The bugs seem to be taking over judging from the number of questions about insects on various types of plants here. No particular ones are dominating the scene—just various and assorted ones.

Pecan trees are being bothered by the honey dew secreting aphids. This is true in some instances where they were treated with DiSyston as well as untreated trees. For several years, the systemic had worked very well on pecans but about two years ago, there was some breakdown of the insecticide here and the aphids took over. According to reports from different parts of the state this is now occurring in many areas. The entomologists say that the aphids have developed a resistance, or tolerance, for the insecticide and its dependability is no longer assured.

If the honey dew is a problem with its dripping on walks, cars and other locations, spraying with malathion is the best treatment. Use one and one-half pints of the 50% emulsion in one hundred gallons of water. It will be necessary to use the emulsion as the wetttable powder is no longer available.

The nuisance created by the honey dew is not the only problem associated with the aphids on pecans. They can build up to sufficient numbers where they can possibly injure the trees by sucking the sap from the leaves.

Another insect pest which had not been much of a problem here in the past is the bagworm. Ordinarily, bagworms have been more of a problem south of us but this year, one bag has already made its appearance on the persimmon tree on the courthouse lawn.

Malathion at the same rate as for aphids, one and one-half pints per hundred gallons of water is recommended. Sevin at the rate of two pounds of the 80% wetttable powder or three pounds of the 50% wetttable powder is also recommended.

Corn ear worms are also busy in the buds of corn in some gardens. They have also been found in some sorghum here but were not in heavy enough numbers in the sorghum to justify control. They are cannibalistic in nature and will cut down on the infestation in that way. In one corn patch though the numbers were high enough to justify control as there were as many as two and three per bud, or tassel. They will damage the emerging tassel and prevent pollination and ear formation.

Sevin at the rate of nine teaspoons of the 50% wetttable powder per gallon of water is recommended. Be certain to get the spray down into the bud areas.

For all of the 60 people assembled for the occasion, it was a day filled with visiting and reminiscing.

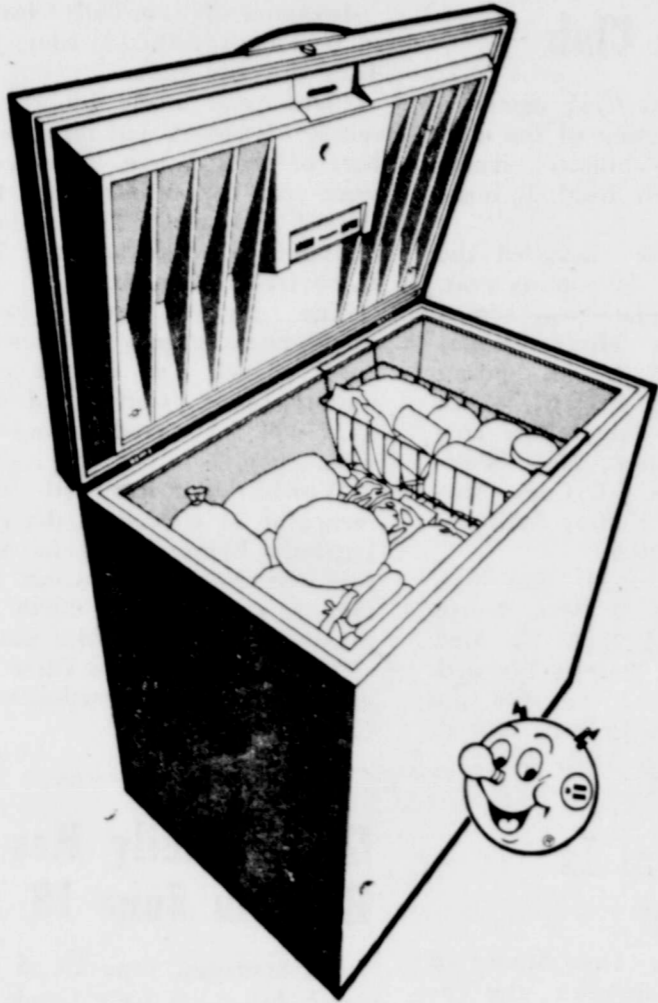
MRS. J. R. LANHAM DEAD

LOCK IN FLAVOR: Use moisture and vapor-proof materials especially designed for freezers to wrap your foods. Tightly sealed, these lock in flavor and moisture and prevent "freezer burn" (surface drying) on foods. Don't use wax paper, bread paper or regular cellophane for freezer foods.

LABEL PACKAGES: Date and identify freezer packages so (1) you don't accumulate a lot of mysterious shapes and (2) you'll be able to pick out foods that have been in the freezer longest.

TAKE ADVANTAGE OF SALES: Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available; use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short-time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

Social security checks should be cashed within a reasonable time to prevent loss or theft, even though there's no time limit on cashing them, according to social security officials here.

'If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once,' a spokesman said. 'The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you won't have to wait while it's being replaced.'

Social security pays over \$4 billion a month in benefit checks to almost 29 million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

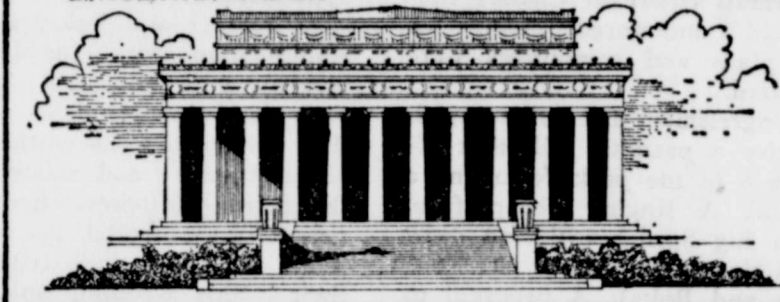
