Parents of 4-H Club members are invited to attend the meeting of club members interested in taking part in the District 4-H Club contests on May 5. The meeting will be held at 3:45 P.M. this afternoon (Friday, March 23) in the grand jury room of the courthouse. All club members have received a letter announcing the meeting.

The club members have done an excellent job of representing their county in the District Contests. For several years, over half of the club members enrolled have taken part in the contests with excellent results. The district contests are eliminations for the seniors, those who were fourteen or over on January 1 of this year. The contestants who place either first or second advance to the State 4-H Contests at College Station in June. For those under fourteen, the juniors, they serve as training for the future.

Food prices in the U.S. have been the subject of much publicity in recent months. Even though the U.S. housewife may have rising food prices, to contend with, she still has advantages over her European counterpart, according to Dr. Randall Stelly of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

In the U.S. for example, an average family spends about one-fifth of its income on food. In Italy and England, a third of the total consumer income goes for food. The French spend a fourth of their income on food while the Germans spend thirty percent of theirs on food.

It also takes proportionally less work to buy food in the U.S. than in Europe, Stelly said. Paying for a pound of roast beef takes 20 minutes work in New York but more than an hour and twenty minutes in Moscow. The same amount of roast costs 54 minutes work in London, 85 minutes in Paris, and 70 minutes in Munich, West Germany. A basic item, such as bread, requires 13 minutes work per pound in Moscow, 12 minutes in Paris, and about 6 minutes in New York.

Another way of looking at the total cost is the "food basket", a figure that shows the theoretical weekly food expenditures for a family of four. In 1969, the latest figures available for comparison, a U.S. food basket cost \$32 and required 12 hours work. France's cost was close to the U.S., \$31, but required 36 hours work. In England, the basket actually cost less, \$29, but required 27 hours work by the breadwinner. Russia, on the other hand ranked among the highest with the basket costing \$56 and 82 hours of work.

Another plus for the American housewife is the quality and ease of preparation of U.S. products. American food quality is the highest in the world and often the easiest to prepare. Preprocessed foods that only have to be heated and served are common in the U.S. rare elsewhere. And even though these products are higher, our food basket still requires less in the way of work to pay for at the market. Truly, there is no land of milk and honey but we here in the U.S. are still far

Little Tokyo, coming from Japan, stands 4' 3" and weighs 98 pounds and he can put many of the big wrestlers to shame when it comes to foul tactics. He will be going against a buz saw when he meets Wee Willy Wilson Monday night. He weighs 80 pounds and stands 4 feet tall. He is the smallest midjet wrestler of today.

The third main event will be the battle of the giants. The Lawman will be going against the Black Angus. This could well be the wildest match of the night. The Black Angus will be coming to this part of the country for the first time. He stands six feet and seven inches and weighs 330 pounds. He is from Scotland and he is one of the wildest and craziest men ever to crawl into a ring. He will be meeting some strong opposition, when he meets the Lawman, one of the most popular wrestlers of today. He is from Abilene, and weighs 245 pounds and stands six feet and five inches. Six Flags Over Texas Now Open

Arlington, Texas — SIX FLAGS Over Texas opened its 1973 season March 17.

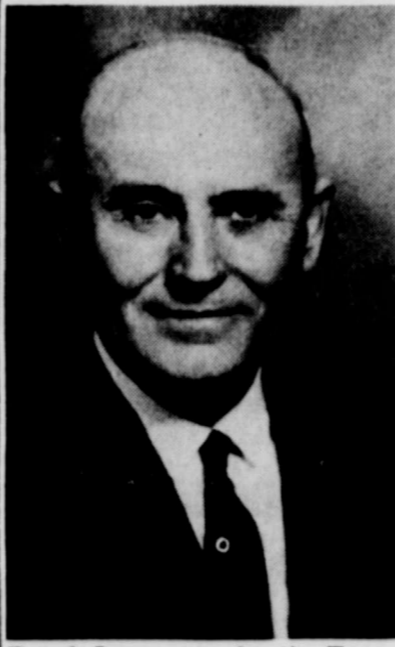
The St. Patrick's Day opening is the earliest in the 12-year history of the theme park. Attendance figures—2,062,000 in 1972—rank the multimillion dollar entertainment center as Texas' top tourist attraction.

