### WORTH DURHAM NAMED PRESIDENT OF NWGA COMPANY

At the convention of the National Wool Growers Association in San Diego last week, Worth Durham of Sterling City was named president of the National Wool Growers Company. The company is the parent organization of the NWGA.

## To Improve the School Facilities

The Sterling school board has called a \$275,000.00 bond election for tomorrow, February 9, to improve the local school. The plans have been mailed out by letter to all registered voters—and explained in full by members of the board. The buildings have not been improved since the early fifties when the present building was built, and it now needs some remodeling—and additions, according to the board.

No school bond improvement issue has ever failed to pass in Sterling City. And the hope of the board is for this one to pass. Voting will be in the courthouse Saturday.

If the bond issue carries, the board has plans to enlarge the elementary classrooms and the cafeteria and the shop building.

To remodel the junior high hallway and classrooms.

To remodel the gym, which will include public restrooms, and concession stand area. New dressing rooms will be built.

Office space will be added and heating will be improved with mounted ceiling units.

A condensed drawing of all proposals was distributed to all registered voters and taxpayers of Sterling County in a mailing last week.

There are two proposals to be voted on. (1) Authority to tax and (2) the issuance of bonds. The two proposals are outlined in a legal notice on an inside page of this issue of the paper.

It is estimated by the school authorities that the cost will be 25c per \$100 value. The average home on the tax rolls at \$5,000, will cost \$4.63 a year extra, it was said. An average section of land on the tax rolls at \$7,000 will cost an additional \$17.50 per year, it was pointed out.

The proposition number one on the ballot is merely a deal that satisfies the legal requirements of the attorney general's office for the bond issue or tax raise that was voted on by local voters in May, 1963. But, it must be passed, too, or the bond issue will fail, it was said. So both proposals are important to the issues at hand.

This payout of the bond issue would be ten years.

## Mrs. W.W. House Is Buried Wednesday

Mrs. W. W. (Marguerite) House, 76, of San Angelo died Monday morning in Reagan County Hospital.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday in the First United Methodist Church in Big Lake. Burial was here in the Foster Cemetery at 4 p.m. Wednesday.

She was born July 31, 1897 in Sterling City. She and her husband, who died in 1964, ranched in Kimble County for 16 years. She had lived in San Angelo for the past ten years.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. Robbie Ferguson of Big Lake; two brothers, John Cole of McCamey and Odell Cole of Breckenridge; and three grandchildren.

### Notice of Intent to Engage in Weather Modification Activities.

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated, 5652 East Dayton, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License Number 2 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling, and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Hiway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Hiway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Hiway 84; thence southeast along Hiway 84 to Roscoe in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Hiway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Hiway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment, and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Thomas J. Henderson, Atmospherics Incorporated, Fresno, California.

5. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1974 to October 15, 1974.

6. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

## 1974-75 Almanacs

NEW TEXAS ALMANAC AVAILABLE

THE PEOPLE OF TEXAS, a study of the many nationalities and ethnic groups that have combined to make up the state's population, is one of many new features in the 704 pages of the 1974-75 Texas Almanac, published by A. H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News.

The article is by R. Henderson Shuffler, executive director of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio.

Texans have always come in assorted sizes, shapes and colors, with a wide variety of mother tongues and hereditary customs and traditions, Shuffler writes. He has capsuled this variety of cultures in the special Almanac feature.

The new edition also contains a comprehensive history of the livestock feeding industry in Texas, which now leads the nation in numbers of cattle fattened in feedlots. The article was written by Sam A. Thomas Jr., manager of agricultural development for Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo.

Two reports are of special interest to ecologists. One is a list of endangered plants and animals in the state, prepared by the Texas Organization for Endangered Species. The other is a list of state agencies responsible for pollution control.

Election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials, amendments to the Texas Constitution, appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations and many other listings are expected to make this edition widely used as a reference for offices, schools, public agencies and homes.

A new Texas map, in color, with major highways, distances and other information supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department.

The county maps are published with information about each Texas county supplied by chambers of commerce, county agricultural agents and others.

Tourism and recreation are featured, with listings of state and national parks.
