Livestock producers are urged to keep a careful check on their livestock until after frost. The rains and humid weather of late Sentember were to the flies de-light as everyone knows by the large number of flies everywheer. Certainly, not all of them are screwworm flies-hopefully few if any are of this speciesbut stock should be checked as often as possible. Screwworms were worse in the fall months prior to the eradication program according to veteran livestock producers here. A missed case now could mean overwintering flies and trouble next year.

Sixty-one percent of Texas banks were actively seeking new farm and ranch accounts as compared to only nineteen percent that were reported cutting back on loans because of fund shortages. Also, the banks are referring few customers to non-bank credit agencies or correspondent banks. This was the result of a recenty survey of ninety-eight financial institutions by Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist in agribusiness with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Seventy--three percent reported average loan increases as compared to only eight percent that saw loan size go down. The greatest increases were in loans for machinery and operating funds. As expected, demand for feeder cattle loans decreased.

Lending agencies reported that loan repayments were up com-pared to last year except for catle loans. Cash crop areas reported the highest repayment rate.

* * * *
