Each of the girls earned the right to compete in the District Food Show by winning one of the divisions of the Sterling County Food Show in December. Winners in the senior division of the district show will in turn compete in the State 4-H Food Show in June to be held at College Station during the 4-H Round Up. Sterling County's seniors in the district show are Amy, Lisa Horwood and Jennifer.

Mrs. Jean Holland, County Extension Agent at Large, says each of the girls will prepare her dish for the judges, serve it, and present information on the nutrient analysis of the dish they prepared.

Mrs. Johnny Wales will be one of the judges for the district show. Mrs. Wales served as an adult leader with one of the groups here in the county and did a real fine job. Adult leaders of this type are the key to the success of the overall 4-H club program and they are greatly appreciated.

Amy Hodges has just been notified that she has been selected as one of the delegates to the 1974 National 4-H Citizenship Short Course and Heritage Tour. Seventy-two Texas 4-H Club girls and fifty-two club boys will be making the trip beginning in Dallas on June 25 and concluding there on July 9.

The club members will make a bus tour of some 3,500 miles from Dallas to Washington, D.C. and back. They will stop at a number of historic sites along the way from Dallas to Washington. Six days will be spent in Washington visiting the many sites of interest there including the historic as well as the governmental.

The meet will be here on Saturday, April 6.


Other members of the dance committee besides Clark are Delmar Radde and Cecil Craig.

6 WAYS TO CONSERVE AND SAVE

ON WATER HEATERS



Normally the quantity of Hot water used in a household is about 1/4 to 1/3 of the total water usage. Here are some suggestions that can help you get the most out of your water heater.

1. With a little planning, you can arrange to wash only full loads of clothing in your washer and full loads of dishes in your dishwasher. Less than full loads consumes energy and wastes water needlessly.
2. To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.
3. A water heater that's old, or too small for your family needs, can be wasteful because it's working too hard and using too much energy to keep up with your hot water demands.
4. It's amazing how much water a leaky faucet will drip in a month's time and if the leaking faucet is a hot water faucet, it will waste both energy and water needlessly. As an example, a faucet dripping 90 drops per minute, will waste 300 gallons per month.
5. The thermostat controlling the water temperature is pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150°F. This setting has proven most satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.
6. The thermostat can be adjusted to provide warmer or cooler water temperatures. The thermostats are clearly marked for easy adjustment to increase or decrease the water temperature.

Voter Guidelines

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax-Assessor-Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.

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

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STERLING GOLF ASSOCIATION RULES

U.S.G.A. rules to govern play except where modified by local rules.

1. Out of bounds—in or across all public streets, highways or fences.

PENALTY—1 stroke: Ball must be played from point at which it went out of bounds.
2. Fairway Markers—RED—100 yards from green—YELLOW—50 yards from green.

3. No bicycles or motorcycles on course.

4. All golfers must start at Number One Tee box.

5. Cars must be parked east of Scout Hut and east of Number One Tee box.

6. No power driven carts allowed on course. Keep all carts off greens: do not lay bags on greens.

7. More than Fivesome not allowed at any time.

FAIRWAYS: You may improve your lie 12" laterally with club head—but not your position and tee up.

SHOES: Ladies high heels, western boots, track, football and baseball shoes not allowed on course.

Any flagrant destruction of the course will be cause for removal.

ETIQUETTE OF GOLF

Please be courteous. Allow faster players to play through. All players are required to carry a bag and clubs: do not play out of someone else's bag.

No player should stand close to or directly behind the ball, move, or talk, when a player is making a stroke.

No player should play from the tee until the golfers in front have played their second strokes and are out of range, nor play up to the putting green until the golfers in front have holed out and moved away. Don't try putts over again when others are following you.

Players looking for a lost ball should allow other matches coming up to pass them; they should signal them to come through and having given such signal, they should not continue their play until these players have passed and are out of range.

BOUNDARIES:

1. Fence on left—south edge of park road on right.

2. Left—edge of pavement. Right—Fairway Markers—Play ball in draw as in rough.

3. Left—line of trees. Right—tree on right in line with west end of No 4 tee box.

4. Left—North rut. of service road: anything beyond this is in the rough.

Right—Fairway markers—Play ball in draw as in rough.

5. Left—North rut of service road: anything beyond this is in the rough

Right—Fairway markers.

6. Left—Power poles, any ball beyond this is in the rough.

Right—Fairway markers.

AGE—all children under ten (10) years must be accompanied by an adult member.

GUESTS—all must be accompanied by a member.

PAR—19 men: 20 women.

DUES—\$5.00 per month.

GREEN FEES—\$1.00 for guest

HOLE IN ONE CLUB—Prize, trophy with ball mounted on name plaque

GENERAL RULE—Play water in draw on No. 2 as water hazard.

Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land. . . which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because — unlike plastic sacks — they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sepa-

rate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done — and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.
