School Board Initiates New Policies For District

In a recent Board of Trustees meeting for the Muleshoe Independent School District held July 11, a number of business items were up for approval. Approved was the "Use of Facilities" policy changes which were outlined last month. The board also approved new and revised policies presented by the Texas Association of School Boards Policy Service.

A new student accident insurance program was approved by board members. The new program will expand the accident coverage beyond the current policy which covers only football players to include all junior high and high school participants in any athletic event. Also included in the package will be the opportunity to purchase accident

insurance at a rate of \$12 for school time only and \$38 for 24 hour coverage. Further details on the new insurance program will be released when school starts.

The property insurance program which was submitted by the Texas Association of School Boards was approved.

Upon the recommendation and proposal by John Fuller, school superintendent, the Board Members unanimously approved an increase in the graduation requirements at Muleshoe High School. This new requirement will include the mastery of the Texas Assessment of Basic Skills (TABS). Superintendent Fuller stated that this is only one step in the "right direction" toward improving student achievement. The new requirement is scheduled to begin with the 1985 graduating class. It was noted that students with educational handicaps are exempted from the (TABS) requirement.

The Muleshoe Independent School Board also approved a proposal not to increase student lunch prices for the coming year, and a tax collection report from the Bailey County Appraisal District was approved.

Approval of 1983-84 salaries for school personnel was given by the Board Members following a presentation by Superintendent Fuller. Fuller pointed out to board members that the total salaries expended next

year will be at the same level or slightly less than last years. This savings, according to Fuller, came about by the planning of both school board and administration, and as a result of the failure of the state legislature to mandate

First National Bank Deposit Total Changed

Deposit totals for the June 30, 1983 bank statement of condition shown in the Sunday, July 17 Journal were incomplete for the First National Bank of Muleshoe due to the exclusion of a total demand deposit figure inadvertently left out.

Total deposits for the First National Bank should have reflected \$29,195,367, in lieu of the \$23,660,154 shown in the Sunday article. Total deposits for the two local banks should have been shown at \$61,682,367, instead of the \$56,147,154 reported.

The additional deposit figure brings total deposits for the June 30, 1983 bank call for eight area banks to \$191,859,913 instead of the \$186,324,700 shown in the story. Deposit amounts recorded for the remaining banks mentioned in the story were as follows: Muleshoe State - \$32,487,000; First State Bank, Bovina - \$26,058,352; Security State, Farwell - \$29,873,321; Citizens State, Earth

Muleshoe Little League Wins Local Tournament

Muleshoe's 11-12 year old All-Stars from the Bronco League of Little League Baseball won their own tournament in Muleshoe last week by defeating Friona following four nights of action.

On Monday night, the Muleshoe "Black" team defeated the Friona "Blue" team and the Friona "Red" team downed the Muleshoe "Gray" team.

July Period 'Up' From 1982 Receipts

Figures just released from Bob Bullock, Comptroller of Public Accounts in Austin indicate that Muleshoe and Bailey County has the largest increase in city sales rebates for the period ending on July 8, 1983. Muleshoe's rebates to date show to be 5.83 percent up over the same period of time in 1982. Most other surrounding cities and counties show a definite deficit.

Net payments to Muleshoe for the period just ended totaled \$9,183.88 and \$9,304.81 for the comparable payment in 1982. However, 1983 payments to date for Muleshoe totaled

\$111,146.43 for this period, as compared to the \$105,024.99 of 1982. Thus, the 5.83 percent increase to date.

Bullock sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax last Thursday. "Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

In Cochran County's city of Morton, sales tax rebates were not in comparable with Muleshoe. Morton received a net payment this period in the amount of \$1700.70 - a large drop from the \$2,244.80 at the same time in 1982. Total payments to date for Morton amount to \$22,550.76, a hefty 13.01 percent less than the \$15,922.02 of 1982.

The City of Dimmitt in Castro County received a net payment for the July period of \$7,563.58, down from the \$7,468.29 of 1982. Payments to date for Dimmitt in 1983 have reached \$70,396.20, but still remain 7.80 percent behind the \$76,350.63 recorded at this time in 1982.

