Pecan casebearer eggs were found at several different locations in Sterling City on Wednesday of this week. This means the ideal time to spray for control of the emerging larva is June 1 or 2. It was a lot more difficult to find clusters of nuts to check for eggs than it was to find the eggs.

The eggs hatch in about five days and the small worms begin feeding on the small nuts. After feeding on the nuts for a day or two, the worms tunnel into the nuts themselves. This is what makes the timing of the spray application of vital importance.

Several insecticides are recommended for control of the casebearer. The most popular ones are malathion, sevin, and guthion, either of which will give good control or has done so in the past. Zinc sulfate should be added to the insecticide application for the control of rosette, a nutritional deficiency.

For small trees that can be sprayed with hand sprayers, use six tablespoons of 55% liquid malathion and nine tablespoons zinc sulfate in three gallons of water. If sevin is used, the rate is nine tablespoons of the 80% wettable powder with the same amount of zinc sulfate in three gallons of water. Large batches of one hundred gallons, use either 1 1/4 pints of the liquid malathion or two pounds of the 80% sevin and two and half pounds of zinc sulfate.

Each tree owner will have to justify if the prospective crop makes spraying feasible this year. The cost per gallon of spray using sevin and zinc sulfate is going to be about four cents while malathion and zinc sulfate is going to be about four and a quarter cents per gallon.

It is also time to apply preventive treatments for the aphid, the messy little bug that causes honeydew. While Disystron is not recommended for home yard trees, many people have been using it. If it is used, take precautions with it during use—wear gloves and a mask. Wash well with soap and water after using it. Never use more than two pounds per tree regardless of size which means that at this rate the cost will be about 94c. This material can be used only one time during the growing season, in late May or early June.

SCOUTS GIVE TRASH THE SACK

Three billion dollars! That's the estimated annual bill Americans are paying for public collection and disposal of garbage and solid waste — the third most expensive community service in the land. . . . which is exceeded only by spending for highways and schools.

Concerned citizens, of course, can make significant contributions to cleaning up this national mess. As in Watertown, N. Y., where the initiative of the Environmental Systems Division of St. Regis Paper Company and a local Boy Scout Council is currently leading the way.

Recently, the more than 500 Boy Scouts of Jefferson and Lewis County launched an intensive environmental clean-up campaign to make their community a better place in which to live.

Soliciting the aid of the 30,000 homeowners in their area, the Scouts began their drive with the sale of St. Regis disposable refuse sacks. In addition to their 30-gallon capacity and convenience, these sacks were selected because — unlike plastic sacks — they will break down in sanitary land fill without adding to our ecological problems.

Watertown homeowners who purchase these sacks sepa-

rate paper, cans, rags, metal, returnable bottles and miscellaneous glass. Then, free of charge, the Scouts pick up the differentiated sacks and dispose of them in ways compatible to our ecology. Glass bottles, for example, are sold for recycling; bio-degradable trash is sent to land fill sites. Provi-



sions have even been made to tow away abandoned automobiles.

The best part about the program is that everyone profits. The community gets a cleaner environment; the Scouts get the credit for a job well done — and the modest proceeds from selling the sacks and whatever trash they can. . . . for the support of other worthwhile Scouting programs.

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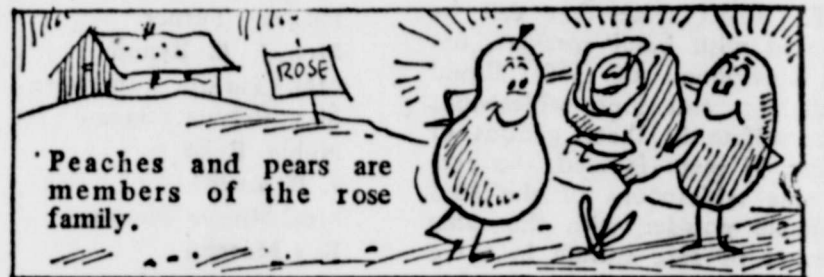

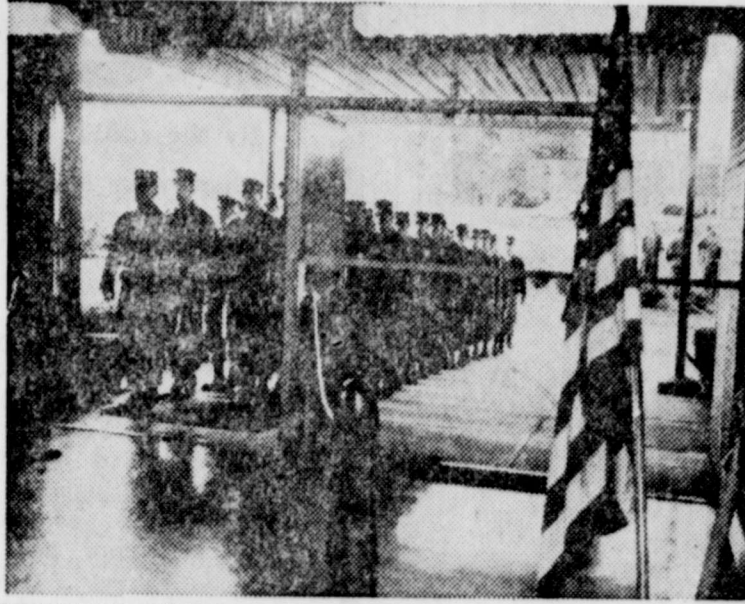

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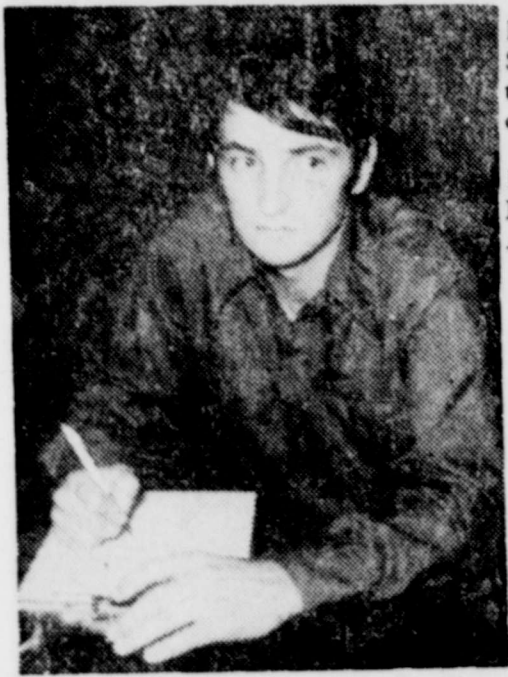
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THAT'S A FACT

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

CERTIFIED AS FREE OF BRUCELLOSIS STERLING COUNTY

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt of the certificate designating Sterling County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area.

This recognition signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time, and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slaughter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.
