A dollar for a loaf of bread a few weeks ago was the prediction of some. Roland Smith, grain marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says this isn't so. The price of wheat would have to go from the present price of \$4.58 per bushel to about \$30 a bushel.

The actual cost of wheat is not the cause of increasing prices of bread according to Dr. Carl Shafer of the Department of Agricultural Economics and and Rural Sociology, Texas A&M University. He says that a loaf of bread contains a little less than a pound of wheat flour. At the above price of \$4.58 per bushel, the farmer's share is about 8.5c. The miller who grinds the flour adds his cost and profit and sells the flour for just over 11c.

The baker adds 4c to the cost for his ingredients. He sells the loaf to the retailer for about 39c, a spread of 24c for profit, advertising, packaging, transportation and other costs. Add 8c for the retailer's cost and profit and you have a 47c loaf of bread.

In any event, the economists feel that one dollar bread based on wheat prices alone seem remote, because wheat futures prices from May through December are less than \$5 per bushel,

Most livestock producers know by now that the hearing in Washington on March 27 concening the use of the M-44 experimental coyote control program resulted in the judge's ruling against the Humane Society's request for an injunction. The judge ruled that to enforce an injunction on the program would be detrimental to the program since it was aimed at gathering information on con-trol methods. Thus, the Environmental Protection Agency will be allowed to proceed with the program in the 44 countie; in Texas.

Educational meetings being held by the Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to qualify persons to use the device have been resumed. Twenty-eight were certified to use the device at the Sterling County meeting on March 4.

Several have inquired about the required reports to be made in conjunction with the program. Since the program was under a temporary injunction and was not operative, a report is not required for March as we understand it. With the removal of the injunction, those certified to use the device will have to make a report at the end of April. If you did not get report blanks at the meeting, a supply is available in the county Extension agent's office.

The time is approaching when Shin Oak poisoning in cattle becomes a problem. Dr. J. W. Dollahite, Professor of Pharmacology at the Veterinary College at Texas A&M University, says this poisoning is a problem

Voter Guidelines

NELSON WOLFF

Here are the legal voter guidelines for the Democratic Party Primaries this year as put out by the Texas Democratic Party:

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.

2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.

3. Present registrations are valid if you have voted in a Democratic Primary or General Election within the last three years.

4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.

5. Notify your County Tax—Assessor--Collector of change of address 5 days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.

6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election. if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.

7. An April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.

8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.

9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and postmarked not later than midnight, on May 3, 1974.

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.
