

## Baird Little League All-Star Team Picked; Area Tournament at Cisco

A total of 14 players in the Baird Little League have been selected to the Little League All-Star team, which will enter the Area Little League Tournament scheduled to be played at Rylee Field in Cisco on July 20-21. The Baird team will be playing teams from Cisco, Cross Plains and Clyde in the tourney. Winner at Cisco will advance to the District meet.

The first was scheduled for Tuesday night, July 10 at 5:30 p. m. The second is scheduled for 5:30 p. m. July 17th.

## Baird & Clyde Banks Show Steady Increase In Deposits Over Last Year

Bank deposits in Baird and Clyde banks have shown a steady increase during the past year, it was revealed in the regular quarterly condition statement released this week, following a call from the banking commission on July 1.

Deposits in the Baird First National Bank were \$212,345 higher on July 1 than they were on April 1 of this year, and \$169,829 more than June 30, 1961. Deposits on July 1 were \$4,702,108.19.

Deposits in The Peoples State Bank as of July 1 were \$1,334,587, as compared with \$1,302,981 on April 1, and \$902,906 a year ago. Loans were \$787,201 on July 1 as compared with \$735,454 on April 1, and \$469,136 a year ago. Officials of the First National

Bank in Baird and The Peoples State Bank in Clyde said that the increase reflected the general and steady improvement in the economical picture in the area. Strength in the cattle industry and better prices for the grain harvested in the period, entered into the general picture.

While the figures on the July 1 statement were not the highest in the history of the First National in Baird, it was the highest since the inflationary period of the oil boom.

Business leaders of the communities said that they were experiencing the usual summer slump, but that the business picture was good, and showed chances of reaching a new high during the fall and winter months.

## Clyde Teen-Agers Have Good Record

The Clyde Teen-Age baseball team is boasting a 10-2 won and lost record this season, and as they near the end of league play, they are in second place.

The Clyde team is only one game behind the Baird Red Sox and play the neighboring team the last time in regular season play at 8 p. m. Tuesday, July 17.

Baird won the first game early in the season 5-0, behind the almost perfect hurling of Tally Windham. Windham hurled a no-hitter and struck out 17 Clyde batters. Clyde pitcher, Buddy Howe gave up only three hits during the contest. The Tuesday game will probably see the two pitchers matched again.

The final home game, and the only remaining home contest, will see the Clyde team playing host to the Cisco Cats on July 19.

**County Agent**

By TRAVIS ALLEN

The first official testing of Callahan County for brucellosis will end this week. On Friday, the lab will move to Comanche where testing will begin in that county.

Approximately 19,000 head of cattle from 900 herds have been tested here. Any person whose cattle haven't been tested, please contact the county agent so arrangements can be made for them to be tested.

Dr. Craig, veterinarian from Cisco, will do the retesting of all herds from the Coleman road east in the county. The herds to be retested will be those that had reactors or suspects. The retest will be done within 60 to 120 days after the first test. The retesting in the west part of the county will be done by one of the men with the brucellosis program, or a veterinarian from Abilene.

The State office in Austin will notify the county when they have determined the county is Certified. We are looking to receive notice of the certification within two months and it could possibly be a lot sooner. It will be dependent on the number of herds that show clean on the first retest.

Jim Ellis, crew chief for the brucellosis testing crew, expressed his gratitude to the many people who worked and helped in the testing. He said that cooperation of the lineup men and individuals was very good, and he and his crew members appreciated the help very much.

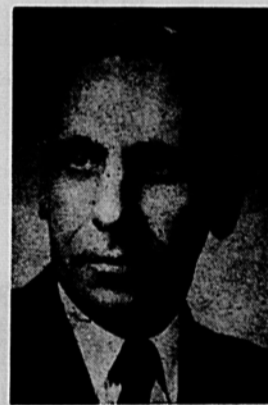

## About Your HEALTH



A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

During the sweltering heat of Texas summers, most of us can do something to get some relief -- take a cool shower, wear light clothes, find a shady spot or sit in front of the air conditioner.

But babies are not so self-sufficient. They are dependent upon mothers to help them beat the heat.

The human body constantly produces heat and so must constantly lose it to be compatible with life. Evaporation of sweat cools the body and this process is aided by circulating air. Also, physical exercise increases the amount of heat produced and in turn must be lost.

With these facts in mind, mother can do a lot to make baby comfortable in hot weather -- and she'll have a healthier baby if she does.

Baby should be placed in the coolest spot possible. The crib

or playpen should be placed in a good circulation spot -- in the middle of the room or near a window or door. If outdoors, place the baby in the shade.

Placing an electric fan in the room increases the circulation of air around him. This should be done whenever the temperature exceeds 84 degrees and there is little or no breeze. But be sure the fan is out of reach of inquisitive hands.

If an air conditioner is used, it should be set about 78 degrees and adjusted so that the cold air does not blow directly on the baby.

When shopping on hot days, never leave the baby in the car. Temperatures rise to a dangerous level inside a car parked in the sun in a very short time.

Clothing is important. In temperatures below 80 degrees the usual clothing may be worn, but with temperatures between 80 and 92 degrees, just a diaper is sufficient. But when the heat goes over the 92 mark, baby should wear a cotton shirt to absorb perspiration.

The more active the baby, the less clothing is needed at the same air temperature. It helps to change the position of a small baby occasionally.

Plenty of liquids should be offered the baby on hot days -- at room temperature -- and don't worry if the baby seems to lose his appetite a little. Most babies love a bath. Sev-

eral a day will help to keep him cool. If the temperature is over 90 degrees, partially drying the baby will have an additional cooling effect. A bath before napping will help the baby to fall asleep easier.

### It's the Law in TEXAS



#### JURY DUTY

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The twelve jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education and their experience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends -- the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So, it may take them days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairmindedness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over and over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a 'decent respect to the opinions' of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors. Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states.

A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law -- the legislature does; and the judge 'charges' or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any 'reasonable doubt', -- not imaginary or far-fetched -- acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the preponderance of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.
