Allen Price showed the champion commercial fleece of the American Royal Wool Show in Kansas City which was judged on October 16. Three fleeces were entered in the show by Allen. Two fleeces entered in the finewool division of the commercial fleece class placed first and second. A third fleece in the finewool division of the territory wool show placed first also.

In the judging for the grand champion fleece of the show, Allen's champion commercial fleece was beaten out by another fleece entered by Sterling County residents. Janis and Lee Igo's first place Rambouillet fleece was adjudged grand champion fleece of the show. A Columbia fleece from Montana was reserve champion of the show.

Livestock producers who are interested in training in artificial insemination and pregnancy determination can get this training in a clinic in San Angelo in the near future. The clinic will be sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the American Breeders Service in San Angelo, November 9 through 12.

The clinics offer instruction and information on the management of the breeding herd covering nutrition, disease prevention, selection and records in addition to the artificial insemination and pregnancy determination training.

Registration for the AI course is \$125 while the pregnancy determination is an additional \$100. The course will be limited to 30 persons and advance registration is necessary. For more information, contact the county agent's office.

Spring forward, fall back— an easy way to remember which way to turn your clocks with respect to daylight and standard time. Time reverts to standard time this Saturday night, the last weekend in October, so don't forget to turn your clocks back one hour when you go to bed Saturday night. Or you can get up at two A.M. Sunday morning and do it since this is the official time at which the change occurs. If you forget to change your clocks, you're going to be one hour behind Sunday, an embarrassing thing which has happened to some people in the past.

This is the time you get that hour's sleep you lost in April when the clocks moved forward one hour.

A confirmed case of screw-worms has been found in Coke County, according to the last report from the Misison laboratory of the Screwworm Eradication program. The report did not specify which section of Coke County the sample was sent in from but this is the nearest confirmed case in recent weeks. Earlier this year, cases were confirmed in Irion County.

Val Verde County continues to be the hotspot with twenty-three cases confirmed during the two week period ending October 16. Edwards County had thirteen cases during the same period with a number of other West Texas Counties having fewer cases confirmed. Statewide, Texas had 90 cases during the period and Arkansas had two.

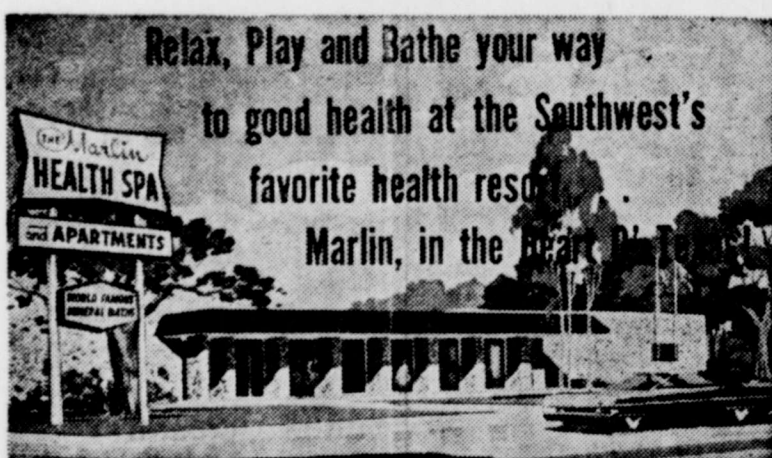

### Social Security Tips CHECK YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY RECORD

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P.O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

Each calendar quarter, the Social Security Administration receives employer reports of earnings showing incorrect social security numbers of employees, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager. These incorrect reports, in many cases, happen when a girl has married but does not have her name changed on social security records.

Mr. Talbot stated that when a girl marries, she should complete a 'Request for Change in Social Security Record' form. After completing the form and returning it to the social security office with her old card, she will be issued a new social security card with the same number but showing the new name.

If the name and number reported by an employer do not match the name and number on file with the Social Security Administration, the earnings might not get to the proper account. This could result in a later loss of social security benefits or in a smaller benefit being paid.

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

### Gold Star Winners Sterling County Winners Named by County Agent

Sponsor of the banquet is West Texas Utilities Company. The award winners will be accompanied by adult leaders or parents and their Extension agents.

Amy has completed five years of 4-H Club work. During that time, her projects have included registered Rambouillets and registered Hampshire sheep, Angora goats, market lambs and range ewe lambs. She has compiled an outstanding record with her own Rambouillets have shown champions at the State Fair of Texas, the Fort Worth show, the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, the Houston show, West Texas Fair at Abilene, San Angelo, and the Sterling County show, and other area shows.

Amy has also taken part in other phases of 4-H Club work. She has been a member of the county's junior grass identification team which placed third in the district contests in San Angelo. In 1970, she presented a Natural Resources Conservation Demonstration at the district contests. She took second place in the Safety Demonstration contest at the district contests in 1971; her partner in the demonstration was Jennifer Lackey.

Amy has won several county awards for her club work. These include the Grain Marketing Award, the Agricultural Award, the Achievement Award and the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers County Award. In addition, she has won the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' silver medallion awarded to the owner of the outstanding breeding sheep of the county show.

Amy owns the Rambouillets and Hampshires she shows. Her Hampshire sheep have also won champion awards in the past. She has sold her Angora goats. At the present time, she has her Rambouillets and Hampshires along with market lambs and steers for projects. She is also participating in the foods and nutrition program of the club.

Skeete Foster has been a 4-H Club member for eight years. Prior to entering high school, he fed market lambs which he showed at the county show, the State Fair, San Antonio and San Angelo.

The junior grass teams of which he was a member placed third in the district contests in 1966, second in 1967 and third in 1968. 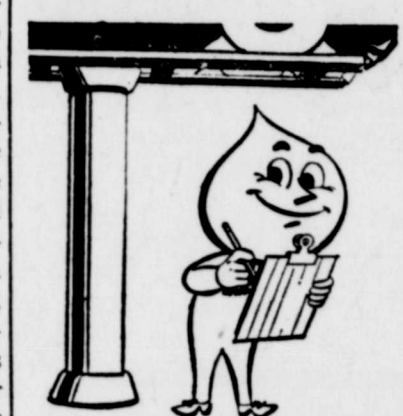

### Oil Production Significant Here

Petroleum production continues to play a significant role in the economy of Sterling County with a direct input of \$7,377,608 last year.

According to the latest compilation of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Assn., the county in 1970 produced 1,999,879 barrels of crude oil valued at \$6,599,601 and 5,328,816 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$788,007. It ranked 112th in value of petroleum produced.

In addition, the county received the stimulation of \$922,201 in royalty payments to landowners and others with mineral interests.

"Sterling was one of 187 Texas counties that had petroleum production valued at more than \$125,000", says Kenneth E. Montague, Texas Mid-Continent president.

Its ability to produce helped Texas meet a record demand with record production of both oil and gas in 1970. This demand has again diminished Texas petroleum reserves as additions failed to offset withdrawals. In Texas, we only drilled 8,114 wells, the smallest number since 1946.

Texas state government benefited from the county's petroleum, receiving \$303,582 in production taxes on crude oil and \$58,351 on natural gas.

Drilling expenditures in the county totaled \$3,871,213 with \$2,338,214 being lost on dry holes. Drillers completed 10 oil wells, 1 gas well and 17 dry holes. Eight wildcats were drilled with seven of them dry.
