The rains of the past weeks have been wonderful—there's never been an August like this one in the memory of many here. While the moisture is most welcome, it does bring on some potential problems for homeowners, their yards, shrubs, and flowers. The wet weather coupled with cool temperatures and high humidity provides an environment favorable to many plant diseases and associated problems.

Roses are susceptible to both powdery mildew and black spot in this environment. Symptoms of powdery mildew are a white, powdery coating on the leaves, buds, and young stems. Immature leaves may be curled, distorted, and light in color. Black spot symptoms are large, round, black spots with frayed or irregular leaf edges. The spots may occur on either side, or both sides of the leaves, and frequently develop on young branches also.

Both powdery mildew and black spot on roses can be treated with a spray containing Phaltan, the only fungicide recommended for both these diseases on roses. Phaltan, a trade name for folpet, is the basic ingredient or many fungicides put out by a number of chemical companies. It should be used at the rate recommended on the container.

Powdery mildew also attacks crape myrtles in the same manner it does roses. However, Phaltan or folpet, is not effective against powdery mildew on crape myrtle. Two other fungicides, Karathon or Actidione are recommended for this plant. Dusting or spraying with sulfur is also effective against powdery mildew on both roses and crape myrtle but is not recommended when the temperature may approach or exceed 95 degrees, a distinct possibility in the coming weeks. Foliage burns could result.

There is some slime mold appearing in some of the lawns now also. Slime mold is evidenced by a black, powdery fungus on the grass. It will appear in small spots in the yard. The black substance will come off when walking through the grass affected. Usually, the small areas will not cause damage to the lawn but if large areas are affected, spraying with a fungicide containing maneb or zineb will control it. It is also a good idea to pick up the grass clippings now. The build-up of clippings and the weather will cause slime mold and other fungus diseases to take over.

Livestock owners are reminded that they need to record all livestock brands and marks in the county clerk's office after August 30, according to the new law passed in the last session of the Texas Legislature. Under the new law, all brands now recorded will expire six months after the effective date of September 1. This means that all persons now using a registered brand or mark must register it between September 1, 1971 and February 29, 1972. After that time, any unrecorded brand becomes available on a "first-come" basis. The brands and marks must be registered or re-recorded every ten years.

They have huge copper mines and oil companies have branches there.

The flight from San Angelo will take Lee to Washington, D. C. (did) Wednesday. She has a day in Paris Thursday, after the all night flight from Washington. From Paris she will fly to Kinshasa and then on to Luluaburg, Congo. She will be in a town 160 kilometers south of Luluaburg.

The Sterling School To Open Monday

Free or Reduced Lunch Policy

The Sterling City Independent School District today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for Sterling County school children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have adopted a policy that allows families with few children to receive free or reduced school lunches with income ranging from \$1410 for the smaller family to a high of \$8080 per year income, if children total 12 in number.

Families falling within the scale or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office at school. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which effect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under provisions of the policy the school nurse and the lunchroom supervisor will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the local official he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. James Thompson, superintendent, whose address is Box 26, Sterling City, has been designated as the Hearing Official.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of the lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file at the superintendent's office where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

No Breakf'st Program at School This Year

The Texas Education Agency has advised local superintendent of schools James Thompson that due to curtailment of USDA funds, no money would be available for the Breakfast Program here this year.

The local school board had planned and set up a free breakfast program for the local school this coming year, but now that project will not be carried out said the superintendent.

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Social Security Tips For Social Security

