AROUND THE COUNTY

Two Sterling County 4-H Club Range Judging teams participated in the State 4-H Club Range Judging Contest in San Angelo last Saturday. The junior team placed third in their division while the senior team placed fifth.

Members of the third place junior team were Victor Probandt, Michael Lackey, John Lackey and Eddie Probandt. Each member of the team received a bronze medal with the range judging bar attached. There were seven junior teams competing.

Senior team members were Amy Hodges, Steven Foster, Russell Davis and Jeff Cantrell. Eight teams competed in the senior division.

The Range Judging Contest and Wool and Mohair Judging Contest are the only two state contests held off the campus of Texas A&M and not in connection with 4-H RoundUp. These contests have been held in San Angelo for a number of years since it is center of the wool and mohair industry as well as the range area.

Next week four club members will be going to College Station to compete in the State 4-H Contests held in connection with 4-H RoundUp on the campus of Texas A&M University. Club members who will be making the trip are Amy Hodges, Jeff Cantrell, Russell Davis and Steven Foster; Mrs. Clinton Hodges will make the trip as an adult leader. The county agent will also make the trip.

The four club members won the right to participate in the State 4-H Range and Pasture Grass Identification Contest by placing second in the District Contest early in May. This contest will take place Wednesday morning with 4-H Club teams from all areas of Texas taking part.

The Sterling County Club members will depart early Tuesday morning, June 6. There are planned activities for Tuesday evening and night, the contests Wednesday morning, more activities Wednesday afternoon and night. The trip home will be made Thursday.

Even though the mosquito problem is not as bad as it was, there are still some mosquitos in some areas here. There have been some questions about spraying in these areas; some say they did spray but could not tell that it was of any benefit.

It is difficult to achieve much success with spraying. The most effective spraying is done late in the evening after the mosquitos have made their appearance and best results are obtained when spraying is done by airplane or with one of the mist sprayers such as a turbine. If there are areas that you do wish to spray, use malathion emulsion concentrate at the rate of 13 pints to 100 gallons of water. Some have used Sevin and could not see any results. Sevin will have very little, if any, effect on mosquitos. Sevin is one of the stomach poisons which means the insect must eat it, or get it into the stomach in some manner before it is effective. For insects such as chewing insects, it is recommended. Malathion is a contact insecticide as well as having a slight residual effect and works on insects such

as mosquitos or other pests where you can actually hit them with the insecticide. The best control for the mosquitos is destruction of their natural habitat. Cut all weeds and grass; oil all standing water holes with some type of oil; the latter is the most effective since it destroys their breeding sites.

For those wanting to spray their pecans for the casebearer—now is the time to spray. There are very few pecans here but some may want to save those they have so spray with 3 pounds of Malathion per hundred gallons of water. One of the biggest benefits of spray would be the addition of zinc sulfate to control, rosette, the nutritional disease. Use two pounds of 36% zinc sulfate in one hundred gallons of water or three tablespoons to three gallons.

A New Bible

NASA SPACEMEN PRESENTED NEWLY PUBLISHED BIBLE

The entire complement of 43 astronauts stationed at NASA in Houston have been presented personalized, autographed copies of the recently published 'Living Bible.'

Translator of 'The Living Bible', Kenneth N. Taylor, was invited to the Base to make the presentations by Apollo XV Lunar Module Pilot, Colonel James B. Irwin. Colonel Irwin was the moonman who during his lunar explorations in August of last year, carried his Bible with him to read while on the moon.

Taylor, the 54-year-old theologian who spent the last 16 years of his life translating (he calls it paraphrasing) the entire Bible into a contemporary, readable style, spent a day at the Astronaut Office Building in conversation with various astronauts as he made individual presentations of 'The Living Bible.' Taylor explained to several astronauts who asked, that he did his paraphrase of 'The Living Bible' on a 'thought-for-thought' basis, rather than on a word-for-word basis like other Bibles have been prepared. Taylor explains that the paraphrase style flows better, conveys the meaning clearer, and eliminates Greek and Hebrew grammar styles which are difficult for Americans to read.

Sales figures seem to bear Taylor out, as two million copies of 'The Living Bible' have been sold since the book hit the market in September of last year. Another 1/2 million copies have been sold in England, the home of the popular King James translation.

