The homeowner, gardener, and tree-owner is faced with a lot of 'Now is the time to—' reminders. This is the time of the year for one of those tasks facing those who have fruit and nut trees, predominantly pecans in this area.

It's time to spray for the control of the scale insects which attack pecans here. The scale is a tiny insect of considerable importance in the more arid regions of the state. It attaches itself to limbs and branches of the trees, sucking sap from the tree, and devitalizing it. The insect itself is very small but its hard covering, or shell, is easily seen on the trees it is infesting. In time, the insects are capable of killing a tree with its sapping action.

Control measures consist of spraying during the dormant season of the year, with an oil emulsion spray. January and February are good months for this spraying and if your trees have scale, spraying now is advisable. The spray consists of three and a half gallons of a 97% oil emulsion in one hundred gallons of water. The entire trunk and branches of the tree should be well covered with the spray. The oil emulsion is available at most feed and seed or garden supply stores.

Usually, one treatment a year is ample for control. If the trees do have an exceptionally heavy infestation of scale, two treatments thirty days apart are advisable.

Chesley and Don showed a pen of January and February heifers which took second place honors in the show. Fourteen pens were shown in this division.

Group Hears About the School Bond Election Set for February Ninth Here

Superintendent of schools W. James Thompson, passed out architectural drawings and facts about the school bond election scheduled for February 9. He said a drawing of the proposed plans and letters and facts from the school board would be mailed out to every registered voter this week. The plans as drawn would increase the size of the elementary classrooms, add dressing rooms to the gym, and add a new homemaking room, plus added office space and other refinements to the present building. He pointed out that no money or building project had been undertaken here since 1950. The need is growing each year and the added space will hopefully take care of the needs for quite a while.

He pointed out the importance of voting for both propositions on the ballot if you favor the issue. Number one proposition is only to clarify and legalize the old taxing authority voted on in 1963, but has no change coming out of this deal (only to make it legal.)

But it is necessary for it to pass, as well as the second one, for the improvements to come about.

Sterling City now has a 1c sales tax which will go into effect sometime within the next six months. The city commission will use a portion of this tax on upkeep, maintenance and paying of utility bills at the city park and ball parks.

Stan Horwood is donating the land to the city which now consists of the little league field and the new and larger field now in the process of being built. Approximately six acres will be needed for both ball fields and parking area.

None of the 1c sales tax will be used for cost of constructing the new field, bleachers, concession stand or fencing.

We estimate the cost of building a new field, concession stand with rest rooms, fencing, bleachers and lighting at \$3,500.

February 4 Final Day to File for Office

Monday, February 4, is the final day for candidates to file for office in the Democratic and Republican Primaries in Texas.

In Sterling County, candidates that have filed for offices include: Mrs. Ovella (Betty) Garrett, for county treasurer; Roland Lowe for county judge; Danny Stewart for commissioner of precinct 4; Clinton Hodges for commissioner of precinct 2; W. W. Durham for county and district clerk; and E. R. Edwards for justice of the peace precinct 1. These have all filed with Sterling County Democratic chairman Jack Douthit. It is not known on Thursday morning if any others plan to file.

Filing fees this year (as set by law) are \$150 for county-wide offices, \$100 for commissioners and \$50 for precinct races. The state furnishes money needed (in addition to filing fee money) to hold the primaries.

The course is primarily for young or youthful hunters, just beginning to hunt. But all ages are welcome and the advantages named are gained by all, regardless of age.



3. Use high setting for a quick start for any surface cooking, or to boil water quickly. When cooking temperature is reached, switch to a lower setting.
4. Do not pre-heat the oven for roasting or broiling, but do pre-heat the oven to the temperature given in the recipe for baking.
5. Select correct, measured heat. The accurate heat selector switch or oven thermostat enables you to select, exactly, the same correct temperature each time you use it.
6. For good heat distribution around the pans, when baking, they should not touch the sides of the oven or each other. Allow one inch clearance. Check for doneness at minimum baking time on recipe, don't keep opening oven door to peek.

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

Notice of Intent to Engage in Weather Modification Activities.

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated, 5652 East Dayton, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License Number 2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling, and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Hiway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Hiway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Hiway 84; thence southeast along Hiway 84 to Roscoe in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Hiway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Hiway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