Hereford in Deaf Smith County, was one of the cities close-by that showed an actual increase in rebates for this period. Hereford received their check in the amount of \$18,780.68 for the July period, down from the \$23,565.07 comparable payment in 1982. However, the 1983 payments to date for Hereford Cont. Local Police Chief Attends FBI School

Muleshoe's Chief of Police Leslie D. Irvin is currently attending the 134th Session of the FBI National Academy, along with 250 fellow law enforcement officers at Quantico, Virginia according to an announcement to the Journal by FBI Director William H. Webster.

Dave Marr, Muleshoe City Manager, told the Journal on Monday that Irvin had been selected after applying to the school and that the general feeling of the City Officials was that Irvin's new training could help to upgrade the city's leadership. Marr also stated that all expenses incurred by Irvin would be re-imposed by the FBI.

Each of the 50 states will be represented as well as several other provinces, military organizations and civilian organizations. Eleven foreign countries will be represented.

Webster said the 11-week management-level training session would include instruction in the field of education and communication arts, forensic

and behavioral sciences, police management, law, firearms and physical training.

A total of 17,138 officers have graduated from the FBI National Academy since its inception in July, 1935. Nearly 12,000 graduates are still active in law enforcement and of this number, approximately one of every eight occupies the top executive position of his or her agency.

"The FBI National Academy exists to provide the finest professional training possible to carefully selected career law enforcement officers," Mr. Webster said. "Those chosen to attend have shown the dedication, confidence and professionalism necessary to derive the maximum benefits from this enriched training program. Officers with these exceptional qualities have traditionally been identified with the FBI National Academy. By their achievements and devotion to the highest principles of law enforcement, graduates throughout the world have demonstrated the value of this training."

Foreign Agriculturists Visit Bamert Seed Farms

Twenty young foreign agriculturists from fourteen different countries stopped in Muleshoe on Tuesday, July 19 as a part of a ten week agriculture instructional tour of the United States. Their destination in the Muleshoe area was the 2000 acre Bamert Seed Farms where they were taken on a guided tour by farm manager Nick Bamert and owner Carl Bamert. They explained the various seed varieties grown, their purpose and prospective usage. Many of the visitors were fascinated with the irrigation system of the farms and close inspection was allowed of center pivot rigs.

Most of the young visitors who from developing countries, are farm consultants and managers, seed specialists, agronomists and the equivalent of our own county agents. They are involved in livestock, seed, feed and food production in such countries as Thailand, Senegal, Indonesia, Zambia, Yemen, Upper Volta and Nigeria. A number of the agriculturists are currently attending universities in the United States, working towards some kind of degree in ag related subjects.

The group, traveling by charter bus had just come

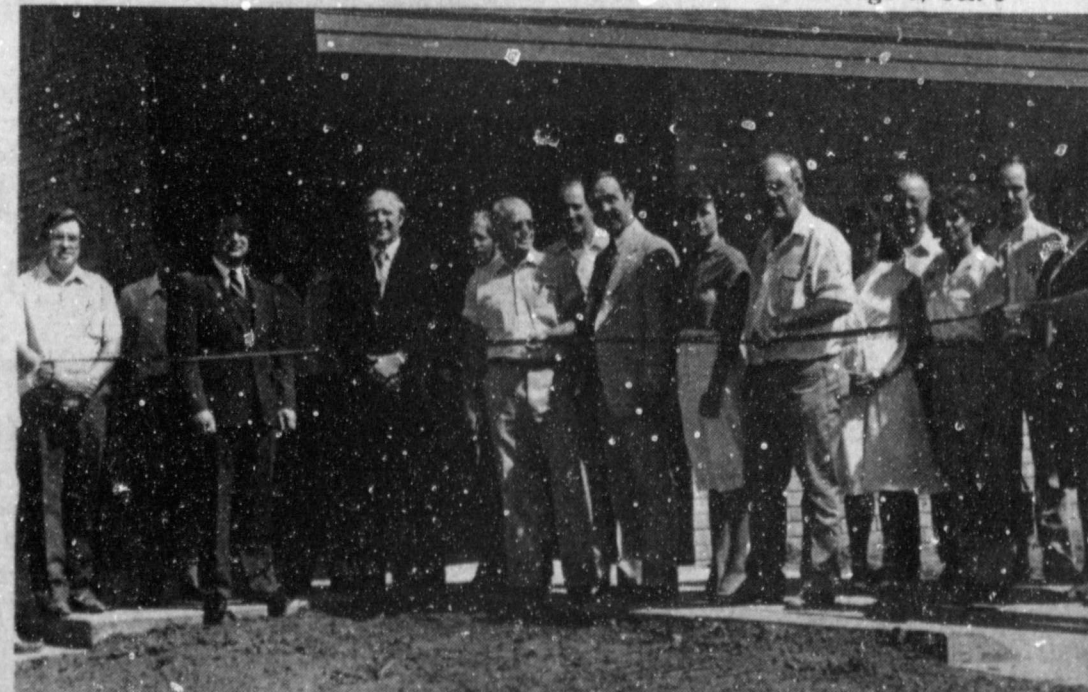
from New Mexico and are on their way to Oklahoma and then on to Indiana. They were accompanied Tuesday by Dr. Charles Vaughan, Professor of Agronomy at Mississippi State University, who is their official tour coordinator and by Norman Hopper, Associate Professor in the Texas Tech Department of Plants and Science. Bamert Seed Farms have

