McDonald by November 15, 1975. If you have submitted a family history without pictures but would like a picture to accompany the article, please get the pictures in as soon as possible.

The committee is ready to take advance orders for the History. The pre-publication price is \$12 per book, plus \$1 for mailing out of town orders. Advance sales are needed to finance the printing of the book.

The History, as previously stated, will consist of three parts:
(1) THE HISTORY OF STER-IING COUNTY by Ira Lee Watkins. (II) Historical sketches of groups or organizations such as the churches, clubs, schools and institutions. This section will include Tall Tales. (III) A Family Hisory section of the book, from material submitted by the families.

Many old pictures will be located throughout the book.

AROUND THE COUNTY

The number of confirmed screwworm cases in Sterling County grows each week. This is the same pattern evident throughout the state. Eradication program officials say that October has always been the month with the heaviest number of confirmed cases in seven of the last thirteen years.

During the last week of Oc-

tober, three samples from Sterling County were confirmed while one sample was non-screw worm. The positive samples came from different locations in the county. Two were in the navels of newborn calves; these samples are almost always positive. One was from the Jack Wilkinson Ranch nine miles northwest of town and the other was from the Foster and Hilde. brand Ranch 21/2 miles south of town. The third case was in the eye of a cow on the Claude Collins, J. Ranch six miles north. west of Broome. The nonscrewworm sample was sent in by Maggie and Ruth Reynolds eight miles west on the Midland road and was from the docking wound

on sheep. Eradication program officials still urge postponing surgery wherever possible until after frost. If surgery is necessary, treat the wound with one of the recommended insecticides, Co-Ral or Korlan. Check animals periodically and submit all samples. Sterile fly distribution is based on these samples and could well be the key to overwintering flies. being decreased. Mailing tubes and collection vials are available in the feed store and county extension office.

Exploring 4\_H, a new dimension in club work, was discussed by Amy. This phase will start in the near future and provides an opportunity for 4-H Club members to become involved in some new, short term projects.

The club's bake sale, set for November 25, was also announced. This is the first of the fund raising projects of the club. Fach club member will be responsible for baked goods at the sale. oMre information will be provided in the near future.

Some 75,000 Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire during period Mid-November to early January. This survey of crop production and livestock numbers is made annually by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service with the Texas and U.S. Department of Agriculture cooperating.

Producers from each of the 254 counties in the state are selected proportional to size of operation. It is equally important for all producers, large or small, to return the questionnaire. The results are confidential, available to no other government agency or anyone except the few perons required to process the data. The data is the basis of the state and county estimates vailable to everyone.

County statistics are now available for 1974 and January 1, 1975 on livestock, poultry, pecans, small grains, and a variety of other agricultural commodities. Also, a publication, Cash Receipts from the Sale of Texas Farm Commodities is available. Write the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, P. O. 

## Social Security Tips

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million peopleeligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.