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

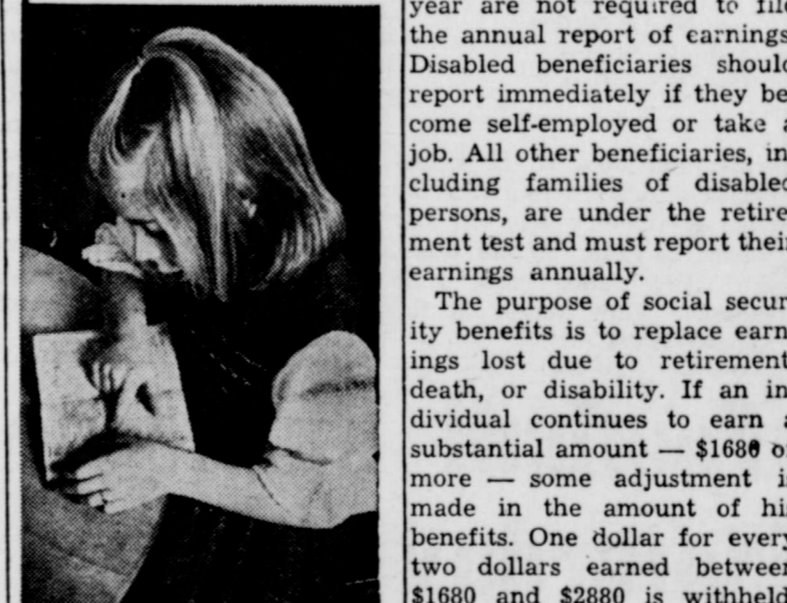

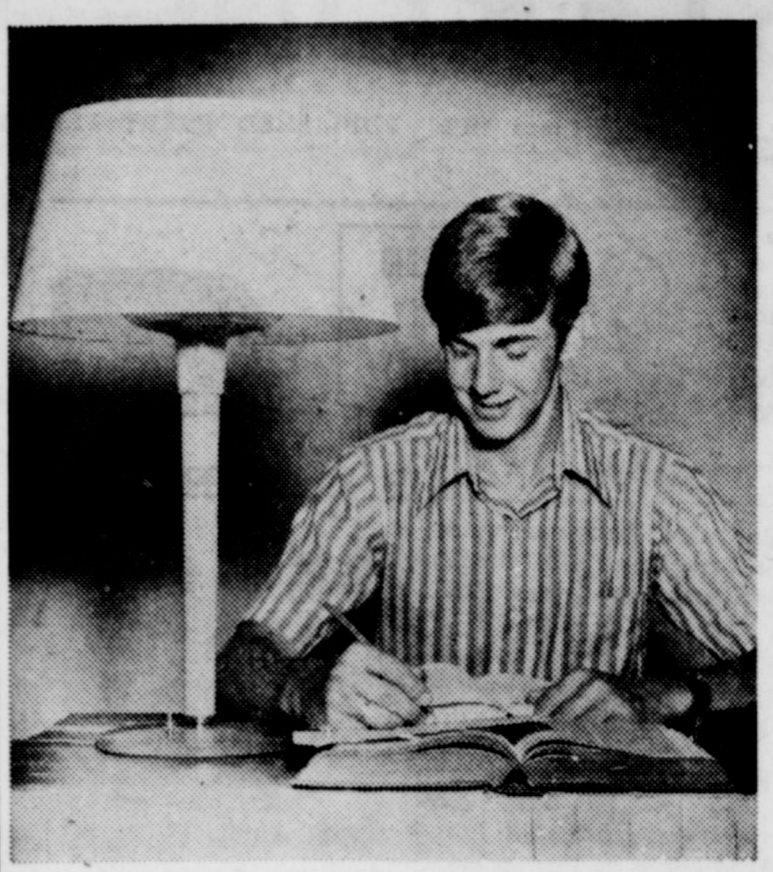

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste—the third most expensive community service in the land. which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience; these sacks were selected because—unlike plastic sacks—they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks separate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provisions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done—and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can... for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

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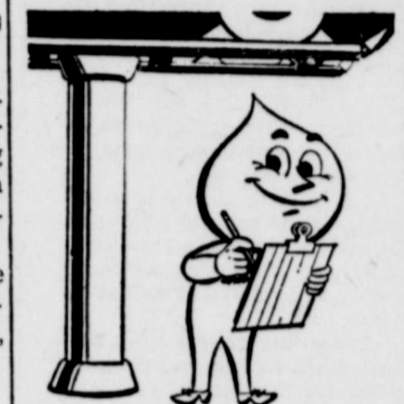

Disaster Aid Plans Discussed Here

A group of interested persons met in the community center Tuesday evening to determine the needs of Sterling City in case of a disaster. The meeting was informal and present was John Lukert, Field Consultant, Texas State Department of Health, Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety, to advise and counsel with the community in improving any existing services and determining any other needs the community might have in case of a disaster.

A council, temporary in nature, was organized to evaluate what is available and help in incorporating all phases of emergency care. After evaluation and making the necessary arrangements, the group will not be an organized one, but everyone in the community will be expected to assume their share of the responsibility as designated to them.

It has been estimated that twenty thousand persons die needlessly as a result of inadequate emergency medical care, and since this is an alarming situation, every effort is being made for community, unique in its own needs, to formulate their own plans and make them work in time of disaster.

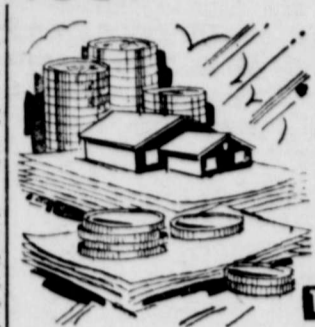
