MCT Presenting Historical Play

ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS

A dramatic hit set in the colorful era of King Henry VIII is the production now on at the Midland Community Theatre. Maxwell Anderson's powerful, poetic chronicle of the life and death of Anne Boleyn, ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS, opens Friday, October 3 for 8 performances.

Anne Boleyn was the second wife of Henry VIII for a brief but turbulent thousand days. Their love affair and marriage produced world-shaking consequences. The English church severed its ties with Rome, international alliances shifted, and executions became a common common practice, all predicated by the actions of these two strong-willed, fiercely proud individuals.

Rica Thomas and Monty Cortier will portray the royal couple in the MCT production ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS is the third of Maxwell Anderson's historical dramas to be set in this period of English history. He had previously written ELIZABETH THE QUEEN and MARY OF SCOTLAND. Other well known Anderson plays include WINTERSSET, WHAT PRICE GLORY? and BOTH YOUR HOUSES, the latter winning him the Pulitzer Prize for drama in 1933.

ANNE OF THE THOUSAND DAYS will offer a special student ticket price of \$1.00 for the performances scheduled Thursday, October 9, and the matinee on Sunday, October 12. Or, students may come in teacher-sponsored groups to any performance at the group rate of \$1.00 a ticket. A study guide for teachers of English and History has been prepared by the Junior League of Midland and has been distributed to area schools. Copies may be obtained from MCT.

Alfred Thieme, 87, Buried Thursday

Services for Alfred Thieme, 87, former resident here, were held Thursday at 1:30 in the Lindell Avenue Baptist Church of San Angelo and burial was in the City Cemetery here at 3 p.m.

Mr. Thieme died Saturday night in Palo Alto, California. He was born Sept. 5, 1888 in Arneckeville. He spent many years in the surrounding area, moving to Sterling County in 1910 where he worked on the Bade Ranch. He served in WWI from 1917-1919 with the 315th Division Supply Train and was married to Ethel Alice Bade in 1920. He was a rancher, then production foreman for Cardinal Oil at Forsan. In 1945 the family returned to Sterling City where he operated a service station and farmed. They moved to Coahoma in 1945 where he operated a service station, cafe, and an icehouse plus a small farm. In 1960, the Thiemes retired and moved to San Angelo. Last December they moved to Palo Alto, Calif.

Survivors include his wife; Mrs. Ethel Thieme- four daughters, Lavernia Benton, Flo Marie Krall, Madge Evelyn Fraser and Ethel Benincasa; three sons, Fred Thieme, Frank Thieme and Alfred Thieme, Jr.; grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.

4-H Projects Being Offered Here

According to Mrs. Jean Holland, County Extension Agent-at Large, 3 4-H projects are now being offered to boys and girls in Sterling County of 4-H age, 9 years to 19. Two of these projects are brand new projects, guaranteed to present fun and learning to interested boys and girls.

First—INDOOR GARDENING WITH HERBS—a mini-garden project is designed for youngsters 7th grade and up. The project is of a short term nature and involves learning about growing herbs, harvesting them, and using them in cooking.

Exploring 4—H is a new project designed for youth ages 9 to 11. The project consists of 15 subject parts with 30 learning experiences. 4-H'ers choose 6 lessons they are most interested in. Subjects included are wood working, entomology (study of bugs) home environment, photography, geology (study of rocks, pets and many others).

In addition to these new projects, foods and nutrition projects, are also offered to all boys and girls 9 to 19. Cooking, good nutrition and food buying are only a few of the subjects covered in this project.

Adult and junior leaders are needed for all projects.

Social Security News

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS

Franklin Upp, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, addresses this news release to those of you who receive the Supplemental Security Income payments (SSI) through the Social Security Administration. As all of you know we at social security need to be kept informed about those items that could change the amount of your benefits, such as marital status (marriage, divorce, address, material and monetary loss or gain, as well as death of a beneficiary).

To do this, we rely upon you, the individual, to keep us informed; and at least once a year, we contact you. It is that time of year again for many of you. Please don't be alarmed should you receive a letter to contact us regarding your continuing eligibility for SSI. Be sure, however, that you do either meet with one of our representatives or call our San Angelo Office as soon as possible after receipt of one of our letters. Failure to do so could lead to a suspension of your benefits.

Just remember, it is of utmost importance that you reply to your letters from our office.

