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AROUND THE COUNTY

The screwworm eradication program continues to have problems with the greatest number of cases since the program was begun. Through April, 1,045 cases were recorded in Texas which is the highest number since the program started; the previous high was 639 for the same period.

The problem is especially bad this year because Mexico experienced a mild winter and screwworm flies increased rapidly there. Weather in much of Texas has been wet or humid, the winter was also mild allowing some flies to overwinter in all probability. The movement of the flies has been rapid, probably in cars or trucks moving from South Texas to North Texas and other areas. Last week, one positive case was identified in Oklahoma.

Sterile fly production now is 200 million per week at the Mission plant. These flies are being used in three different treatment methods in Texas. One area in the lower part of the state is getting drops in a grid release at a certain number of flies per mile. Another area north of that is receiving a similiar treatment at a smaller rate per mile. The remainder of the state, roughly the area north of Abilene, is getting the hotspot treatment on confined screwworm case areas. Earlier there had been a report that a single case out of the area with the outbreak were not being treated. This was checked out last Friday with the program officials at Mission and they stated that all single cases outside of the trouble spot were getting the hotspot treatment.

Worth Durham, who sent in a positive sample on April 24 reports finding fly boxes on his ranch on the Divide where the case was found in a calf. Other nearby counties with positive cases include Tom Green County, Reagan County, Schleicher County and Irion County.

One of the complaints in many areas, not only here but elsewhere in the state, is the inavailability of screwworm medicine. Many firms have quit manufacturing the chemicals and it is not available at the usual sources. Some complain that the material they can get is not effective in killing the worms.

Everyone is urged to check their stock for suspected cases. Take a sample from deep in the wound, not only where the fresh blood is found and maggots will be found on the top portion where the flesh is dead. Send the sample to Mission in the postage free mailing tube and vial and treat the wound with the best material available. If collection vials and mailing tubes are needed, they are available in the county agent's office and the feed store.

Program officials are urging livestock producers to put off surgical operations wherever possible. If they must be done, treat the wound with a good screwworm preventative.

Finis Legg Hurts Finger

On Wednesday, May 3, Finis Legg got the index finger of his right hand caught in his lawn mower while mowing a lawn. He lost the first joint of the finger and was hospitalized for more than a week.

FFA News Column

Six Sterling City FFA members were approved for the Lone Star Farmer degree last week at the Area II FFA convention held in Snyder High School Friday afternoon and Saturday.

Tommy Bynum, Skeete Foster, Jim Terry, Payton Wilson, Steven Foster and Lee Igo will be awarded their State Farmer degrees at the State FFA Convention at Fort Worth in July.

Requirements for the State Farmer Degree are quite rigid and only 2% of the Area members become eligible each year. Applicants must have been active members for at least two years, be enrolled in vocational agriculture, have an outstanding supervised farming program from which they have earned \$500.00 during their three years in high school. They must have participated in leadership, judging, and other activities of the local chapter to be eligible.

There are approximately 4,000 members in Area II, which reaches from Eldorado to El Paso. 77 members were selected from the applicants, and six of these were from Sterling City. Thus giving the locals much more than the 2% of the local membership. Brownfield was the only school in the area that produced more Lone Star Farmers than Sterling City.

Lee Igo was selected Star Farmer applicant from the Concho District and he came out the Lone Star Farmer applicant from Area II. He will compete with nine other members from the other nine areas in the state for the top spot in Texas on June 7 at the State Record Check meeting in Waco.

Skeete Foster was elected Concho District Treasurer at the Concho District meeting May 8 at Lakeview High School. Steven Foster placed third in the FFA public speaking event with a speech on the use of agricultural chemicals for the production of food and fibers.

Social Security Tips

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W-2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

"If I apply for disability benefits, do I have to be examined by a social security doctor before I can get any checks?" This is a question frequently asked when disabled workers claim social security disability insurance benefits.

J. M. Talbot, social security manager, says the social security law requires the applicant to supply the medical records on his condition. When you apply for benefits, you must provide a report from your attending doctor or hospital.

Information from the attending doctor and the hospital is generally all that is needed. However, in some instances, a specialist's report may be necessary to clarify a question or resolve a borderline situation. You may then be asked to go for a special examination to help provide the extra information.

When you apply for disability benefits, be ready to give the names and addresses of all your sources of medical treatment for your disabling condition.

PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.

Early stages of the common cold are the most contagious. Every sneeze fills the air with thousands of virus-laden droplets. To help

prevent spreading a cold to the rest of the family, to friends and to co-workers, everyone should have his own glass, cup, silverware and towels. Hands should be washed thoroughly and often, preferably with a liquid antibacterial skin cleanser. phisoHex is the one that is used in most U.S. hospitals to help prevent spread of infections. Particularly during the cold season, it is wise to keep a handwashing preparation in the kitchen, as well as in the bathroom.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-



cautions are taken. However, the Winthrop booklet also states that it is not completely possible to avoid a cold. Just breathing the air that someone with a cold has merely talked into offers the possibility of infecting a healthy person.

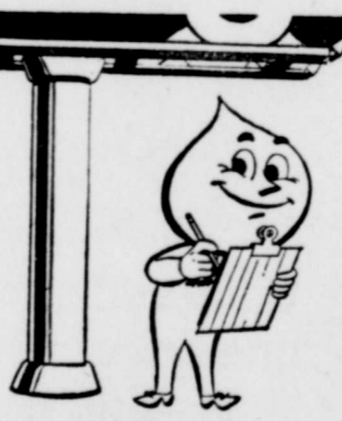