been in operation since 1952, when they first got their start in the soil bank program era. The farms produce many types of range grasses and improved grazing and hay varieties such as sideoats, buffalo, Indiangrass and blue grama for use in arid and semi-arid areas.

VA Basic Loan Rate Increased

The Veterans Administration increased the basic loan-guarantee rate for single-family homes and condominiums by a half percent July 11 to 12.5 percent, said W.E. Welstead, Loan Guaranty Officer for the Waco VA Regional Office.

It was the second rate hike in one month and returned the basic rate to the level set last October 13.

At the same time, the VA maximum interest rate for Graduated Payment Mortgage loans was increased to 12.75 percent.

Other current VA loan-guarantee rates: 14.5 percent for purchase of manufactured home units; 14 percent to buy both a mobile home and a lot; and 14 percent for loans to purchase a lot and the cost of necessary site preparations.

For a veteran buying a home with a 30-year, average GI loan of \$55,000, the rate increase of a half percent will raise the monthly payments by \$21 over the previous 12 percent rate.

The change, however, doesn't affect existing GI loans, whose interest rate remains the same for the life of the agreement.

VA guarantees loans made by private lenders to eligible veterans, widowed spouses of veterans who died as a result of service-connected disabilities or spouses of service personnel officially listed as missing in action or prisoners of war for more than 90 days.

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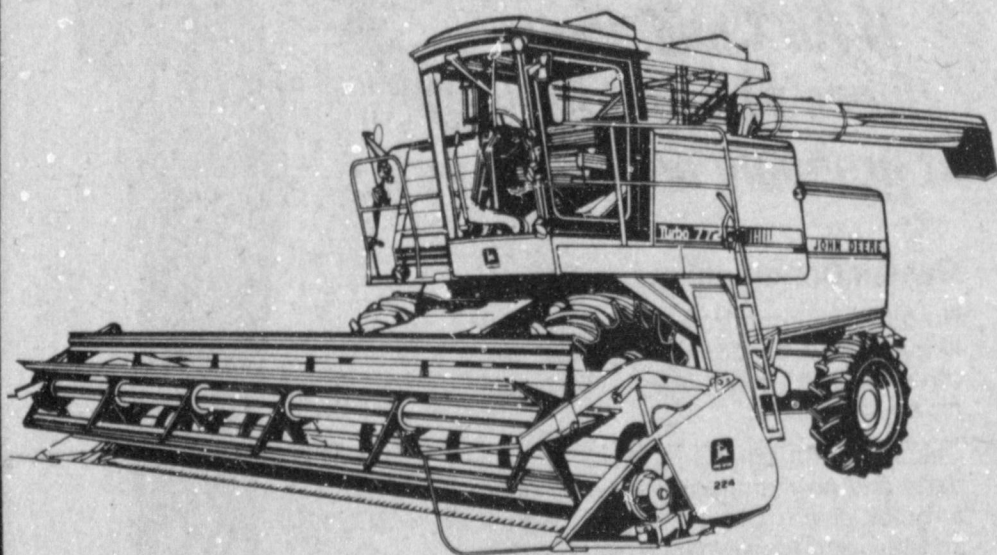

AARP News

The State Legislative Committee Chairman of the largest organization of older persons in Texas today praised Texas lawmakers for rejecting legislation in the 68th session which would have weakened the Texas Homestead Act. Lt. Col. Nora Gray Springfield (Ret.), chairman of the State Legislative Committee of the American Association of Retired Persons said, "Older citizen's property is well protected by the constitution and there is no need to alter the constitution to allow liens against home equity."

