

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste the third most expensive community service in the land. .which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . for the sup-port of other worthwhile Scouting programs.



Worried about proving your age? J. M.Talbot, social security manager, said the people at your social security office Earnings can exceed \$900.00 things you can do ahead of time. If you were born in a To qualify you must have state that kept birth records the time, the next best thing is a baptismal record.

If you were baptized before 500 South Ervay-Suite 629 A age 5, you'll be asked to find out if there is a record. If there is, it is all the proof of your age you'll need.

> If you have no birth or baptismal record, the people working in the social security office will be happy to suggest some other possibilities. Some examples are an old family Bible, school records, and federal census records.

You may not recall now, but when you bought your marriage license you gave your age. You may also have some old insurance policies about the house. The list of proofs to try is quite long. When you file your claim, it helps If you have already social security office pay your benefits sooner if you think ahead on your age.

Many times a telephone call before you visit the social security office will help. You may be able to file your claim by phone. Contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area. Persons who are unable to meet with him are encouraged to call the office in San Angelo at 949-4608.

WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS REPORT

Most social security benefit ciaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot,

social security manager. Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. 



Local County Agent Gets Highest Honor

State awards winners will be recognized at the State 2-3 at Wichita Falls, but presentations of the award will be made at the national meeting, September 7-11 at Columbus, Ohio.

Barlemann is cited 'For his outstanding educational programs in range management and brush control. Under his supervision result demonstrations in brush control and livestock production have benefited the county's economy. County 4-H members and teams have been consistent winners in programs pertaining to range management.'

College Station - Arthur 1951-1954, he was assistant Barlemann, Jr., Sterling county agent in Van Zandt County agricultural agent since County. He served as assistant county agent in Tom Green County from 1954-1956 before highest honor given by the becoming Sterling county agent.

Barlemann was largely responsible for demonstrations on poisonous plant control on range land that led to a control program by many ranchers.

As a result of brush control programs that led to better methods of controlling invading species and increasing income, over 30,000 acres of rangeland are treated yearly.

Oil Production Hits Nearly 2 Million Barrels in County

DALLAS, Production of Texas crude oil last year again hit an all-time high while additions to reserves continued to lag, according to the latest compilation of the Texas Mid-Oil & Gas Continent Association.

The state's oil fields produced 1.2 billion barrels of crude bringing the total for the past 81 years of recorded production to 34.1 billion barrels.

"Economic benefits from the production were felt throughout Texas," says Kenneth E. Montague, Association president, "as 205 of the state's 254 counties had producing oil wells. It is unfortunate that more oil was produced than was found in Texas - pulling our reserves down for the third straight year."

Sterling County, which has had recorded production since 1947, had a total crude oil output of 24,937,204 barrels up to the beginning of 1971. Sterling County production in 1970 was 1,999,879 barrles at the rate of 5,479 barrels daily.

Fifteen counties produced more than 25 million barrels with Andrews topping the list with 71,684,656 barrels followed by Ector with 68,562,247 and Scurry with 58,0895,376.

Gregg remained the all-time champion with cumulative production of 2.2 billion barrels. Ector is second with 1.7 billion barrels.






