In the special amendment election next Tuesday, we feel that it is about time the boys in the state legislature got a raise. It is still not much of a raise-from \$400 a month to \$600. They are out a lot more money to live on now than when that \$400 a month was set. They can spend a lot more than that by just being in Austin a lot during the two year terms. (Senator have 4 year terms.)

My guess is that this amendment will pass this time.

In the proposed amendment to raise old state and teacher pensioners, the state would raise their pensions more to conform with the pensions of today. The witholding from those now on state and teacher payrolls would be-never less than 6 percent of their salary and would place a limit on what the state would pay out in matching funds. The systems would have to be actuarily sound and a careful watch kept on the pension funds, More so than now.

I think this amendment will pass statewide. It does not propose more state money for the

TWO AMENDMENTS WILL BE VOTED ON

There will be a special constitutional election here April 22. All boxes will vote in the courthouse this time and voting will be from 8 till 6 o'clock on

There are two amendments to the Texas constitution to be voted on. The first deals with raising pensions of retired state and other government persons in respect to their retirement pensions. This would let the state raise their matching amount of money contributed to the pension funds.

The first amendment will not raise the amount an employee of the state pays in to the pension fund (6%) nor does it raise the matching amount by the state; but allows that the state could, if necessary, go up to 10 percent on matching funds.

This number one amendment is primarily aimed at giving now already retired workers and teachers as high a pension as is now being received by persons retiring now.

Number two amendment is to raise state legislators and senators from \$400 a month to \$600 a month calary. Their per diem allowance would also be raised to \$30 per day during regular sessions of the legislature.



JIM DAVIS BOYS RANCH WAGON BOSS THIS YEAR





CERTIFIED AS FREE OF BRUCELLOSIS STERLING COUNTY

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt of the certificate designating Sterling County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free

This reconition signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time, and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Cer-tified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slauhter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.

EIGHTEEN YEAR OLDS DON'T HAVE TO REGISTER NOW: MAYBE LATER

President Ford issued a pres-idential proclamation on March 29 that called a halt to the pres-ent registration procedures for the Selective Service System.

April 1 was the last date that 18 year olds had to be registered by draft boards.

Col. Melvin N. Glantz, State Director of Selective Service for Texas, said that although registration is being terminated at this time, new procedures providing for periodical registration are being developed and will be tested at a later date.

Selective Service has a sufficient number of men classified now to maintain a pool of avail-able manpower for the military as a part of the overall Emergency Preparedness Program of the nation.

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and first conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When 2 or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional rewards will be paid. All decisions concerning the payment of such reward and the conditions of payment will be made by the Board of Directors of the Associ-



LEGAL NOTICE AND FIREARMS ORDINANCE—AIR GUNS

Definitions Concealed Weapons Discharge of Firearms Prohibited

Exceptions, Permits

DEFINITIONS: Wherever the term FIREARMS is used in this Chapter, the term shall mean any instrument used in the propulsion of shot, shell or bullets, or other harmful objects by the action gunpowder exploded within it, or by th power of springs, and including what are commonly known as air rifles and BB guns.

CONCEALED WEAPONS: It shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed upon his person any brass knuckles, revolver pistol, dagger, stilletto or other deadly weapon.

DISCHARGE OF FIREARMS PROHIBITED: It shall be unlawful for any preson to discharge firearms of any kind or description within the limits of the Municipality; provided however, that this shall not apply to police officers in the dis-charge of their duties.

EXCEPTIONS: The Governing Body may at any time upon receipt of proper application, grant premits to shooting galleries, gun clubs and others for shooting in fixed locations and under specified rules. Such permits shall be in writing attested by the Clerk conforming to such requirements as the Governing Body shall demand, and the permit thus issued shall be subject to revocation at any time by action of the Governing