Col. Springfield, whose organization represents more than 610,000 members before the legislative and executive branches of state government said, "Efforts to weaken the Homestead Amendment are coming from consumer finance groups and lenders who see tapping home equity as a large money maker. Fortunately there is no clamor from the people of Texas to change the Homestead Act."

Col. Springfield stated that one of the most important pieces of legislation affecting older persons was the establishment of a Health & Human Services Coordinating Council with authority to study health issues and health care costs and the establishment of a Long Term Care Coordinating Council for the Elderly.

Although disappointed major nursing home reform legislation did not pass, Col. Springfield commended lawmakers for passing several bills to allow the state to better protect the some 80,000 residents who reside in the state's 1,000 nursing homes; and for providing additional money over the next two years for community care programs for the state's elderly to assist those who do not need to be placed in nursing homes.

On changes in the state's public utility laws, she said, "Residential consumers were given a boost with the enactment of legislation to require a public intervenor to represent residential rate payers before the Public Utility Commission."

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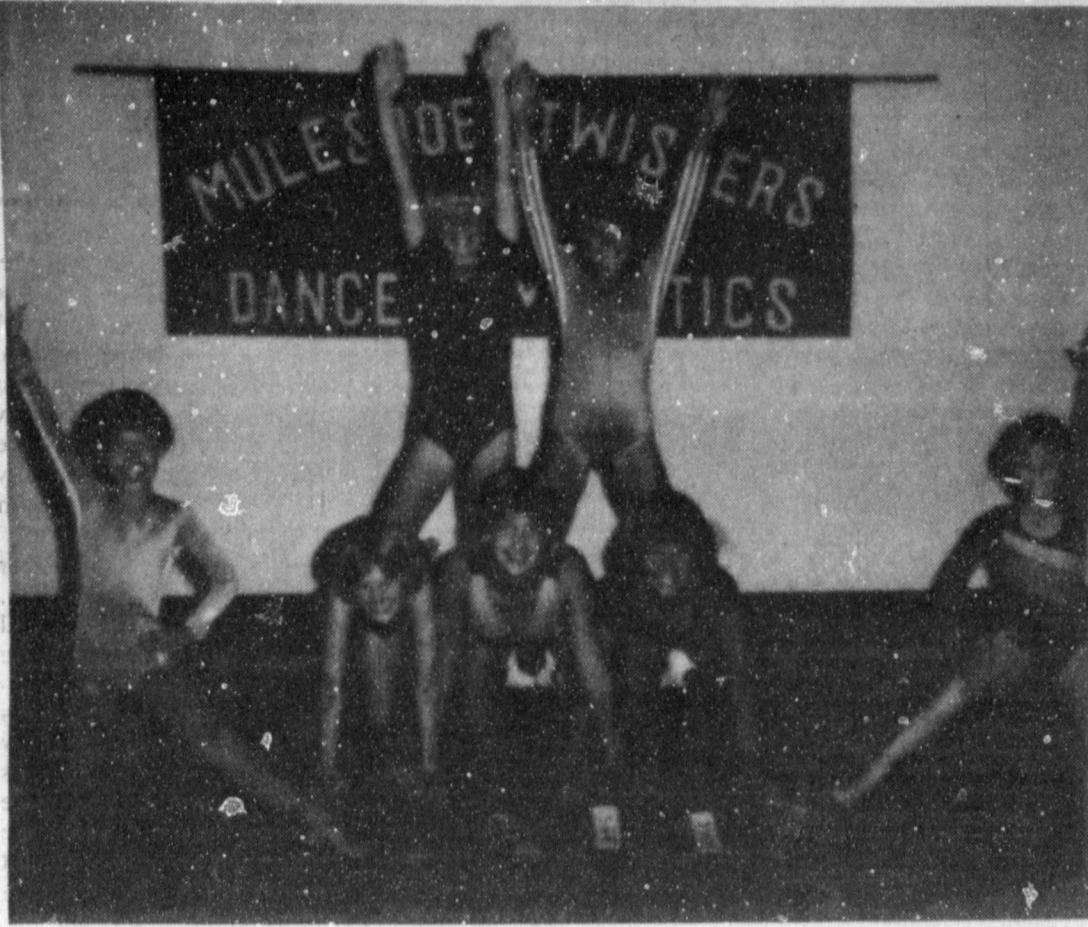

Employer's Tax Deadline Near

Aug. 1 is the date by which employers must report on Form 941 social security and withheld federal income taxes for the second quarter of 1983 and pay any taxes due, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the quarterly liability (less any deposit during the quarter) is \$500 or more, the unpaid balance must be deposited.

