Sterling Stock Show A Big Success

Sterling County's junior livestock exhibitors enjoyed good weather for the annual Sterling County Livestock Show on Monday. The 4-H Club and FFA members exhibited 180 market lambs, 14 steers, 10 pigs, 13 registered Rambouillet breeding sheep, and 6 regisered Delaine breeding sheep.

Jerry Swift, county extension agent at Eldorado, judged the show. He commented favorably on the high quality of the animals throughout the show and complimented the exhibitors on all of their preparation for the show.

Carl Igo exhibited the champion finewool lamb of the show while Sheri Foster showed the reserve champion of the division. Both lambs were bred by Larry Glass.

Melinda Terry captured the honors in the finewool crossbred class by showing both the champion and reserve champion. Her lambs were bred by I.W. Terry.

The champion medium wool lamb was shown by Michael Lackey and Bobby McClure showed the reserve champion. Both lambs were bred by William Foster.

All the champion lambs were bred in Sterling County by local ranchers. This may well be the first time that this has occurred in the local show. In addition to the lambs, the champions in the steer division and the Rambouillet show were all bred by Sterling County residents. The champion steer, a Charolais-Hereford cross, was shown by Deborah Miller and bred by Foster S. Price. Larry Horwood showed the reserve champion steer, also a Charo-lais-Hereford cross, bred by S. K. Horwood.

In the Rambouillet show, Amy Hodges bred and exhibited the champion ram. Wesley Hodges was the breeder and exhibitor of the reserve champion ram. The champion Rambouillet ewe was bred and shown by Becky Hodges while Amy Hodges bred and exhibited the reserve champion ewe.

The champion market barrow was shown by Eddie Probandt. His pig was bred by Monte Griffin of Lamesa. Carl Igo showed the reserve champion barrow.

Benny and Delmar Radde, Jr. won all the champion and reserve champion honors in the Delaine sheep show. Their sheep were bred by the G.A. Glimps of Burnet. This was the first time Delaines have been shown in the Sterling County show.

SCHOOL BOARD CALLS ELECTION

Sterling School Board president Reynolds W. Foster, at a called meeting here Wednesday, January 16, called a \$275,000 bond election for February 9, 1974.

If the bond issue carries, the board has plans to enlarge the elementary classrooms and the cafeteria and the shop building.

To remodel the junior high hallway and classrooms.

To remodel the gym, which will include public restrooms. and concession stand area. New dressing rooms will be built.

Office space will be added and heating will be improved with mounted ceiling units. A condensed drawing of all

proposals will be distributed to all registered voters and taxpayers of Sterling County at a little later date, said Foster. Absentee voting for the bond

Absentee voting for the bond election will begin on Monday, January 28, 1974. Voting absentee will be in the county clerk's office here.

There are two proposals to be voted on. (1) Authority to tax and (2) the issuance of bonds. The two proposals are outlined in a legal notice on an inside page of this issue of the paper.

It is estimated by the school authorities that the cost will be 25c per \$100 value. The average home on the tax rolls at \$5,000, will cost \$12.50 a year extra, it was said. An average section of land on the tax rolls at \$7,000 will cost an additional \$17.50 per year, it was pointed out.

The proposition number one on the ballot is merely a deal that satisfies the legal requirements of the attorney general's office for the bond issue or tax raise that was voted on by local voters in May, 1963 But, it must be passed, too, or the bond issue will fail, it was said. So both proposals are important to the issues at hand.

This payout of the bond issue would be ten years.

E. L.Bailey, 81, Sterling County rancher, died early Monday morning in the Sterling County Hospital. He had been ill for several weeks.

Services were held here at 10 a.m. Tuesday in the Presbyterian Church with the Rev. C.A. Tucker, pastor, officiating. Burial graveside rites were held in Evergreen Cemetery in Paris, Texas Wednesday at 2:30 with the Rev. Hubert Travis of Waxahachie officiating. Ross Funeral Homes were in charge of arrangements. Stan Horwood sang a solo at the services here.

Mr. Bailey was born Aug. 18, 1892 in Red River County and married Hannah Hull in 1917. He came to Sterling in 1917 where he was in the dry goods business until 1934. From that time until the present he ranched and had extensive holdings in Sterling, Glasscock and Lamar Counties. He was a charter member of the Sterling City Lions Club and was the club's first president. He was a faithful and stalwart member of the First Presbyterian Church here.

1974-75 Almanacs

NEW TEXAS ALMANAC AVAILABLE

THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS, a study of the many nationalities and ethnic groups that have combined to make up the state's population, is one of many new features in the 704 pages of the 1974-75 Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

The article is by R. Henderson Shuflfer, executive director of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Texans have always come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors, with a wide variety of mother tongues and hereditary customs and traditions, Shuffler writes. He has capsuled this variety of cultures in the special Almanac feature.

The new edition also contains a comprehensive history of the livestock feeding industry in Texas, which now leads the nation in numbers of cattle fattened in feedlots. The article was written by Sam A. Thomas Jr., manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Two reports are of special interest to ecologists. One is a list of endangered plants and animals in the state, prepared by the Texas Organization for Endangered Species. The other is a list of state agencies responsible for pollution control.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for offices, schools, public agencies and homes.

A new Texas map, in color, with major highways, distances and other information supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Deparment.

The county maps are published with information about each Texas county supplied by chambers of commerce, county agricultural agents and others.

Tourism and recreation are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

WHEREAS, the Board of
Trustees of the Sterling City Independent School District deems
it advisable to establish a
maintenance tax and issue bonds
under the provisions of Chapter
20 of the Texas Education Code
by submitting (at an election
called for the purpose) the propositions hereinafter set forth;
therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND OR-DERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF STERLING CITY INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: That said election shall be held on the 9th day of February, 1974, in the County Courtroom, Sterling County Courthouse, Sterling City, Texas, and the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for said election.

SECTION 2: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the elec-

O.T. JONES, Presiding Judge MRS. S. L. AUGUSTINE, Alternate Presiding Judge

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than two qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P. M.

MRS. SANDRA PEEL is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the County Clerk's Office in the County Courthouse in Sterling City, Texas, is hereby designated as the place for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5;00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

SECTION 3: That at said election the following propositions shall be submitted: PROPOSITION NUMBER 1

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the Sterling City Independent School District of Sterling County, Texas, be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes for the further maintenance of public free schools therein at a rate of not

to exceed ONE DOLLAR AND FIFTY CENTS (\$1.50) on the \$100 valuation of taxable property in said School District, as authorized by Section 20.04 of the Texas Education Code?" PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the Sterling City Independent School District of Sterling County, Texas be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$275,000) for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine."

SECTION 4: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote - 'FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1
"MAINTENANCE TAX"
PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneah it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 5: All resident qualified elector of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two separate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not own taxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation from the votes cast by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the

same for taxation.)

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the District.


