The number of confirmed cases (screwworm) in Sterling County increased the last two weeks. Three cases were confirmed positive by the Mission Laboratory during that period of time. Each was in a different species of animal so the pests are not picking favorites in the animal world.

The first was in the back of a dog owned by Leo Stewart who lives on the Ross Foster ranch on the Midland road. The second case was in the head of sheep on the Foster and Hildebrand River ranch and was sent in by Clyde Estes. King Terry, Jr. sent in the third case from his place twelve miles north of town. It was from a calf's navel.

In addition to being from different species of animals, the confirmed cases were in widely separated areas of the county.

According to the latest information from the eradication program officials, aerial drops of sterile flies are still being made on confirmed case areas. The ground release has been halted though due to the cost of the loss of flies, mostly between Mission and the release areas.

Livestock producers are urged to postpone surgery wherever possible until cold weather. The entire state is being hit hard by the pests and anything that can be done to help until winter is urged. Collection vials and postage free mailing tubes are available in the feed store and the county agent's office.

This week, October 5-11, is National 4-H Week and has been proclaimed so by Governor Dolph Briscoe in Texas. More than 215,000 Texas boys and girls are among the 7.2 million members in the United States.

Texas has a proud part in the 4-H Club educational movement for it was in Jack County, Texas that the forerunner of the modern 4-H Club was started in 1908. A part time county extension agent, T.M. Marks, formed a Corn Club there to teach farm boys about corn production since he was having little success reaching the farmers themselves. With more than 6 different projects and activities available today, 4-H has come a long way since 1908. Though projects and activities have changed Learning by Doing is still the concept of 4-H work.

Dr. Don Stormer, State 4-H and Youth Leader with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says that—By encouraging high standards and setting of meaningful goals, 4-H lays a broad and firm base for a life time of personal growth. As today's youth grow to adulthood, they will face a world unlike the one most of us grew up in. There will be more people and fewer resources. And there will be vital issues in government that call for wise decision making. 4-H prepares young people to assume the responsibilities of adulthood in a changing society.

Five Sterling County 4-H Club members will be competing in the sheep show at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas this weekend. Those participating are Amy, Becky, and Wesley Hodges with their Rambouillets and Paula and Delmar Radde with their Delaines. Judging will get underway at 9:00 A.M. Saturday morning with the Rambouillets and be followed by the Columbias, Corriedales and Delaines.

Lose 31 to 16 to Jayton Friday

The Sterling City Eagles go to Loraine tonight at 7:30 for the second conference game of this season. The Eagles lost to the Jayton Jaybirds here last Friday by the score of 31 to 16.

As the game with Jayton got underway last Friday, the locals got on the board first with a 2 point safety as Jayton kicker received a bad pass from his center and the score was 2 to 0 early in the first quarter with the Eagles ahead. Before the first quarter was over, though, the Jaybirds got a TD when Bobby Kelly pushed over three yards for the Jayton team. Their try for extra point was no good.

In the second quarter, Eagle Jeff Copeland passed to Lee Fleming for a TD and the score was 8 for the locals to 6 for the Jaybirds. But before the quarter ended Mark Fincher got off on a long run for the Jaybirds and the score at half time was 12 to 8 in favor of the Jaybirds.

In the third quarter, Jayton's Mark Fincher ran wild and hit 3 TDs in quick succession. They sewed up the game in the third.

Later in the fourth quarter, Copeland gain passed to Fleming on a long deal (73 yards) for an Eagle score and Copeland pushed over for the two extra points.

The Jaybirds did not score in the fourth, and the score ended 31 to 16.