This deadline does not apply to employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until Aug. 10 to file Form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return."

Employers who have not received a Form 941 by mail can order one through the Forms/Tax Information number listed in the telephone book under U.S. Government. IRS Publication 15, Circular E--Employer's Tax Guide, is also available by telephone.

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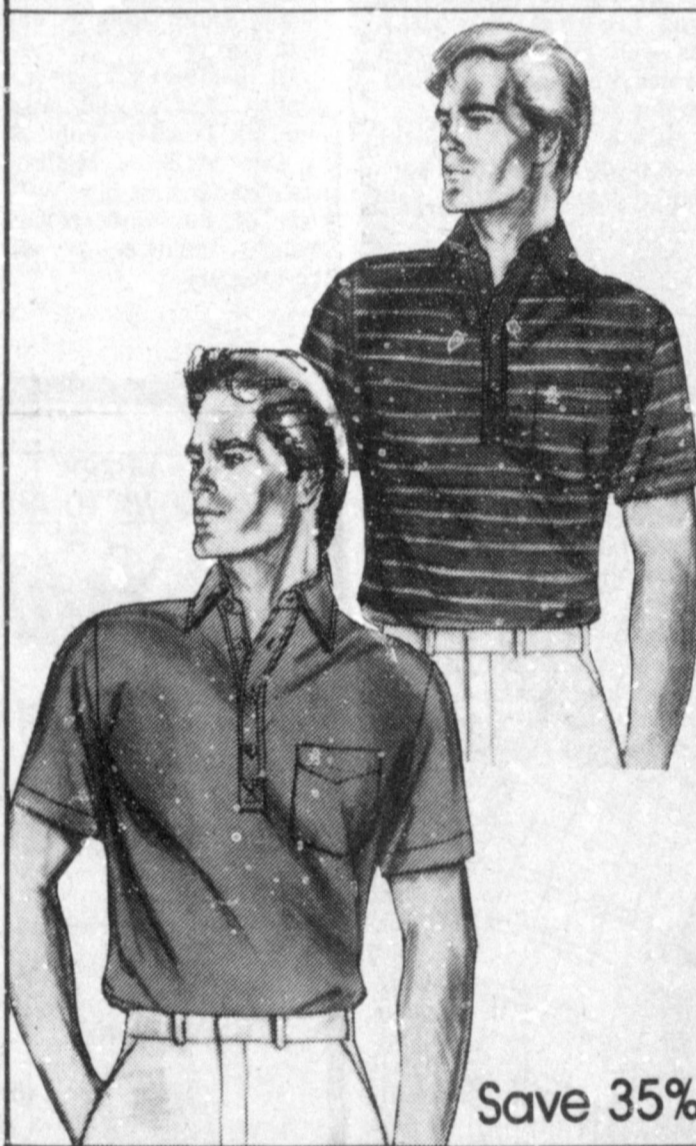
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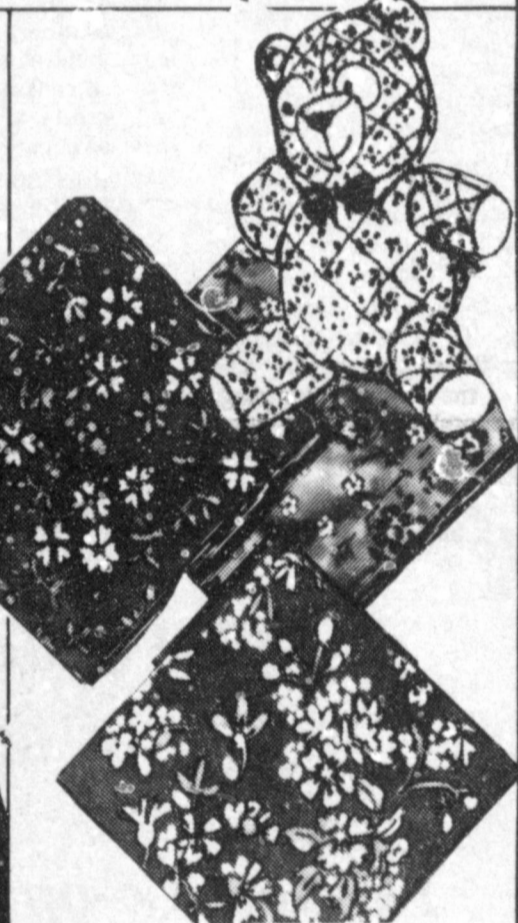
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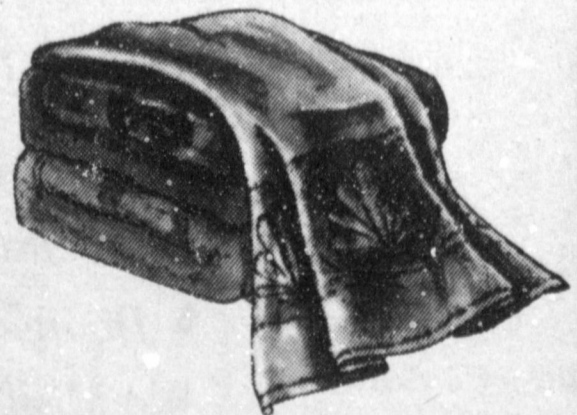