The Park, located in Arlington, midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, has played host to more than 20,000,000 visitors since 1961.

A new, 5-acre section is being added for the 1973 season. Called Good Time Square, the addition includes a games area, two major rides, a miniature circus, and other attractions.

Among other new features this year are a new fleet of miniature sports cars on the Happy Motoring Freeway, a strolling brass band, and entirely new shows in all of the Park's theatres.

SIX FLAGS will be open Saturdays and Sundays only until May 26 when daily operations begins the summer

Notice Affording Opportunity for Public Hearing Corridor and Design (Combined Hearing)

The Texas Highway Department is planning the construction of RM Highway 2139 from State Highway 163, 6.4 miles South of Sterling City, SW 5.0 miles. The proposed highway project will not pass through any established community.

The project will consist of construction of a two-lane paved roadway 29 feet wide conforming to secondary highway current design standards of the Texas Highway Department. The right-of-way will have a usual width of 100 feet.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design, environmental studies and other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's Office at Sterling City, Texas. Also, the drawings showing the proposed geometric design have been placed on file with Sterling County at Sterling City.

There will be no relocations of dwellings or business establishments. However, information about the State's Relocation program, its benefits and services, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right-of-way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's office.

Any interested citizen may request that a public hearing be held covering the social, economic and environmental effects of the proposed location and design for this highway project by delivering a written request to the Resident Engineer's office on or before April 13, 1973.

In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be published about the date and location of the hearing.

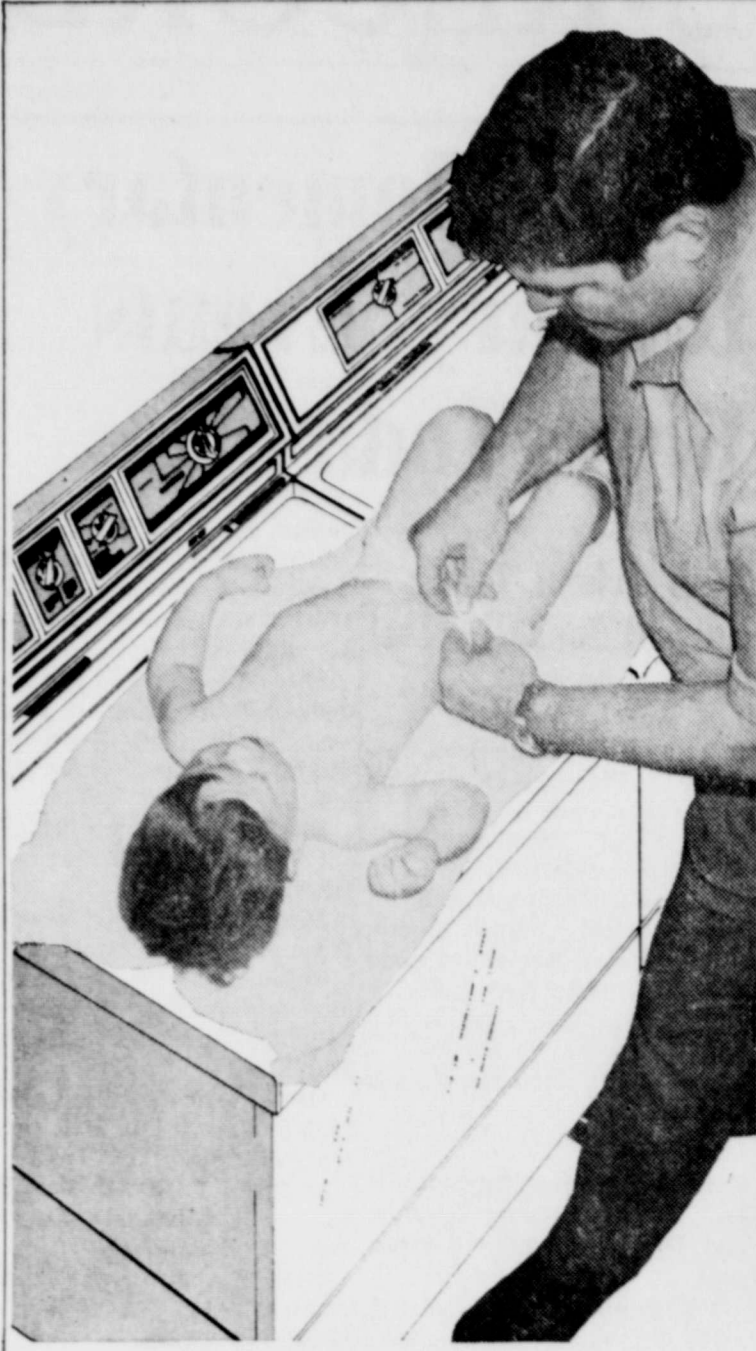
It's tornado time in Texas. Recent tornados in various areas of the state attest to the grim fact that tornado season is here again.