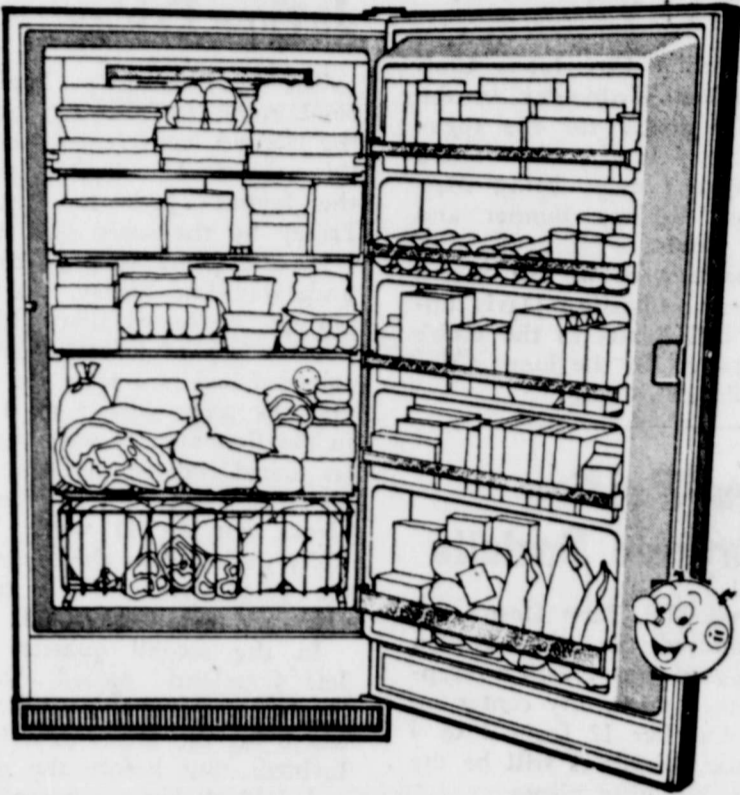
The Centre is a place dedicated to providing a place for young people and offers a host of services for young people.

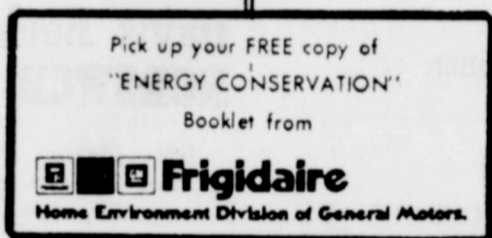

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS

Franklin Upp, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, addresses this news release to those of you who receive the Supplemental Security Income payments (SSI) through the Social Security Administration. As all of you know we at social security need to be kept informed about those items that could change the amount of your benefits, such as marital status (marriage, divorce, address, material and monetary loss or gain, as well as death of a beneficiary.

To do this, we rely upon you, the individual, to keep us informed; and at least once a year, we contact you. It is that time of year again for many of you. Please don't be alarmed should you receive a letter to contact us regarding your continuing eligibility for SSI. Be sure, however, that you do either meet with one of our representatives or call our San Angelo Office as soon as possible after receipt of one of our letters. Failure to do so could lead to a suspension of your benefits.

Just remember, it is of utmost importance that you reply to your letters from our office.

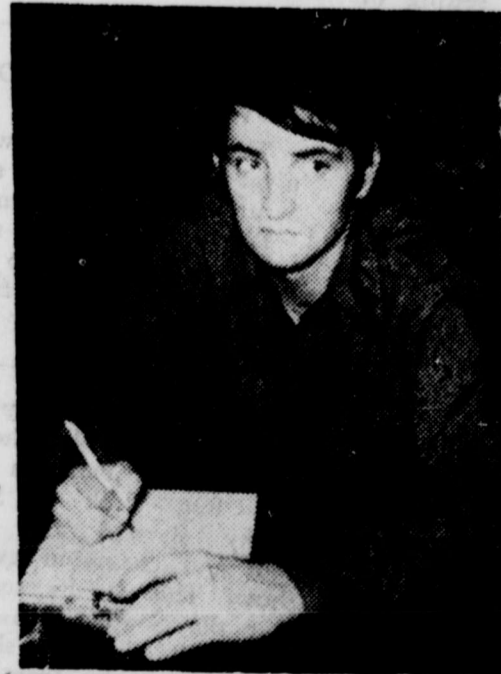

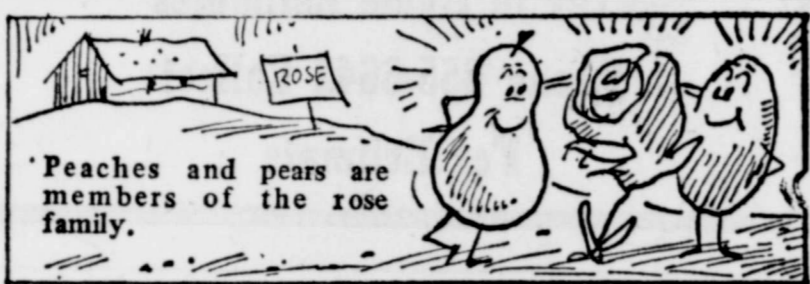