a salary increase for teachers. Factors which affected the 1983-84 school salary total are: 1. teachers salaries increased on an average of 1.9 percent to 4.6 percent as provided by law; 2. reduction in staff (five/teachers was a savings of approximately \$75,000); 3. Several positions were filled with individuals with less experience than those resigning, also providing a reduction in the salary total.

Fuller stated that he was excited that he could recommend approval of a salary schedule that produced a total salary less than the preceding year. "This will help as we continue to build an economical budget since last years salaries were 70 percent of our total school expenditures," Fuller added.

An executive session by the School Board was brought to an end and the following action taken on personnel: resignations were accepted from James Pope and Vicki Brandon. Leaves of absence were granted to Jo Ann Herington, Diane Skipworth and Jan King.

Teaching contracts were approved for the 1983-84 year for: Lonnie Scott, high school teacher and coach; Jerry Johnson, high school teacher and coach and Ray Donaldson, junior high teacher and coach. Also for Gayle Fuller, elementary teacher; Roxie Johnson, junior high teacher and coach; Ginger Caldwell, junior high teacher; Twila Albertson, junior high teacher, Lilly Snitker, elementary teacher; Deborah Hammer, elementary teacher and Donna Krey, homebound teacher.

Included in the informational portion of the board meeting was a report on the 1983-84 budget. Superintendent Fuller gave the Board an analysis of the budget, which is significantly smaller than the 1982-83 budget. All building principals and the athletic director were asked to reduce their budgets by ten percent and this was ac-

complished. Meetings are planned throughout the month of August as well as a Budget Hearing on August 22 and the public is invited to participate in the committee meetings. Final approval of the budget is set for August 30.

Property insurance proposals were reviewed by board members and in later action, they elected to join the Texas Association of School Boards Insurance Program, with the self-insuring program saving the district a significant amount of money.

Fuller shared with Board Members an administrative plan regarding a faculty advisory council to be formed this year. The purpose of the formation would be to establish formal communication lines between campus teachers and central administrators.

Board Member Julie Cage reported that the committee investigating extra-curricular budgeting is continuing to meet and is awaiting sample policies from another school district.

Pipeline Permit Summary

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace has announced that 21 permits to operate new pipelines in Texas were granted by the RRC in June. In May, the Commission approved 12 permits, and 17 were granted in June 1982.

Fifteen of the new permits were for gathering pipelines, two were for gas plant lines, and one was for a trunk transmission line. Three were for multi-purpose lines. Gathering lines bring oil and gas from production leases, while a trunk transmission line is larger diameter line into which smaller lines connect. At gas plants, gas is stripped of the liquid hydrocarbons usually present in wellhead gas.

Sixteen of the newly-permitted lines will transport gas, three will carry crude oil, one will carry products and another will move salt water.

