Ranchers in Sterling County are now eligible to use theM-44 spring_loaded ejector with potassium cyanide capsules as a means of controlling predatory animals.

Materials may be purchased directly from the manufacturer, the M-44 Safety Predator Control Company, 2501 West Washington Street. Midland, Texas, 79701. Participating producers must report their results with the device directly to the Texas Department of Agriculture by means of reporting card.

Certification is not required. However, use of the publicaions, Using the M-44 in Coyote Control, and Hydrogen Cyanide Safety Tips, will help producers use the device safely and effec. tively. The publications are available in the local Texas Agricultural Extension Service Office.

The M-44 experimental program authorized by the Environmental Protection Agency terminated in June, 1975; therefore, use of sodium cyanide by ranchers was no longer approved. The program outlined above replaces it. The experimental program was started in 1974 and was the one which required each operator to submit an application, take the required training given here in March 1974 and file reports of use.

The M-44 devices are identical as are the materials and capsules except for the toxicant in the chemicals. Thus, no new materials other than the cap-sules are needed.

The lamb is limited to finewool lambs only. A blanket group of lambs has been entered. Those competing will be selected prior to the show. The Rambouillet breeding sheep show was dropped by the show officials several years ago because of the small number of

Two insect pests are a problem at this time of the year in cattle. One is lice, the other

Lice can weaken cattle, sturt their growth and make them more suspectible to other diseases. That's why it is important to check cattle periodically. The cooler temperatures and longer bair atract the pests at this time of the year. They are usually most numerous on the neck and shoulders of an animal.

Control consists of spraying, dipping, dusting, or the use of self_treatment rubbing devices. Control measures are found in the pamphlet, Suggestions for Controlling External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry, available in the County Extension office.

Grubs have been a problem here at this time of year even though cattle may have been treated at the recommended time Apparently, there is a split cycle or two cycles here, and the

grubs emerge late. Treatment now should be limited to dusting with rotenone, the old recommendation. Appli-

1976-77 Texas Almanac Out

The American Revolution of 1776 set in motion events that led to the colonization of Texas and eventually to its own struggle for self-government, notes the new 1976_77 edition of the Texas Almanac, published by A.H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News

Those historic events affecting Texans have been traced in an article written especially for the Texas Almanac by the late R. Henderson Shuffler, editor, historian and, at the time of his death in the summer of 1975, executive director of the Institute of Texas Cultures at San Antonio.

What we call the American Revolution was simply the first stage of the revolution of the Americas, Shuffler wrote. Texas was affected directly by the American Revolution and the course of is history for centuries to come was shaped by the outcome.

Also in he Almanac's Bicencennial section, Sam Kinch Sr., chairman of the American Revolution Bicentennial Commission of Texas, tells of the American Bicentennial in Texas. A commission listing of Texas events during the bicentennial year is included.

The new edition also contains a special section on Gardening in Texas prepared by specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is a guide for planting vegetables, fruit and nut trees and ornamentals in al! sections of the state.

The LBJ Hill Country-writen by Art and Elise Kowert, publishers of the Fredericksburg Standard, presents a description of the home of the late Lyndon B. Johnson, 36th President of the United States.

Nowhere else in this land is a place where, within a distance of a few miles, the story of an American President can be reraced through visiting the settlement of his grandparents, the birthplace, boyhood home, his White House away from Wash. ington, and his ranch where he lived in retirement and where he died and is buried, hey wrote.

Other special features of the new Almanac include a history of the Texas Railroad Commission, the latest U.S. Census on manufacturing, wholesale and retail trade, the service industries and transportation in Texas, an account of the 10 Travel Trails of Texas, and a history of Texas A&M University observing its 100th anniversary in 1976.

Included also are data on election results, listings of county, municipal and state officials appointive boards and commissions, officials of state and regional civic and trade organizations, and sections on agriculture, manufacturing, transportation and government.

Each Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area, the urban concentrations in which most Tex. ans live, has an editorial page devoted to it.

A new Texas map in color, wih major highways, supplements 254 county maps, updated from maps prepared by the Texas Highway Department. Tourism and recreation also are featured, with listings of state and national parks.

This is the 48th edition of the Texas Almanac that has been published since 1857, said Joe M. Dealey, president of the Dallas Morning News. We believe it continues the high standards that have made this publication the





Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.



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



'Silent Night' Hymn Is Often Called Song From Heaven

"Silent Night" is often called the "Song from Heaven" because the story of its inspiration and composition is one of the most beautiful Christmas stories in existence.

