good with the grass green and growing. It was evident that the area had received earlier rains because of the growth and amount of grass present in that area.

According to announcements in the newspapers, the vaccination of horses for VEE will be completed by August 15. At that time, the vaccine remaining will be moved out of Texas into other states where the vaccination program will be put into effect.

If anyone has any horses that were not vaccinated in the series of vaccinations here on July 17-18, it would be well to contact a veterinarian and make arrangements to have this done prior to August 15. It is felt that most of the horses here were immunized in July but there could be a few that were not given the shot for some reason or the other.

It appears that the vaccine has been effective. The number of confirmed cases and losses seems to have dropped according to reports from the authorities in charge.

Health Column OXYGEN FOR SENILE MINDS?

Without oxygen, human life cannot exist. Without enough oxygen, the human brain does not function properly.

Many scientists, including Dr. Eleanor Jacobs at the State University of New York at Buffalo, suspect that decreased oxygen to the brain can be one cause of senility. In Dr. Jacob's experiments, some senile patients exposed to a special oxygen-filled chamber have shown dramatic improvements in thinking and memory.

Senile patients exposed to the chamber for 90-minute sessions twice a day for 15 days showed improvements on psychological tests that ranged from 35 to 300 percent. They became active, slept better, and took greater interest in caring for themselves. A control group not exposed to the chamber showed no improvements at all.

Although the improvements showed for some time, Dr. Jacobs says not enough is known about how long the effects do in fact last. The researchers also stress that there is no evidence that the improvement will persist or that all senile patients will benefit even temporarily.

'This was only a first small step,' Dr. Jacobs says. 'It's as if we picked up and identified one grain of sand but may be standing in the middle of the whole Sahara.'

Whatever the eventual outcome of experiments with senile patients, the body needs enough oxygen to function well. Cigarette smoking and pollution cut down the amount of oxygen we breathe; the lungs and heart as well as the brain are affected. Enough oxygen is necessary for all minds, not only senile ones.

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

Washington, D. C.—Comments in this column are never intended to be that we all read in our newspapers. Rather an effort is made to go behind the scenes as much as possible for what is hoped to be the unusual.

About every columnist and certainly all news media have carried the bombshell announcement of President Nixon's plan to visit Red China. It can be assumed that the President had been thinking on this possibility for a considerable period of time but, as far as is known now, some of his closest advisors were not aware of the suddenness of the announcement.

Obviously, the President could not contact every category of opinion on the advisability of his making a visit to Peking. If he had asked those of us who have opposed the communist regime for many years should he make the trip, the answer would have been "no." In this same category are those of us who oppose the recognition of Red China as a member of the United Nations. The regime on mainland China has never demonstrated characteristics of a nationhood entitled to such recognition.

Having said this, it is an accomplished fact that President Nixon is going to visit the leaders of Red China. The nation can only hope that good may come of it. There is no need to carp and condemn the action from now until the trip is made. It is his judgment and the hope must be held that the exercise of that judgment will in some wise be productive for eventually relieving tensions in that part of the world.

Some writers and commentators are already comparing the President's trip to that of Prime Minister Chamberlain's visit to Hitler in Munich prior to World War II. Some have characterized the trip as simply the President sitting down with Chairman Chou En-lai to eat Peking duck. Maybe even this is worth something.

It is hard to imagine that peace in that part of the world can be eased as long as the communists continue their aggressive aims against the smaller and weaker nations in Southeast Asia. It could—and this is the big hope—possibly lead to some better understanding between communist China and our own government regarding the intents of both in Asia.

The war in Vietnam has been sustained and prolonged primarily by the aid and assistance given by Moscow and Peking. If—just if—something may be said or done to help wind down the whole thing then, of course, the trip would be a victory.

From all indications the President is well aware that the chances of solid accomplishments are slim, but even

operating on the theory of "The 'what can you lose' is worth while."

The "what can you lose" is, in fact, the key to the whole thing. The matter of our relationship with the Nationalist Chinese on Formosa, South Korea, Japan, and others, certainly must not be impaired and this seems to be the assurance of the President.

On the other hand, since the announcement, Premier Chou En-lai has continued to condemn and berate the United States as an aggressor in both Korea and Vietnam. This should not be entirely unexpected although not happily received. If the Red Chinese leaders insist, which again they have done since the announcement, that we abandon the Chiang Kai-shek regime on Formosa; that we get out of Korea and out of South Vietnam; that we not assist Japan in maintaining a defensive strength and, in fact, completely withdraw from the Pacific Theater, then a good duck dinner would be all that could come from the trip.