Irwin became impressed with The Living Bible after being introduced to the Book by his minister, Dr. Bill Rittenhouse, pastor of the Nassau Bay Baptist Church, located just off the NASA Base. Rittenhouse suggested that the Living Bible would be ideal for the Irwin family's evening devotions at home. The astronaut's four children responded favorably to The Living Bible, prompting Irwin to invite Taylor to give copies of the new publication to his 42 contemporaries in the space program. Although Irwin was ground bound during the Apollo XVI space shot, he played a most important role in the program. He was designated CAPCOM (capsule communicator) for the flight, and all communications from ground to capsule, and from capsule to ground, were routed through Colonel Irwin. It was Colonel Irwin's voice that television and radio listeners heard when communications between the capsule and ground were broadcast to the public.

It was appropriate that Irwin instigate the Bible presentations as he is a sincere and dedicated student of the Bible.

Voting Laws Explained

AUSTIN — Voters in the June 3 runoff elections were warned Tuesday by Secretary of State Bob Bullock to "stay in the party primary where they voted on May 6."

"Judging from reports several county clerks are receiving, it looks like many Republicans are being tempted to switch over and vote in the Democratic runoff on June 3," Bullock said.

"Every voter needs to know that if they voted in the Republican primary on May 6, they cannot vote in the Democratic runoff. And if they voted Democratic the first time, they cannot switch and vote Republican on June 3."

"We want the public to know that this action violates Article 240 of the Texas Election Code and is punishable by a fine of from \$100 to \$500."

"We know that this type of voting has taken place in the past. A survey by State Senator Oscar Mauzy in 1968 showed that there were some 1,300 crossover voters in his district alone."

"Certainly, any crossover voting would distort the true strength of a candidate in the other party. I think the low-key campaign by the Republicans lends itself to making a Republican want to switch over, if only for excitement's sake."

"We hope that public awareness will discourage this type of voting. If we find that it still takes place, we will have no alternative but to pass this information along to the proper authorities," Bullock said.

"We want election officials to know that there is a law behind them and they should not permit this practice. This will be the only way we can preserve the integrity of the Texas election process."

Bullock said he wanted the voter to know that it is also against the law for a voter to cast a ballot in two different precincts, even within the same party.

"We know that there were instances of this reported during the May 6 primary. Like crossover voting, this dual voting practice is against the law and simply cannot be tolerated."

"I want the local election officials to bear down and make sure this doesn't happen in the runoff," Bullock said.

Oil Production Significant Here

Petroleum production continues to play a significant role in the economy of Sterling County with a direct input of \$7,377,608 last year.

According to the latest compilation of Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Assn., the county in 1970 produced 1,999,879 barrels of crude oil valued at \$6,599,601 and 5,328,816 thousand cubic feet of natural gas valued at \$788,007. It ranked 112th in value of petroleum produced.

In addition, the county received the stimulation of \$922,201 in royalty payments to landowners and others with mineral interests.

"Sterling was one of 187 Texas counties that had petroleum production valued at more than \$125,000", says Kenneth E. Montague, Texas Mid-Continent president.

Its ability to produce helped Texas meet a record demand with record production of both oil and gas in 1970. This demand has again diminished Texas petroleum reserves as additions failed to offset withdrawals. In Texas, we only drilled 8,114 wells, the smallest number since 1946.

Texas state government benefited from the county's petroleum, receiving \$303,582 in production taxes on crude oil and \$58,351 on natural gas.

Drilling expenditures in the county totaled \$3,871,213 with \$2,338,214 being lost on dry holes. Drillers completed 10 oil wells, 1 gas well and 17 dry holes. Eight wildcats were drilled with seven of them dry.

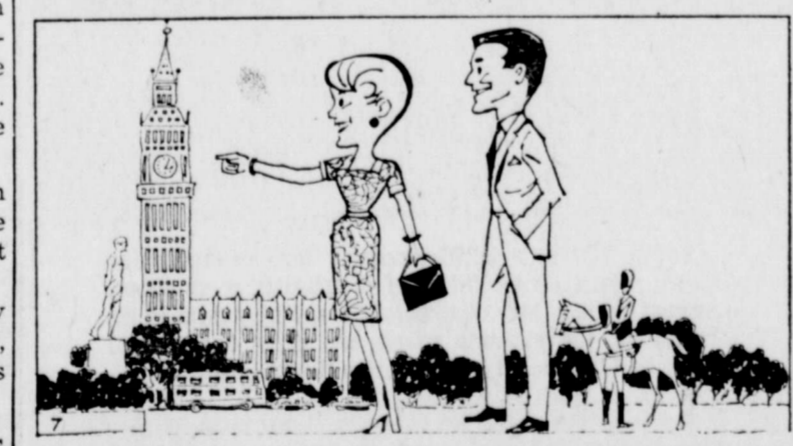

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK
 Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land, which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.
 Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.
 Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.
 Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because — unlike plastic sacks — they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.
 Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sep-

arate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provisions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.
 The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done — and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can... for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language.
