AROUND THE COUNTY

One of the activities planned by the County Program Building Committee is the meeting on sheep diseases this coming Monday night, December 8, at 7:30 P.M. in the community center. This meeting was set up because members of the committee felt that there was a need for more information on diseases of sheep.

Dr. George Ahlschwede and Dr. Charles Livingston will present the program. Dr. Ahlschwede is sheep and goat specialist with the Agricultural Extension Service while Dr. Livingston is Professor of Sheep and Goat Diseases with the Agricultural Experiment Station. Both men have their headquarters at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at San Angelo.

Livingston, one of the few veternarians to hold a Ph. D. degree, is an outstanding authority on sheep diseases. He has done much work in this field having been headquartered at the Sonora Experiment Station before being transferred to San Angelo.

All sheep producers are urged to take advantage of the opportunity to learn more about sheep diseases, their prevention and control, and new diseases. They will also learn how to use the animal disease diagnostic laboratory. This laboratory has the facilities for diagnosing diseases of all animal and is the facility available to veternarians and livestock producers when some thing new in the way of a disease appears in the livestock field.

The cold weather of last few weeks should help slow down the pesky screwworm but there have been several cases reported positive in the last month. Among them were cases in horses, cattle and sheep in Sterling County. William Foster sent in a sample from a horse that was confirmed positive while Billy Palmer on the Caldwell and Palmer Ranch sixteen miles out the Big Spring road sent in one from cattle. The positive case in sheep was sent in by Tom Mc-Gill from the south part of the

county While the cold weather should have slowed down the worms, it is wise to keep checking your stock for some of these pests that may be a little tougher and endurer the weather.

Treat suspected cases and send in a sample.

The severe frosts have killed the annual broomweeds and what warm season grass there was on the ranges. This sets up a situation very favorable for range fires that could burn off a lot of country. As everyone knows the broomweeds will really burn; wach for possible fires.

Everyone is urged to check out any smoke they may see on the horizon. Several have been reported in the past few weeks but thus far they have all been pit fires at some of the drilling locations. This is much better that just forgeting about the smoke you see and having it turn out to be a range fire. The quicker it is reported, the better chance for control. Livestock sprayers should be kept in good operating condition for possible use. With the cold weather, it may not be advisable to keep one filled with water but if it is in operational condition, filling with water can be done quickly if needed.

Notice of Intent to Engage in Weather Modification Activities

Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 East 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 76-5 of the State of Texas, issued December 18, 1974, and renewed September 1, 1975, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring. Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence northnortheast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence southsouthwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Owen H. lvie, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Big Spring, Texas

5. The program will be operational during the period from March 1st to November 30 durin the years 1976, 1977, 1978 and 1979.

6. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file : complaint with the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

### LEGAL NOTICE

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Mohair Council of America, 516 Central National Bank Building, San Angelo, Texas 76901, proposes a referendum election on February 10, 1976, under provisions of Article 55C, Vernon's Civil Statutes on the proposition of whether or not mohair producers in the following counties shall assess themselves an amount not to exceed 24 cents per pound on all mohair sold to be collected at the first point of sale, and to elect members for a 12-person commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for advertising, promotion, market and product development, education and research programs designed to encourage production, marketing and use of Texas mohair.

Counties included in the referendum are: District 1 - Terrell, Crockett, Pecos, Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis. District 2 -Val Verde, Kinney. District 3 - Edwards. District 4 - Bandera Real, Medina, Uvalde. District 5 - Mason, Llano, Gillespie, Kerr, Kendall, Comal, Blanco. District 6 - Schleicher, Menard Sutton, Kimble. District 7 — Mills, Hamilton, San Saba, Coryell. Lampasas, Burnet, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Bell. District 8 -Irion, Sterling, Coke, Tom Green, Concho, McCulloch, Coleman, Runnels, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan. District 9 - Brown, Eastland, Comanche, Erath, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Jack, Parker, Hood.

The referendum and election will be held by physical ballot with voting place to be at each county ASCS office in the referendum area or in the county courthouse in counties that do not have ASCS office facilities. Polls will be open at 7 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Producers who will be away from their particular voting box location on election day may obtain an absentee ballot from county agent offices, wool and mohair warehouses or from the Mohair Council of America. Absentee ballots must be mailed in the self-addressed envelope to the central balloting place at P.O. Box 222, San Angelo, Texas 76901, before midnight three days prior to the election date.

Any person within this referendum area engaged in the business of producing or causing to be produced mohair for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of ranches and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.



### Social Security News

A SPECIAL NOTICE TO SUPPLEMENTAL SECURITY INCOME RECIPIENTS

Franklin Upp, District Manager of the San Angelo Social Security Office, addresses this news release to those of you who receive the Supplemental Security Income payments (SSI) through the Social Security Administration. As all of you know we at social security need to be kept informed about those items that could change the amount of your benefits, such as marital status (marriage, divorce, address, material and monetary loss or gain, as well as death of a beneficiary.

To do this. we rely upon you, the individual, to keep us informed; and at least once a year, we contact you. It is that time of year again for many of you. Please don't be alarmed should you receive a letter to contact us regarding your continuing eligibility for SSI. Be sure, however, that you do either meet with one of our representatives or call our San Angelo Office as soon as possible after receipt of one of our letters. Failure to do so could lead to a suspension of your benefits.

Just remember, it is of utmost importance that you reply to your letters from our office.



Directions for Packing and Shipping Heads from Suspected Rabid Animals to the Laboratory

Increasing difficulty to confirm a diagnosis of rabies is being experienced with the submission of animal heads for rabies examination when shipment by air takes as long as four days between shipping date and re-ceipt. If at all possible, we recommend to those who use the State Department of Health laboratory service in Austin, that they USE THE VARIOUS BUS COMPANIES. Pack the animal head in a leakproof plastic bag. Enclose a second leak-proof plastic bag filled with ice or use water frozen in plastic bottles. An outside container of sturdy construction (styrofoam serves nicely and is inexpensive) must be used. Also, use packing ma-event of leakage. The box should be securely taped down and marked, KEEP UPRIGHT-PLEASE. A note to telephone the Health Department Laboratory (454-3781 Ext. 313) on arrival, should be prominently displayed.