Tornados can develop rapidly with the right weather conditions. Thunderstorm clouds often signal tornadic conditions. Tornados generally travel from 25 to 40 miles an hour from the west with most occurring between 3 and 7 PM, but have occurred at all hours as the recent ones at Grape Creek, Burnet, and Hubbard which came in the early morning hours.

Keep tuned to a local radio or television station for the latest information. Once the tornado warning is sounded, seek shelter. If you're in a home or building without a basement, seek cover under heavy furniture against an inside wall. Stay away from windows. 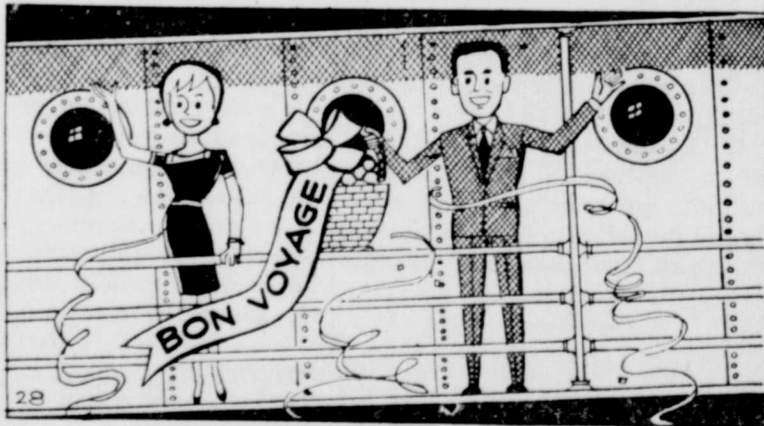

U.S. Border Patrol Seeks Applicants

The U.S. Border Patrol of the Immigration and Naturalization Service has an urgent need for physically fit young men desiring a career in Federal law enforcement work. This is a career opportunity for those who like action and outdoor work.

The Border Patrol is the mobile, uniformed enforcement branch of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Its principle purpose is to prevent the smuggling and illegal entry of aliens into the United States. The border patrolmen, called Immigration Patrol Inspectors, work along international boundaries, although their duties are not necessarily confined to these areas. They work in jeeps, cars, on foot, in boats and even in airplanes. Officers investigate violations of the immigration laws and frequently make arrests. They are often required to work irregular hours, under all weather conditions. These duties demand mental alertness as well as exceptional physical vigor and stamina.

The entrance salary of an Immigration Patrol Inspector is \$7,639 a year (Grade GS-7). There are promotional opportunities up to executive levels in the Immigration and Naturalization Service. On-the-job training offers splendid opportunities for promotion to positions of greater responsibility.

