favorites in the animal world. The first was in the back of a dog owned by Leo Stewart who lives on the Ross Foster ranch on the Midland road. The second case was in the head of sheep on the Foster and Hildebrand River ranch and was sent in by Clyde Estes. King Terry, Jr. sent in the third case from his place twelve miles north of town. It was from a calf's navel.

In addition to being from different species of animals, the confirmed cases were in widely separated areas of the county.

According to the latest information from the eradication program officials, aerial drops of sterile flies are still being made on confirmed_case areas. The ground release has been halted though due to the cost of the loss of flies, mostly between Mission and the release areas.

Livestock producers are urged to postpone surgery wherever possible until cold weather. The entire state is being hit hard by the pests and anything that can be done to help until winter is urged. Collection vials and post_ age free mailing tubes are av_ ailable in the feed store and the county agent's office.

This week, October 5.11, is National 4-H Week and has been proclaimed so by Governor Dolph Briscoue in Texas. More than 215,000 Texas boys and girls are among the 7.2 million members in the United States. Texas has a proud part in the 4.H Club educational movement for it was in Jack County, Texas that the forerunner of the mod. ern 4-H Club was started in 1908. A part time county ex. tension agent, T.M. Marks, form_ ed a Corn Club there to teach farm boys about corn production since he was having little success reaching the farmers themselves. With more than 6 different pro_ jects and activities available today, 4.H has come a long way since 1908. Though projects and activities have changed Learning by Doing is still the concept of 4-H work. Dr. Don Stormer, State 4_H and Youth Leader with the Tex. as Agricultural Extension Serv_ ice, says that-By encouraging high standards and setting of meaningful goals, 4-H lays a broad and firm base for a life. time of personal growth. As today's youth grow to adult-hood, they will face a world unlike the one most of us grew up in. There will be more people and fewer resources. And there will be vital issues in government that call for wise decision making. 4-H prepares young people to assume the responsibilities of adulthood in a changing society.


VISITING SCOTSMAN TO SPEAK AT BAPTIST CHURCH NEXT WEDNESDAY NIGHT

All are invited to hear Rev. Moyes next Wednesday, October 15 at 7:30 at the Baptist church.



Take advantage of sales: Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available; use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short-time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

Lock in flavor: Use moisture and vapor-proof materials especially designed for freezers to wrap your foods. Tightly sealed, these lock in flavor and moisture and prevent "freezer burn" (surface drying) on foods. Don't use wax paper, bread paper or regular cellophane for freezer foods.

Label packages: Date and identify freezer packages so 1) you don't accumulate a lot of mysterious shapes and 2) you'll be able to pick out foods that have been in the freezer longest.




A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS

Franklin Upp, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, addresses this news release to those of you who receive the Supplemental Security Income payments (SSI) through the Social Security Administration. As all of you know we at social security need to be kept informed about those items that could change the amount of your benefits, such as marital status (marriage, divorce, address, material and monetary loss or gain, as well as death of a beneficiary.

To do this. we rely upon you, the individual, to keep us informed; and at least once a year, we contact you. It is that time of year again for many of you. Please don't be alarmed should you receive a letter to contact us regarding your continuing eligibility for SSI. Be sure, however, that you do either meet with one of our representatives or call our San Angelo Office as soon as possible after receipt of one of our letters. Failure to do so could lead to a suspension of your benefits.

Just remember, it is of utmost importance that you reply to your letters from our office.




