These pests also feed on the foliage, then spin the charastic web or bag Light in charastic web or bag. Light in-- festations of these can be re-moved by cutting off the branch tips with the worms or web and burning. Sevin will also control these pests in a spray but once the worm has entered the bag, with insecticides. Them with insecticides. member in the use of Sevin on pecans. It cannot be used on pecans after the shucks have split. At this season, probably none of the shucks have split but this precaution should be rethis precaution should be re- membered as the shucks will begin splitting soon.