No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicants must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language. Candidates who pass the written test are called for oral interviews in the order of their standing on the list. The oral interview is designed to determine if the candidate has the personal qualities needed for the work. Applicants must also pass a rigid physical examination. Candidates who are selected for appointment are assigned to the Border Patrol Academy for a period of intensive training in such subjects as immigration laws, Spanish, physical training and marksmanship. Trainees receive full pay while in the academy.

Social Security Tips

"Did you know that if you operate any type of agricultural business, the hired workers you have in that business may be covered by social security?" J. M. Talbot, social security manager, asks.

Any employee who works and earns \$150 or more for one employer during any year or works at least 20 days on a time basis for an agriculture business, is covered by social security. Even part-time employees could meet the earnings or work test. You, as their employer, would be liable to withhold social security tax from the employee's check, match that tax yourself, and report the earnings at the end of the year.

"How do I know my work under social security is being credited to my record, and how do I find out about it? This is one of the questions most frequently asked," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

In explaining the process involved in reporting social security, Mr. Talbot said, "When you work for wages, your employer deducts social security tax from your paycheck each pay day. At the end of each calendar quarter, he submits your name and number with payment for these taxes to Internal Revenue. Internal Revenue forwards copies to social security's main office in Baltimore, Maryland. Your wages are then posted to your record. The same process is followed for a self-employed person except that his earnings are recorded yearly."

Mr. Talbot states that the possibility of an error being made in the process does exist. He recommends that you request a statement of your earnings at least every three years.

All you have to do to secure the statement is to send a post card request available at your social security office to Baltimore, Maryland. If the reply you receive is incorrect in any way, contact the Social Security Office at 3000 West Harris Avenue (P. O. Box 3808) in San Angelo, Texas, or see the representative when he is in your area.

"Processing time can be cut in half if people are prepared when the time comes to apply for social security benefits," says J. M. Talbot, social security manager.

Being prepared is not as difficult as many people believe. Remember to take along your social security card or the card of the person on whose record you are filing. For a widow, this would be the social security card of her late husband. This may sound hard to believe, but many people do come in to file their application and leave their number at home.

The third thing that is needed in all claims is evidence of the worker's last year's earnings and an estimate of this year's earnings. Your W. 2 Form or tax return for last year will give the information for last year. Be sure to bring these with you.

The next most important document to take with you is your birth certificate, if available. Proof of age is needed to qualify for nearly all social security benefits. If your birth was recorded when you were born or if you were baptized before age five, you will need one of these documents. If you don't have a copy, make arrangements now to get one, Mr. Talbot advises.

If your birth was not recorded and you were not baptized before age five, there are other documents you can use. In most cases, the earlier the record was made the better it is for helping to establish your date of birth.

THE LANGUAGE OF FOREIGN MARKETS

Called "dinero" in Spanish, "argent" in French, and "gelt" in German, money is luring increasing numbers of American executives to visit distant lands in search of business.

Progressive companies are realizing that the demand for the bilingual executive is growing. They have, therefore, begun adopting language training programs for their personnel.

Previously, training of employees was done in classroom groups. But most companies have found that the busy businessman couldn't be tied down to a 10:30 class twice a week—and preferred an individualized approach to learning.

Employees of Control Data Corporation had an even more troublesome "time" problem. Twenty-five employees of this computer company were being sent to Germany to set up a system for Volkswagen. They wanted to learn German but couldn't be pinned down to a schedule, since they were needed whenever computer time was available.

The Sullivan Language Schools, a nationwide network of centers with headquarters in Palo Alto, Calif., solved their problem by setting up an individualized "school" on their premises. The unique Sullivan method was developed under a Carnegie Foundation Grant by the noted linguist Dr. M. W.

Sullivan. It uses programmed texts and coordinated cassette tapes and the student can work whenever he wants to and at his own pace. With this set up, the Control Data personnel fit their lessons in between projects, when computer time is not available.