In June, four permits were granted to operate pipelines in Southeast Texas, West Central Texas, and North Texas; two each in East Texas and the San Antonio and San Angelo areas; and one each in East Central Texas and the Refugio and Midland areas. Gathering lines approved:

boosted them up to \$268,445.68 and giving them a 3.68 percent increase over the \$258,906.11 figure in 1982 for the same time frame.

In Hockley County, each of the four towns showed deficits in tax rebates with the City of Levelland being the largest reporting city. Levelland's rebate for this period amounted to \$28,012.30, drastically down from the \$41,807.56 at the same time in 1982.

Total 1983 payments to date for Levelland amounted to \$348,036.17, down by 15.02 percent to date from the \$409,541.67 for 1982. The entire county reflected a 19.93 percent deficit in rebate money for 1983 to date.

Lamb County's largest reporting city of Littlefield showed a 2.26 percent increase from 1982 to 1983, allowing the county total to come up to .38 percent to the good. Littlefield received net payment for the period just past in the amount of \$10,369.96, down slightly from the \$10,875.13 in 1982. Their total payments to date for 1983 have reached \$134,094.21 up by 2.26 percent from the \$131,135.26 of 1982 total payments.

Farwell, Muleshoe's neighboring city to the west, received \$1,166.86 net payment for the July period, up from the \$707.95 at the same time in 1982. Overall payments for 1983 to date for Farwell amount to \$13,027.76, up by 8.35 percent over the \$12,023.83 of 1982. In Friona however, July tax rebates were down by 5.38 percent. Parmer County showed an overall deficit of 2.46 percent from 1982 figures.

Houston received the largest check--\$6.8 million, bringing this year's total to \$75.8 million, down 9 percent from 1982. Dallas' payment totaled \$4.2 million, up 8 percent from last year. San Antonio's payment was \$2.1 million, putting 1983 receipts at \$22.6 million, a 9 percent increase.

Austin's July payment was \$1.5 million, bringing

the year's total to \$15 million, 15 percent over last year. Fort Worth received \$1.3 million to put the city's 1983 total at \$14.8 million, up 8 percent from 1982. El Paso's check was \$798,000, with 1983 total payments down 10 percent from last year.

Bullock also sent checks to the state's two Metropolitan Transit Authorities. Houston's MTA received \$7.8 million, down from last July's payment of \$9.4 million. San Antonio received \$1.1 million, bringing the yearly total to \$12.4 million, up 10 percent over 1982.

The City and MTA sales taxes are collected along with the state sales tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

The July checks were for taxes collected on sales made in May and reported to the Comptroller by the end of June.

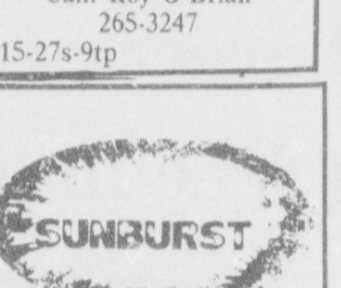

VA - MAY I HELP YOU?
Q--My only income is from a VA pension and we have had a rash of thefts lately. Is there some way I can protect myself against the loss of my check?

A--Yes. VA compensation checks may be deposited directly to your savings or checking account. Go to your bank and fill out a Standard Form 1199a.

Q--May I use my GI Bill eligibility to attend school in a foreign country?


A--Foreign training under the GI Bill is only available in degree programs in approved colleges and universities. Local VA regional offices have a list of approved schools.

Q--I receive compensation from the VA for a 10-percent service-connected disability. I am also eligible for nonservice-connected disability pension benefits. Will I receive two checks?


A--No. A veteran cannot receive both compensation and pension benefits based on his own service. The VA will pay you the greater benefit unless you elect in writing to receive the lesser benefit.

Cattle Outlook Indicates Tight Supply

While marketing of fed cattle in May was up 12 percent from last year, reduced placements of cattle on feed indicate that beef supplies are going to be tight later in the year, says Dr. Edward Uvacek, Jr., economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The June seven-state cattle on feed report shows that large supplies of cattle are being marketed and that the April-June quarter will probably be close to the 9 percent increase anticipated earlier in the year, Uvacek says.

But continued low placement levels during May as in recent months are going to result in a fed cattle