On December 24, 1818, in the Austrian village of Hallein, as Father Joseph Mohr sat reading his Bible, there was a knock at his door. It was a peasant woman who wanted the priest to visit a poor charcoal-maker's wife to whom a child had been born. The parents had sent her to ask the priest to come and bless the infant.

Father Mohr was strangely moved by the visit to the mother. And that evening as he returned to his home saw that the dark slopes of the Alps around the village were



alight with torches of the mountaineers on their way to church. To him it was a Christmas miracle.

Later, as he tried to put down on paper his feeling and experience, the words kept turning into verse. When dawn came he found he had written a poem—a beautiful and moving poem.

On Christmas Day his friend, Franz Xaver Gruber, music teacher in the village school, composed music to fit the verses.

Village children heard the priest and teacher singing the song and learned it. From there it spread throughout the world. Today, it is regarded as the greatest Christmas hymn and wherever there are men of good will they sing:

"Silent night, holy night— All is calm, all is bright, Round you Virgin, Mother and Child;

Holy Infant, so tender and mild. Sleep in heavenly peace— Sleep in heavenly peace."

Redeemer Legends Common Among American Indians

Redeemer legends were common among American Indians. While some were aboriginal, others probably were greatly influenced by contacts with Europeans, especially missionaries.

One of these legends was gathered by the Reverend Ephraim S. Alphonse, a Wesleyan Methodist minister who lived among the Valiente Indians for 21 years. The legend concerns the Ulikron (orphan of the Virgin) and how he traveled long ago from the far, far north. He talked to stout little men, to tall red men, to men in huts, to men in tall houses made of stone, to men who make broad roads and wear fine soft clothes and pearls and silver and gold. The Ulikron passed among them long, long ago and told the men to be good, to love good, and to do good. The Ulikron passed and talked. His eyes were soft and seeing. His eyes saw through men. His eyes saw and saw and men looked on and wept and stopped their wars. They stopped their hate. Their bows and arrows shot the deer but never man

The Ulikron pointed to the stars. He talked of the Crab, the Plough, the Great Bear. He talked of the God above those stars and he told men to be good and he would come again for all good men, and men began to be good. All Indians wait for the Ulikron.

Such is the story of the Ulikron, which as you can see, closely parallels (and most likely is) the story of Christ.

The evergreen bough, mistletoe and holly used as Christmas decorations have been associated with ceremony and curious custom for thousands of years.

Ancient Romans raised an evergreen branch at the December festival of Saturnalia, honoring the god of sowing.

Long before the Christian era, Tuetons and Scandinavians held the mistletoe sacred and hung it over their doorways as charms. They also worshipped the oak and their priestly Druids brought in a great Yule log at the feast of the winter solstice and lighted it from a brand of the log of the year before.

In parts of Europe the first trees used for Christmas decorations were dormant branches of fruit trees. They were brought indoors several weeks before Christmas and forced into bloom by Christmas time. Holly, the subject of many superstitions, was also used because its prickly leaves were thought to represent the Saviour's crown and its red berries drops of blood.

In parts of Sicily an olive tree is decorated today with oranges. In some countries flowers are used instead of evergreens, in keeping with a story told all over medieval Europe that on the night of the Nativity the trees of the forest, though cloaked in ice and snow, burst into bloom and bore fruit.

All over the world this Christmas each country will celebrate the occasion in its traditional way.

REWARD NOTICE

A reward of \$500.00 will be paid by the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to any person (other than law enforcement officers) giving information causing the arrest and first conviction of any person or persons found butchering or stealing any sheep or lambs or goats belonging to any Association member in good standing. When 2 or more persons give information, the above sum will be divided at the discretion of the Board of the Association. When two or more defendants are involved in a single crime, the total reward is limited to \$500.00, but the conviction of one defendant, even though the other defendants are acquitted will entitle the claimant or claimants to said sum of \$500.00. All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional rewards will be paid. 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STERLING COUNTY CERTIFIED AS FREE OF BRUCELLOSIS

Dr. H. Q. Sibley, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces receipt of the certificate designating Sterling County as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis Free Area.

This reconition signifies that there is no known foci of bovine brucellosis in the county at this time, and that if the infection is re-introduced into the county immediate steps will be taken to confine and eradicate it.

In order to qualify as a Certified Bovine Brucellosis-Free Area all herds of cattle must be tested and found negative or at latest ten per cent of all breeding cattle in the county two years of age and older must be blood tested each year when shipped to market or at time of slauhter with follow-up testing of herd of origin of all reactors disclosed.
