New Education Bill Will Change Local ISD Format

With the many changes and revisions to be brought about by House Bill 246 of the 67th Texas Legislature, school curriculum reform in Texas is coming about. Because of the concern of many parents, teachers and school instruction has become a subject near and dear to their hearts.

Muleshoe Independent School District Superintendent H. John Fuller has written a news article in conjunction with the curriculum reforms which will require school districts to offer kindergarten through Grade 12 a well-balanced format. The following paragraphs contain the import of the upcoming changes and how they will affect Muleshoe Schools.

'83 PIK Wheat Entitlements Due

Bailey County ASCS Executive Director Danny Noble has issued a final reminder to all county producers regarding the final certification date upcoming this Friday, July 15. This is the final date to certify or request aerial measurement service for upland cotton. corn, grain sorghum peanuts, sunflowers, soybeans and conservation use acreage (CUA). Noble emphasized that any farmer who misses this deadline "will become ineligible for price support loans, land diversion payments, deficiency payments and the PIK program." "If you have a 'zero'' certification on a program crop, that is also required," the Director explained.

"Accurate certifications of these crops is essential and important, so please don't guess at these,' Noble stated.

that the ASCS office here has just received the loading order from Kansas City which gives the location of their 1983 PIK wheat. Noble says that most all of the PIK entitlements have been figured and typed and those that can be mailed out will be mailed about

July 20. Another important factor for area producers to be aware of concerns 1983 wheat harvested for PIK. Producers who are participating in the wheat PIK program, and do not have a sufficient amount under loan to satisfy their PIK requirement ARE RE-QUIRED to place 1983 wheat from an eligible farm under loan. Farmers who are in this category must adhere to this rule, or they will be subject to liquidated damage assessments, Noble said "Although individual letters have been mailed to producers, we have yet to receive response from some. If this situation fits you, be sure to bring your scale tickets or a copy of the ledger to the ASCS office in order to avoid any undue problems." the Director advised. Producers have until November 30 to take care of this situation.

Conservation Use Acreage spot checks will start on July 18 and these acres must be kept free of weeds, insects, rodents and kept from wind and water erosion. Should the acreage not be properly maintained, a producer would be ruled ineligible for any payments, Cont. Page 6, Col. 3



With July 4 behind us and the traffic toll now fact rather than prediction. I am reminded how Will Rogers summed it up. "We have killed more people celebrating our independence Day than we lost fighting for it." Hopefully our children learn a

lesson in the paradox.

Speaking of children, one tax planning technique frequently used is to employ children and other family members in the family business. It is especially useful with minor children as a means of shifting income from a high bracket taxpayer

to low bracket taxpayers. For example, a 50% bracket taxpayer who hires his two children and pays them each \$250 a month will shift \$6,000 a year of income from his return and save \$3,000 in income taxes. Unless the children have additional income from other sources, they will pay no federal income tax on

this compensation. In order to be deductible, compensation paid to your minor children must meet these two tests:

1. The amounts must be reasonable, 2. The payments must be for services

actually rendered. In using this technique, be sure to keep time records on the children showing the nature of services they performed, the responsibilities they assumed, and the number of hours they worked. In short, treat them just like other employees who

are not related to you. If your business is a sole proprietorship, you needn't withhold social security from their paychecks, but partnerships and corporate employers must withhold. If the child's income doesn't exceed \$3,300 for the year, there is no need to withhold federal income taxes either.

There's another benefit in using the children as employees of the family business, and it may be more valuable than the tax savings involved. If properly done, the children should learn some good lessons about the value of an earned dollar and how it should be spent or saved.







The latest estimates of life expectancy in the U.S. lengthen prospects for Americans. Until a few years ago, male life expectancy was 70, female expectancy 78. In 1981, expectancy

had risen to 73 and 81. Now, according to a recent study, age prospects are still climbing; in another fifteen years or so they will likely be 74 plus and 86. The reason is fewer

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