As for the trade with Red China, they would have markets for a great many materials which we have to export but the kind of export is something else. If anything assisted them in building up their capabilities against the world peace, then the big mistake would have been committed.

As for their exports to this country, textiles would be their principal goods which are already a serious threat to our own textile industry from Japan and other nations in the far East. Again, we must hope for the best since the decision has been made for this contact with the rulers of Red China. We can hope the President's decision is correct and in the meantime support his mission rather than appear as a nation further divided.

As Stephen Decatur said—Our country! In her intercourse with foreign countries may she always be right; but our country, right or wrong!

Texas petroleum industry taxes account for 17.9% of all State taxes.



Blissfully, we say, on the inventor of the buffet party table. Given a cold winter evening nothing cheers like helping oneself from a sparkling table, picking and choosing along a candlelit procession of surprises and delights.

Both delightful and surprising will be this shrimp and rice spectacular, a molded affair exactly right for buffet serving. And no ho-hum mixture, this. Flavor runs deep. And the texture, interesting with as many shrimp as can be spared, is blissfully moist and creamy.

SHRIMP AND RICE CREAM MOLD

- 2 cans (4 1/2 ounces each) shrimp
- 1/2 cup uncooked rice
- 1 1/4 cups chicken broth
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 cup freshly grated onion
- 1/2 teaspoon white pepper
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 cup heavy cream, whipped

Drain shrimp, reserving canned liquid. Chill. Combine rice and broth; simmer, covered, 20-25 minutes, stirring frequently to make rice "starchy." Soften gelatin in shrimp liquid; stir into hot rice. Cool rice; add onion, pepper, mayonnaise, and about 1 1/2 cans of the shrimp. Fold in cream; turn into a 1-quart mold and a 1-cup mold. Chill until firm. Unmold smaller mold on the larger one. Decorate with remaining shrimp, with parsley and lemon slices. Serve with Curried Mayonnaise, combining 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 teaspoon curry powder, 1 teaspoon Dijon style mustard. About 8 servings.

For Social Security

Worried about proving your age? J. M. Talbot, social security manager, said the people at your social security office may be able to help you make your claim. There are some things you can do ahead of time. If you were born in a state that kept birth records when you were born, write for your birth certificate. If the state where you were born wasn't keeping birth records at the time, the next best thing is a baptismal record.

If you were baptized before age 5, you'll be asked to find out if there is a record. If there is, it is all the proof of your age you'll need.

If you have no birth or baptismal record, the people working in the social security office will be happy to suggest some other possibilities. Some examples are an old family Bible, school records, and federal census records.

You may not recall now, but when you bought your marriage license you gave your age. You may also have some old insurance policies about the house. The list of proofs to try is quite long. When you file your claim, it helps if you have already found the oldest thing you can that shows your age. Usually, the older the record the better it is for proving your age. It will help the people at the social security office pay your benefits sooner if you think ahead on your age.

Many times a telephone call before you visit the social security office will help. You may be able to file your claim by phone. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Persons who are unable to meet with him are encouraged to call the office in San Angelo at 949-4608.

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a

IN ANY ELECTION; MUST REGISTER

Secretary of State, Martin Dies, Jr., has notified all county clerks that persons 18, 19, and 20 years old can now vote in any election or all elections. Such is now law by adoption of the 26th amendment to the U.S. Constitution on July 1.

The unregistered youngsters MUST register, though, with local tax assessor-collector's office.

So, all you potential voters, get registered and be eligible to vote. Something may come up to vote on.



job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If an individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Social Security Tips

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

Forms for application for a social security number or a request for change in social security records can be obtained at the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Persons who are unable to meet with him are encouraged to call the office in San Angelo at 949-4608.

Immunization Shots for Children Now Necessary

The state of Texas now has a law requiring immunization for all students enrolled in schools and colleges.

All students in grades 1 through 5 have to have 3 oral polio shots, 3 diphtheria-tetanus shots, measles, rubella, and smallpox. Grades 6 and above have to have the shots or doses in rules set forth-like polio to age 19, smallpox and diphtheria and tetanus within 10 years, and the others through age 12 or the illness itself.

All immunizations should be completed by the time school is entered.


