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## Sterling Jr. Livestock Show Here Next Monday

Judging Will Start at 8:00 A. M.

Sterling County 4-H Club and FFA members will be competing for \$350 in prize money, nine trophies, two silver belt buckles, and an assortment of ribbons and banners at the Sterling County Livestock Show on Monday, January 15. This is the big day for 4-H and FFA members who will be showing market lambs, registered Rambouillets, market barrows and steers.

All market lambs must be in the barn before 2:00 P.M. Sunday when the weighing of lambs will start. The weighing will be finished by 3:00 P.M. for those who wish to watch the Super Bowl Game. The exhibitors must be present at the weighing time if their lambs are going to be shown Monday. They will also designate their sale lamb at that time. Finewool and finewool crossbred lambs will be divided into two equal weight classes following the weighing. Medium wool lambs will all show in one weight class.

All steers will be weighed on the large scales at Stockman's Supply. Classes will be determined following the weighing.

There will be one class of pigs again this year.

Judging will start at 8:00 A. M. Monday with Fred Wilkinson, county agent of Crane County, doing the judging. Trophies and awards will be presented at 1:45 P. M. in the show arena and the sale will start at 2:00 P. M.

Officers of the Sterling County Livestock Show Association—sponsors of the show—are Charles Probandt, president; Danny Stewart, vice-president; and Marvin Foster, treasurer. Superintendent for this year's show is Bill Davis with Raymond Thomas Foster as assistant superintendent. Riley King will again serve as the auctioneer. Sales clerks are Worth Durham, Hugh Lackey, Don Viktorin, James Thompson and Charles Probandt. Billy Ralph Bynum and I. W. Terry are in charge of the resale of lambs.

The concession stand will be operated by the 4-H and FFA mothers with proceeds going to the two clubs. Lunch will be served by the Women's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church in the community center as customary.

Trophies for the various champions have been donated by a number of local groups, individuals and businesses. The rotating plaque for the champion finewool lamb is sponsored by Lee Reed; Ross Foster sponsors a permanent trophy for the same animal. The exhibitor of the champion crossbred lamb will receive the Charlie Davis trophy. Ralph Davis presents a trophy to the exhibitor of the champion medium wool lamb. The Noratadate Club gives the trophy for the champion Rambouillet ewe and the Epsilon Zeta Club sponsors the trophy awarded the exhibitor of the champion Rambouillet ram. The exhibitor of the champion Rambouillet flock will receive the Betty Jo Barrett trophy. Brooks Dry Goods is awarding a trophy to the feeder of the champion market barrow. The trophy for the champion steer of the show is sponsored by the Paisano Trucking Co.

**Insurance Board Orders Cut in Some Insurance Rates**

AUSTIN — The State Insurance Board ordered sizeable reductions Tuesday in the cost of homeowners and extended coverage policies for most Texans. Much of West Texas will get a 30 per cent cut.

Extended coverage is insurance against windstorms, hurricanes, hailstorms, explosions, riots, smoke and collisions with a home by aircraft or vehicles.

New fire insurance rates were not issued, but the board said it would order cuts in the neighborhood of 7.5 to 10 per cent in a few days.

Homeowners policies include fire coverage, as well as the protection afforded by extended coverage policies plus liability and theft coverage.

These rates changes were ordered, effective for policies written or renewed on or after Jan. 1.

Renal Rosson, our representative, who is on the legislative committee looking into reforming the insurance rates, said before long the cuts would come on fire insurance.

Rosson said the U.S. Weather Bureau people were very helpful in suggesting the windstorm, hurricane and hailstorm reductions for this area.

More study by the legislature will be forthcoming to correct inequities by insurance companies, said Rosson.

**Social Security Tips**

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

**WHO MUST FILE SOCIAL SECURITY EARNINGS**

Most social security beneficiaries who earned over \$1680 in 1970 are required to file a report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1971. This report is in addition to any Federal or State tax return, and it must be filed with the Social Security Administration, according to J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Beneficiaries who were 72 years old in all months of last year are not required to file the annual report of earnings. Disabled beneficiaries should report immediately if they become self-employed or take a job. All other beneficiaries, including families of disabled persons, are under the retirement test and must report their earnings annually.

The purpose of social security benefits is to replace earnings lost due to retirement, death, or disability. If an individual continues to earn a substantial amount — \$1680 or more — some adjustment is made in the amount of his benefits. One dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1680 and \$2880 is withheld. If a individual earns over \$2880, he gives up a dollar for each dollar earned over \$2880 regardless of the amount of yearly earnings. A beneficiary is entitled to his full social security check for any month in which he does not earn over \$140 and is not self-employed. The annual report will allow us to determine whether or not additional benefits are payable.

### Nearly \$7 Million in Oil - Gas Production

Sale of Sterling County oil and gas production accounted for \$6,814,608 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In producing 1,718,825 barrels of crude oil and 5 billion cu. feet of natural gas, the county ranked 120 in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$6,050,264; natural gas value was \$764,344.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

Sterling County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced, Robert A. Buschman, Association president said. As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology, he said.

The Association study showed that Sterling County farmers, ranchers, and other royalty owners received \$851,826 as their share of production.

The county's wells generated \$278,312 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$57,326 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$1,547,010 in drilling 11 wells in the county last year, \$1,220,842 of which was lost in drilling 7 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 16 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$54,856.

#### PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching a cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Your chances of catching a cold will be reduced if pre-



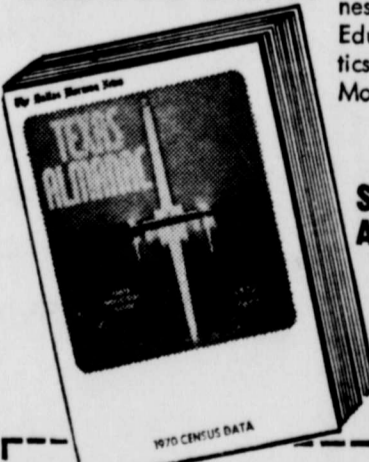

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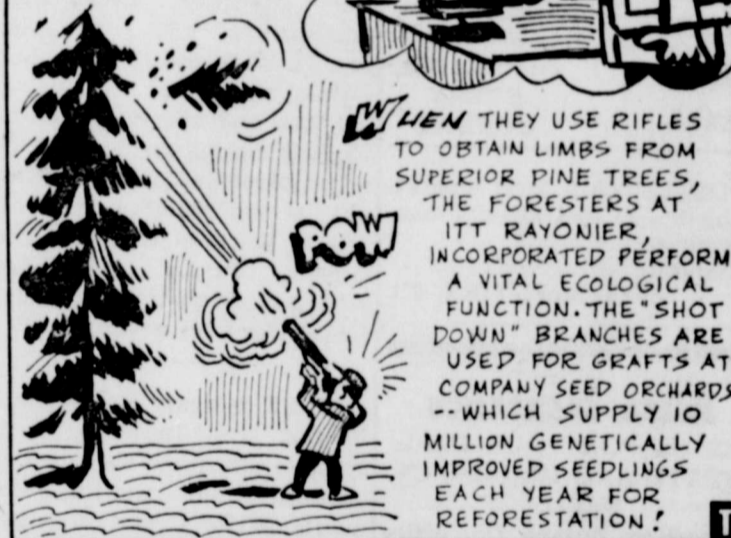
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
