NEW OUTDOOR CLASSROOM AT STERLING CITY SCHOOL

A new type classroom is being used by Fred Igo, teacher at the Sterling City school. Igo is using the Worth Durham property near the school as an outdoor classroom.

Dalton Merz, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, is assisting Igo with planning and developing the outdoor learning area. Merz said 'Igo has been using the area to help students gain personal experiences involving the environment surrounding them. This guided personal experience is much more meaningful than what can be gained through book study."

Igo has used the outdoor classroom area in several areas of study. His freshman and sophomore classes are studying, evaluating, and making inventory of natural resources. The classes are using the outdoor classroom studying soils, plaants, and their relationship to their environ-ment. They used the area several days ago studying various kinds of surveying instruments and their uses such as measuring slope, chaining, turning right angles, etc.

Your local Soil Conservation Service Conservationists assisting the North Concho River Soil and Water Conservation District will also work with the other teachers in the Sterling school system in developing methods to use the outdoor classroom to benefit their students.



When 2 or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. CERTIFIED AS FREE OF BRUCELLOSIS

STERLING COUNTY

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt of the certificate designating Sterling County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area.

This reconition signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time. and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Cer-tified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slauhter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.

RODENT CONTROL

SPECIALIST AVAILABLE Serling County is one of 19 area counties selected to be serviced by an urban Rodent Control Specialist, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Texas A&M University cooperating.

Larry J. Killgo, a native of Snyder, will be stationed in the County Extension Office in Abilene. He is the son of C. J. Killgo of Snyder and has a B. S. degree in Wildlife Management from Texas Tech University.

He will give talks, demonstra-tions and help where needed on rodent control-like mice, rats, and even sparrows, starlings, skunks, armadillos and racoons. 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

The Natural Resources demonstration team in the Junior Division placed first; the Horse Demonstration team in the Senior Division placed second; the Electric Demonstration team placed third in the Junior Division.

Team members of the first place Natural Resources demonstration team were Melanie Mc-Entire and Carl Igo. Coach of this team was Mrs. Clinton Hodges. Their demonstration was on the range fire plan developed here to combat grass fires and save the grass, one of the county's primary natural resources.

The subject of their demonstration was 'Horse Care Starts with a Spring Checkup" and was devoted to some considerations in this field such as worming and immunization for the more common and often fatal horse diseases.
