Sterling County marked up another confirmed case of screwworms last week. This case was from a sample sent in by William Foster on August 25 and identified as positive on August 28. The sample was taken from a dog bite wound on a sheep on the place southeast of Sterling City on U.S. 87.

Aerial drops of sterile flies have been made in the county according to at least two re-ports we have had. Clinton Hodges and Bill Humble both have found boxes on their places. The boxes used for the drops are larger than the old ones originally used.

Dr. Anderson, in the Mission laboratory, said in a phone conversation on August 9 that aerial drops would be made in the county along with ground release of flies in connection with the confirmed cases on the Col-lins and Wilson ranches. With the finding of the boxes by Clinton and Bill this is confirmed and drops have been made in the east and south part of the county.

Bill Humble had sent in some samples on Sunday of this week but the results have not been reported out today (Wednesday). With the scattered showers of recent weeks, conditions are good for some more possible confirmed cases. This particular time of the year has always been worse for screwworm cases and with this and the showers producers are urged to check their stock periodically.

Saturday, September 7, is the opening day of the 68th annual West Texas Fair at Abilene. Judging in the various departments will be going on from the opening date to the closing day, September 14.

Four Sterling County 4-H Club members will be exhibiting in the Breeding Sheep Show at the fair. Amy, Becky and Wesley Hodges will be showing in the Rambouillet division while Delmar Radde Jr. has entered his Delaines in that division. All are entered in both the Open and Junior Divisions of their respective breeds.

Judging in the wool breeds division will take place beginning at 2:00 P. M. Wednesday, September 11. Judge of this division is Jack Groff. Extension Service Sheep and Goat Specialist headquartered at Kerrville.

The old saying that the big get bigger and the small get smaller is not true of the beef cow business. This is one of the conclusions that can be drawn from the report of Ernest E. Davis, livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Texas beef cow numbers are increasing but the number of owners is also increasing. Texas' census data indicate an increase of 17,800 cows and heifers from 1964 to 1969 the last time the census was taken. During that time there was a 35% increase in the 20 to 99 cow operations, a 13% incraese in the 100 to 499 cow operations while the large operations of more than 500

cows remained constant. Davis says that the increase in the smaller operations is due to the fact many who bought land for other reasons decided to raise a few cattle. The prestige image was partly responsible along with the fact that some sup-

Directions for Packing and Shipping Heads from Suspected Rabid Animals to the Laboratory

Increasing difficulty to confirm a diagnosis of rabies is being experienced with the submission of animal heads for rabies examination when shipment by air takes as long as four days between shipping date and re-ceipt. If at all possible, we recommend to those who use the State Department of Health laboratory service in Austin, that they USE THE VARIOUS BUS COMPANIES. Pack the animal head in a leakproof plastic bag. Enclose a second leak-proof plastic bag filled with ice or use water frozen in plastic bottles. An outside container of sturdy construction (styrofoam serves nicely and is inexpensive) must be used. Also, use packing ma-terial to absorb water in the event of leakage. The box should be securely taped down and marked, KEEP UPRIGHT-PLEASE. A note to telephone the Health Department Laboratory (454-3781 Ext. 313) on arrival, should be prominently displayed.





ENGINEERING FOR A BETTER WORLD

Bioenergetics, bioentrainment, bioenergotherapy, generic memory-scientific mumbo jumbo for ecology, right? Wrong! Translated, these words might sound more like dowsing, fire walk-ing, mediums, levitation, faith healing and ESP, terms you might ordinarily associate with "hocus pocus" magic and occult. But not anymore. Engineers and scientists in Russia and more recently in the U.S. are taking these phenomena seriously while trying to explain how and why they occur and if there is practical value to these events. It's all called parapsychology.

At the recent International Convention of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), a team of American engineers described their investigations of parapsychological phenomena. With numerous referrals to Russian work in the new field, the group explained experiments to measure mental telepathy, to explain acupuncture, and to determine the effects of electric fields on human behavior.

One of the most widely heard-of forms of Extra Sensory Perception (ESP) is mental telepathy, the ability to pass information from one mind to another. ESP has three other subcategories -- clairvoyance, direct passing of information from matter to mind; psychokinesis, mind over matter; and precognition, direct obtaining of information about the future.

Investigations both in this country and in Russia, parapsychology speakers told the IEEE audience, have convinced most researchers that one or all the forms of ESP exist. The Russians have conducted experiments with a woman who can move an object without touching it. They found that near the object that she moves there is enough electrical energy to light up a small Horescent lamp. American scientists are seeking clues to clairvoyance and precognition.

While ESP is relatively easy to categorize, the phenomena associated with electromagnetic fields around living systems are much

more difficult to assign and analyze. The basic problem is measurement. How do you measure something that you can't prove exists?


One measurement method, discovered by the Russians, put a high voltage electric field around the subject which is then photographed with special film. This tech-

nique, called Kirlian photography, has helped to form some explanations of why acupuncture works. Kirlian photos show radiations around various body zones that coincide with acupuncture points. In fact a device called a tobiscope can actually find acupuncture points by using electronic circuits. To explain this, one American scientist postulates the existence of an unknown girculatory system in the body that seems to be composed of energy and electric fields.

Certainly the practical aspects of telepathy are intriguing and the possibilities in the biomedical areas are encouraging. But, all the benefits or parapsychological research are by no means obvious. As one engineer told the IEEE International Convention, "The potential-ities of the individual human being are far greater than we ordinarily imagine them to be and far greater than the in-vogue models of man would lead us to think persible. We are finally beginning to discover some of these potentialities."
