AROUND THE COUNTY



ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

The cooler weather and long air coats on cattle is bringing acreasing problems with lice on attle. This is particularly true n animals that have not been reated for other parasites durg the summer. Low numbers catle lice survive the summer ut during the winter and fall, ney multiply rapidly and cause ritation and unthriftiness. With ne feed situation what it is nd the prospects for the winter ere, cattiemen need to eliminate all the problems they posibly can.

Some types of cattle lice suck blood while others feed on skin cales. Either type can be effectively controlled with a number of approved insecticides applied as sprays, dips, or pour-on treatments. Some of the approved insecticides are Co-Ral, Delnav, Malathion, Methoxychlor, Korlan, Ruelene, Neguvon, and Toxaphene.

Directions on the use of the various types of approved insecticides are included in the publication, SUGGESTIONS for CONTROLLING EXTERNAL PARASITES OF LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY. Anyone desiring a copy of this publication may have one bu contacting the county agent's office.

This is a good publication to have. It not only includes the approved insecticides for all pes of parasites but has full directions for use. All of the materials listed in the publication have been tested and meet the requirements of agencies governing the use of insecticides on livestock. If used according to the directions, there will be no problems from the creation of residues in meat or personal or animal injury. This is a MUST now.

A new Texas Cattle Feeders Handbook has just been published by the Texas Agricultural Extension. This comprehensive reference book, prepared in cvooperation with the Extension Services of the nine Great Plains States, provides information on all aspects of cattle feeding.

The handbook contains information on feed preparation, animal health, feedlot manaement, plans and all phases of the industry. It will be revised periodically with subscribers receiving all the revisions through September 1, 1975.

Anyone interested in seeing a copy of the handbook may do so by coming by the county extension agent's office. Further information on subscribing is also available there.

* * * * Christmas trees are making their appearance in many homes in preparation for the coming holiday season. In spite of the current energy crisis, lights on home Christmas trees are not discouraged though outside lighting is being discouraged.

If a live trees is used, keep it moist by using water in the container at the base. You would be surprised how much water a tree will take up; it also keeps the tree fresh and pretty longer. When putting up the tree, make a fresh diagonal cut on the base so it can take up the water,

Some of the artificial trees have been fireproofed and the use of lights on these threes is permissable. Check to see if yours is treated before stringing lights on it if you use an artificial tree. If it is not fireproofed, do not use lights on it-the materials in most of these trees is synthetic and will burn readily when the heat from the lights raeches a certain temperature.

While there have been no fires here from these sources, they do occur in many other places. Check your lights and trees, let the volunteer firemen spend Christmas at home, not putting out a fire at your

Social Security News

The San Angelo Social Security Office is now taking applications for supplemental security income payments, a Federal program scheduled to start in 1974 that will establish an income floor for people in financial need who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled, according to J.M. Talbot, social security manager.

But, people already getting State old age assistance or State aid because they are blind or disabled don't have to apply, he said. They'll be geting more information later this year about how the program will help them.

"The first monthly payments under the Federal program will be made in January, 1974," Mr. Talbot said. "Until then, State and local public assistance offices will continue to make payments in the usual way."

People not getting public assistance now who think they may be eligible for the new Federal payments should call or write social security to find out if they should apply, according to J.M. Talbot.

"Federal supplemental security income payments will be made by the Social Security Administration," Mr. Talbot said. "But the program will be financed by Federal general revenues—not by social security contributions from workers and employers. It's not the same as social security."

The aim of the new program is to provide supplemental payments in cases of need so that people 65 or over, or blind, or disabled will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 a month for a couple.

"This doesn't mean that every eligible person or couple will be getting that much from the Federal Government every month," Mr. Talbot said. "The amount of the Federal payment any person gets will depend on how much other income he has."

"Eligibility for Federal payments will depend not only on the amount of income people have but on the value of their assets," Mr. Talbot said.

"If you're single—or married but not living with your husband or wife—you can own things worth up to \$1500 and still get Federal payments," he said. "A couple can own things worth up to \$2250 and get payments. Not everything you own has to be counted toward your total assets, however."

"A home of reasonable value will not be counted as an asset," Mr. Talbot said. Personal effects and household goods won't count in most cases. Insurance policies or a car may not affect eligibility either, but it will depend on their value.

Certain income will be disreded in deciding on an application for supplemental security income. The first \$20 a month of income generally won't affect the Federal payment at all, Mr. Talbot said. "In addition, people who are working part time should know that the first \$65 a month of earnings won't be included in counting their income and only half of the rest of their additional earnings will be counted, he said.

Apart from earnings, other income above the first \$20 a month generally will reduce the Federal payment. This includes social security checks, veterans payments, workmen's compensation, pensions, annuities. and gifts, Mr. Talbot said. And. if you live in someone else's household, your basic Federal payment will be reduced by one-third before other income that may affect your payment is deducted.

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.