The Sullivan Language Schools have also helped Sears, Roebuck and Co. fashion buyers to learn French and the Latin American Section of A. B. Dick Co. to learn Spanish. The ambitious Japanese of Mitsui Corp. who already speak English are moving on to French, German and Spanish.

Even if their employees are not assigned to overseas duty, some large firms are offering language lessons as a fringe benefit. Companies with plants in Spanish-American districts sponsor courses in Spanish so that their people can better relate to the community.

All in all, the executive who says, "I don't need a second language—there's always someone who speaks English" may become obsolete.

Nearly \$7 Million in Oil -- Gas Production

Sale of Sterling County oil and gas production accounted for \$6,814,608 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

In producing 1,718,825 barrels of crude oil and 5 billion cu. feet of natural gas, the county ranked 120 in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$6,050,264; natural gas value was \$764,344.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

Sterling County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced, Robert A. Buschman, Association president said. As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology, he said.

The Association study showed that Sterling County farmers, ranchers, and other royalty owners received \$851,826 as their share of production.

The county's wells generated \$278,312 in crude oil production taxes for state government and \$57,326 in state taxes on natural gas. Oil and gas producers spent \$1,547,010 in drilling 11 wells in the county last year, \$1,220,842 of which was lost in drilling 7 dry holes.

Texas Employment Commission figures showed 16 oil and gas industry employees in the county last year, with an annual payroll of \$54,856.

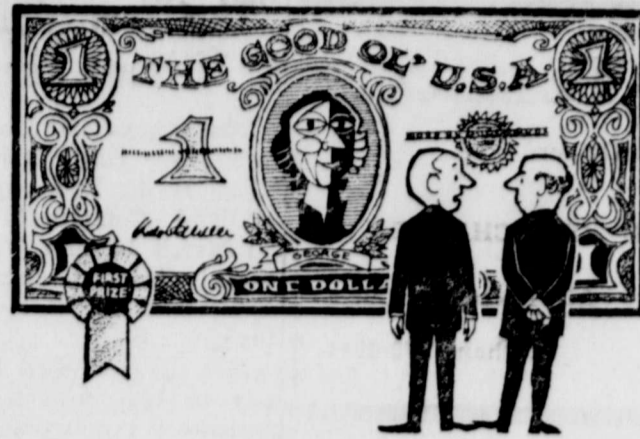

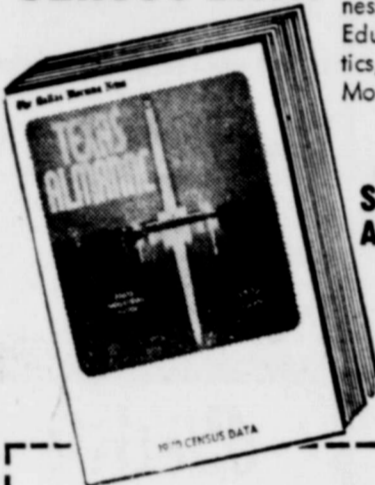

PROFILE OF A COLD VICTIM

What are your chances of catching cold? According to a booklet on the subject, they're especially good if you're female, live in a large city in the western or north-eastern part of the U.S., and are the mother of a child under 6 years of age. Young children are the greatest cold-spreaders. Your chances are further enhanced if you're going through a period of stress and strain. "Contentment preserves one even from catching a cold," the great philosopher, Nietzsche once said.

The booklet, which discusses the common cold, is distributed by Winthrop Laboratories, the makers of Neo-Synephrine nose drops and nasal spray that are widely used in the U.S. and abroad.

Keeping up one's resistance helps to avoid the common cold, according to the publication, which advises getting sufficient fresh air and exercise, well-balanced meals, and as much sleep as possible in a well-ventilated bedroom. In cold weather areas, an extra hour a night is recommended.
