AROUND THE COUNTY

Sterling County remains one the few counties in this area that has not been hit with an increasing number of confirmed screwworm cases. The county's confirmed count has been hung on three since mid-June. Since that time there have been several reports of non-screwworm samples sent in to the laboratory.

The first planeload of sterilized flies from the recently completed rearing facility in Mexico was due to be released over the Baja California peninsula last Friday. This area was selected because of its unique geographical characteristics. Surrounded on three sides by water, it resembles the state of Florida where the initial work was done in the U.S. years ago. It can be protected from invasion from other parts of Mexico since most of the Gulf of California is too wide for the flies to cross. In addition, all livestock entering the peninsula will be inspected.

Production of the Mexico plant and the Mission plant will be used to drive the screwworm south to the narrow Isthmus of Tehuantepec where a barrier will be formed by continually releasing sterile flies. This is expected to require five years.

Meanwhile on the home front keep checking your stock and sending in samples of suspected cases.

The numbers have not been high but they have been consistently found at several locations around town, both a sprayed and untreated areas. The only difference is that those where spray has been applied are very, very sick and at the point of dying. This condition very likely will continue for another ten days or two weeks after which time the shells should have hardened and the weevil can no longer puncture them. Until that time, the weevil will continue to do some damage.

Social Security

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Sterling County at a rate of \$30,913 a month at the start of 1976, Frank Upp, social security manager in San Angelo, said.

Of the 194 social security beneficiaries living in Sterling County, 104 are retired workers and 7 are disabled workers. Another 83 are receiving benefits as the dependents of workers who are retired, disabled, or deceased.

In Sterling County, 47 people under age 65 and 147 people age 65 and over are receiving monthly social security benefits. Of total beneficiaries 74 are men, 93 are women, and 27 are children. The children receive payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976**

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principle amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes."
