Several educational meetings have been scheduled to discuss the proposed changes in legislation concerning the Brucellosis Eradication Program in Texas. Two of these meetings are presently set up in Extension District 7: one is in San Angelo and one in Abilene.

The San Angelo meeting is scheduled for Monday, August 11 at 8:00 P.M. at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center at San Angelo. The second is set up for Abilene on August 21 at 8:00 P.M. in the old courthouse.

The meetings will discuss some of the proposed changes in the brucellosis control program. These changes will be the subject of a hearing scheduled for Austin in September. The changes, as proposed, will change some of the rules regarding the movement of livestock in the state as well as to other states. Everyone is invited to attend either of the hearings and determine their feelings in the matter. Then, they will be informed and can voice their feelings at the Austin hearing.

Patti Bynum and Melinda Terry, members of the second place Horse Demonstration Team in the State 4-H Contests in June are preparing to participate in the Southern Regional Contest. The Southern Regional Contest will be held in Jackson, Mississippi August 14-16. Patti and Melinda will give their demonstration on Thursday, August 14 in competition with teams from thirteen states in the region. Location of the demonstrations and the other events of the Southern Region Horse Show is the Jackson Coliseum.

The team members will leave here Thursday, August 12. Accompanying them will be the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bill R. Bynum and Mr. and Mrs. I. W. Terry. I will also accompany them and have the responsibility of also looking after another District 7 4-H Club member, Rusty Ryan of Coleman, who qualified in the reining contest.

ASU Fall Semester Registration

Monday, August 18, will be the last for students to apply for admission to Angelo State University for the fall semester.

According to Dr. Warren Griffin, the University's Registrar, those applying for admission must have all of their application material on file by that date. Included in that material is the student's high school transcript, ACT test scores, a medical form and a completed application for admission to ASU.

Formal registration for the fall semester will be conducted Aug. 27, 28 and 29 and classes for the new term are due to begin Tuesday, September 2.

Additional information regarding admission to the University may be obtained in the Registrar's Office located in the ASU Administration Building.

County Records to be Inventoried

An inventory of the county records in the Sterling County Courthouse is scheduled to begin this week of August 4, according to Sterling County Judge Roland L. Lowe.

Dr. Escal F. Duke and Dr. James W. Ward, both professors of history at Angelo State University are regional supervisors for the project. Dr. Jack Bates, also a history professor at Angelo State University, and Roter F. Quinn, a retired Internal Revenue Service agent in San Angelo who is volunteering his assistance, will actually make the inventory.

The inventory is part of a state-wide project designed to determine the kinds and conditions of records in the county courthouses in Texas. It is being conducted by North Texas State University in cooperation with the Texas State Library.

The North Texas State University inventory publications are following the format of the pilot inventory of Ector County made and published by the Regional Historical Resource Depository Program, the local records program of the Archives Division of the Texas State Library.

Angelo State University serves as one of the regional depositories in the state-wide system. ASU is the depository for the 21 counties, including Sterling, making up the vast 21 million acre Edwards Plateau region of West Texas.

The project workers have completed inventories in Irion and Coke Counties and they will complete the inventory in Schleicher County before moving on to Sterling County. Workers are also working on Tom Green County and Runnels County.

The basic goals of the depository system will be that of preventing further destruction of valuable historical materials, organizing them into usable condition, and providing researchers with information as to their content and location.

Information from the inventories will be available to historians, genealogists and other researchers.

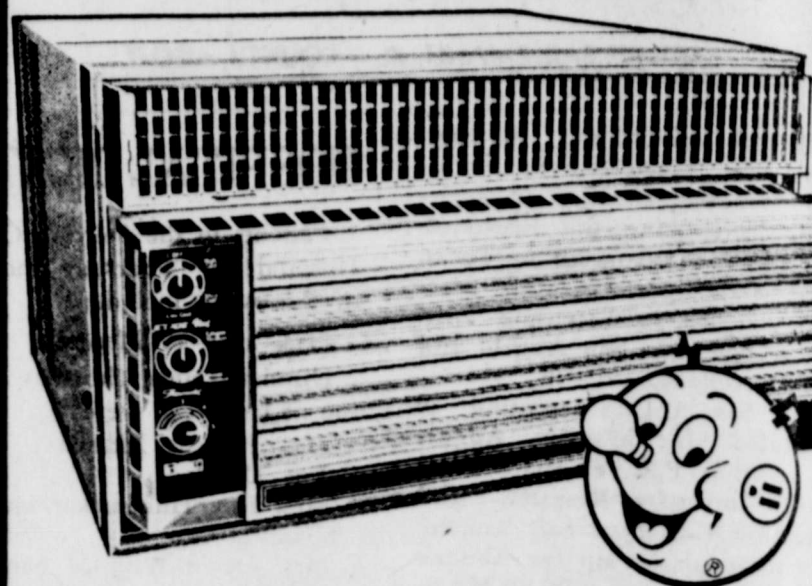

Social Security News

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS

Franklin Upp, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, addresses this news release to those of you who receive the Supplemental Security Income payments (SSI) through the Social Security Administration. As all of you know we at social security need to be kept informed about those items that could change the amount of your benefits, such as marital status (marriage, divorce, address, material and monetary loss or gain, as well as death of a beneficiary.

To do this, we rely upon you, the individual, to keep us informed; and at least once a year, we contact you. It is that time of year again for many of you. Please don't be alarmed should you receive a letter to contact us regarding your continuing eligibility for SSI. Be sure, however, that you do either meet with one of our representatives or call our San Angelo Office as soon as possible after receipt of one of our letters. Failure to do so could lead to a suspension of your benefits.

Just remember, it is of utmost importance that you reply to your letters from our office.

They are the kind of men who don't take freedom for granted, men who believe that America has a lot worth fighting for.

To a great degree, these Marines are able to maintain their high state of readiness because men like yourself have fostered a positive atmosphere for the concept of Reserve participation. Further contributions you can make are these:

- Assure Marine Reservists that they will not be penalized in hiring, promotion, transfer or the granting of other benefits because of their Reserve service.
- Permit them to attend their two weeks of summer training without charging this time to earned vacation.
- Pay the difference between their military and civilian pay during summer training, if the military pay is less.
- Give recognition to outstanding Reservist employees in company publications.
- If you have the opportunity, take the time to visit your Marine Reserve training center. Talk to the officers of the unit and learn firsthand what the Marines in your city do and how they do it. They will welcome your visit and appreciate your interest.
- As a taxpayer, remember that the cost of maintaining a Marine Reservist is only about ten percent that of a regular fighting man. But if these men of your community are ever needed, they'll answer the call as 100 percent Marines. There's no ten-for-one bargain involved. The Marines make up the difference—through the hard work and dedication they put into their training.