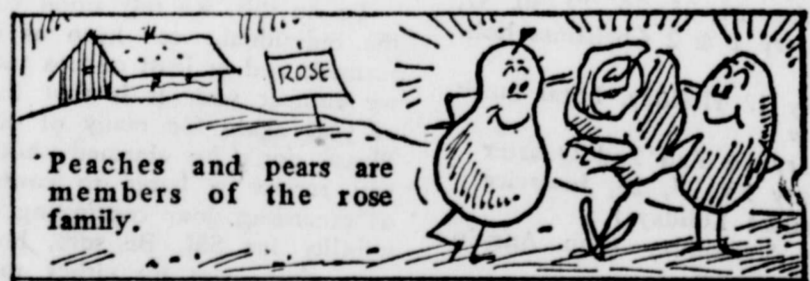

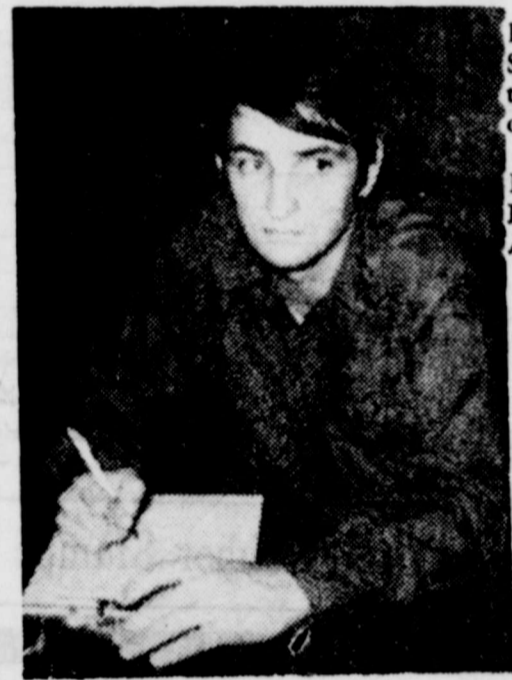

Postal Consumer Service Program

A nationwide Consumer Service Program designed to improve and broaden the quality of mail service was announced today by Postmaster Bill Brooks.

Beginning October 1, the U.S. Postal Service will introduce a program at the Sterling City Post Office and other offices across the nation to encourage mail users to register problems they may have with their mail service.

At the core of the program is a consumer service card, through which problems are identified and which postal managers attempt to expeditiously resolve.

The Consumer Service Program reflects Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar's determination that mail service to the public will be—friendly, courteous and efficient, as well as speedy and reliable.

Good service is a far broader concept than just fast mail handling, as important as that is—the Postmaster General says—It is also built on employee courtesy, our responsiveness to customer needs, the sympathy and understanding we bring to your own expectations of what good postal service is all about.

Postmaster Brooks urged customers in Sterling City to bring inquiries and complaints to the attention of postal managers. And if people feel their problems have not been properly handled, the Postmaster said, they should see him personally. To make it easier for a customer to make a suggestion or complaint about postal service, the new consumer service card will be available from letter carriers and at post offices.

According to Postmaster Brooks the card is two postal cards with

carbon paper between them. One copy goes to me or a station superintendent so work can begin on the problem, he said. The other goes to Postal Service Headquarters in Washington for cataloging and analysis. The cards will help management spot problems and take corrective action if necessary.

The card should take no more than two minutes to fill out. The Postmaster also said he and his staff are willing to discuss any problems, including lack of courtesy, irregularities in deliveries or collections, collection box convenience and postal office hours.

We want you to come to us with your problems, concluded Postmaster Brooks. The whole point of this service program is to bring your problems and gripes out in the open where we can attempt to resolve them.

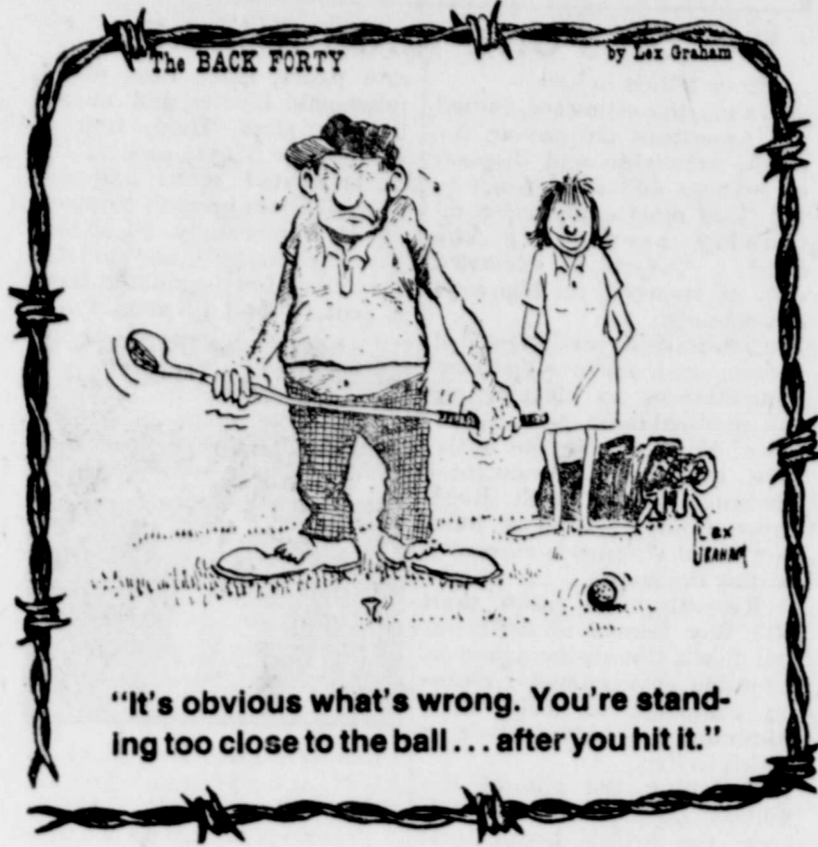
